



Dear Friends,

It is really nice to see that spring is again bringing new life into the natural world, may it remind us of God's promise of a new life for us.

The unfolding situation in Ukraine continues to be very disturbing as we watch the horrific scenes of war playing out on our television screens. Millions of people are displaced, as their towns and cities are destroyed and many civilian lives are lost. Our hearts are broken for the people of Ukraine at this most tragic time. It is encouraging to hear of so many appeals for support for Ukraine both in the UK and around the world. Thank you to all our churches for your generosity and willingness to do whatever little you can to share in the support appeal for the people of Ukraine.

As we draw closer toward Holy Week and the celebration of Easter, we are keenly aware that many of our Ukrainian sisters and brothers (like so many others around the world), would have to undertake this most solemn journey within the context of war, displacement, and tragedy. The people of Ukraine have shown tremendous courage in the face of the most tragic circumstances and certainly, they would find means and ways of making the journey to the heart of Easter in ways that are helpful and meaningful for them. I attended the prayer session organized by the Methodist World Council of Church for Ukraine on Ash Wednesday, and I found it deeply moving. It was especially heart-warming to hear Ukrainian voices as they shared their own stories of faith and courage in the face of hostility and military aggression. We do not take for granted our relative freedom to be able to gather in person for Holy Week and Easter Services this year. We are grateful that medical science has made tremendous strides in the fight against Covid-19 but, we know that Covid-19 is still very much with us and there are many people around the world who are still severely impacted by its effects.

Increasingly, the world is becoming a more and more hostile place. First-century Palestine was no different when it comes to hostility, suffering,

and tragedy. Jesus faced dangerous hostility from birth to His death on the cross. God's people have always suffered for their distinctiveness and their belonging to the One True God. The Bible does not shy away from this fact. As we read the pages of Scripture, it is clear that suffering and tragedy were always a part of human existence. We may never be able to give a neat answer to the question of the senseless suffering in the world. Nevertheless, God's people have always testified to God's constant presence in the midst of suffering. This does not deny the horror and pain of suffering in the world in any way — but rather, it brings into sharp focus the unjust suffering of our Lord Jesus Christ on Calvary's Cross. God did not immune Himself from suffering but, in Jesus Christ, God willingly bore our suffering so that we might have the chance to inherit His eternal life.

Psalm 73 gives a very human response to the oldest moral dilemma: "Why do bad things happen to good people?" or "Why do good things happen to bad people?" The Psalmist Asaph gives an almost fatal trial of faith, as he tries to make sense of the many troubles of a godly person in contrast to the prosperity of the wicked. Psalmist wonders whether demanding way of faith is actually worth it. The renewal of the Psalmist's faith came when he went to temple worship and he saw that his preoccupation with the prosperity of the wicked had diverted his attention from a fundamental truth: God is with the godly leading us in the right path.

The vexing problem of human suffering may be beyond our understanding of this side of heaven. But, since our hope is not only in this life — amid the perplexing issues we face daily, we can celebrate the true freedom offered to all people through the cross and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

A blessed and joyous Easter to you all.

## 3 April The Boat Race

This month begins with one of the



world's oldest and most famous amateur sporting events: *The Boat Race*.

First raced in 1829 by crews from Oxford and Cambridge Universities, it is considered the epitome of amateur sport, and each year attracts more than 250,000 spectators to the banks of the Thames, as well as many millions more on television.

The Boat Race is raced along what is called the Championship Course, which is over 4.25 miles of tidal Thames in West London, between Putney and Mortlake.

This year will see the 167<sup>th</sup> Men's Boat Race and the 76<sup>th</sup> Women's Boat Race.

## Meeting of Trinity Church Council on 17 March 2022

Rev'd Audrey Browne chaired the meeting, which was held in the Church Sanctuary.

Diane thanked the stewards – Edna, Jenny, Katrina for all their help. Diane also thanked Pauline and Barbara – who are always willing to stand in and help when asked. The meeting thanked Diane for all her involvement, keeping everyone working together as a team.

The Worship Group is continuing to work to the Plan. A number of Local Arrangements are planned, with a pre-recorded sermon. While we are without a minister, we may have to have more Local Arrangement services.

Jennifer and David W have offered to host a Zoom service on a Sunday afternoon or evening, but this is not yet finalised.

House Groups: The Northern Housegroup continues to meet and at the moment does not have a leader but the Northern Housegroup members run it between them. They would like to encourage some new members. Heather's Winklebury group continues to meet monthly.

Jesus and Me (JAM) – JAM meets at Trinity Church on the first Sunday in the month, during the afternoon. Numbers fluctuate, with the number of families varying from three to six. The helpers are Jennifer, Yvonne, Ann and Hilary. The first part of the afternoon is spent doing fun crafts linked to the bible story theme. Some of this work is often displayed in the entrance hall to our Church, for the congregation to see.

The second part of the afternoon is spent in the Church with a relevant Bible story, songs, and some prayers. Refreshments are wrapped snacks and bottled drinks. In April the team intend to serve a hot meal to the families. If it is successful, this may be included on a regular basis. The team have lots of fresh ideas and things they would like to try but they don't always have the time or organisation to carry them through.

Jennifer had considered re-starting the Craft Fellowship, but due to the increase in Covid numbers she has decided to take a more cautious approach.

Coffee Morning: Sue had originally offered to lead this initiative, but her general fitness now means she is no longer able to lead this outreach. A few ideas were put forward for further consideration.

Trinity Circle is meeting once a month, on the second Tuesday at 7.30pm. As part of outreach, the Committee decided to make this an open evening to include men and also other people from outside our church. So far this has been well attended and the new format works well. Meeting dates are published in the Trinity News. The AGM is in May and further new initiatives are expected then. The group will continue meeting through the summer, but not in January and February.

Margaret Hayes reported on Safeguarding. Advanced level training is planned for 14 May. Details will be sent to Jennifer. The training will be face-to-face for participants, but with topic delivery by Zoom. The Basic course has to be completed before doing the Advanced course. A Foundation module will be delivered on 26 March at Oakridge.

David gave us his last Treasurer's Report before he moves house next month:
Generally both income and expenditure are in line with the budget. The last Church Council was told that Synod in August had warned of a shortfall in the reserves for the Pension Scheme, and each church was to be asked for a contribution. A recommendation was

made that Trinity should offer £6,000.00 towards this shortfall, and the CC meeting unanimously agreed to this.

We shall need to find a replacement treasurer, but in the meantime David and a group of volunteers will work to ensure that our financial matters continue to run smoothly. We have to thank David for his major contribution to our Church for many years, and wish him well for the future.

## **Time to Sow**

We are almost there. The time for sowing approaches. Spring is on its way. It is time to sort out the seeds. In Sunday school, many years ago, some of us learnt this verse;

'Sowing in the morning, sowing seeds of kindness, Sowing in the noon tide, and the dewy eve, Waiting for the harvest, and the time of reaping We shall come rejoicing, bringing in the sheaves.'

(Knowles Shaw, 1834-1878)

I have several packets of seeds. Seemingly 'dead', without instructions for sowing.

Leaving them in the packets, is not an option, if I want to see what they can produce.

At first glance they appear lifeless, but I know, as Jesus said, in the parable of the Sower (Matthew 13) given the right conditions, they can produce colour and beauty.

Some of them have been given to me, as a memory of a life I have known. Given from families, at a funeral Service, they have special poignancy, suggesting as they do, that life is reborn. For the Christian this has to be true.

In the Sunday school verse, we sow in the morning, at the beginning of our lives. In the noon tide, when we are out there in the world, and in the eve, when our sowing is just as important.

To help the growth, in kindness, in love, in care, we need to tend the plants every day.

Perhaps have a chat with them? Tell them how well they are doing.

We all like praise, and it does work,

This applies to people too, by stripping out everything that chokes, and simply showing the same care, our Father God has for us.

So, let's have another look at those seed packets, and expect a harvest. God is true to his word; the harvest will surely come. (Genesis Chap 8 v. 22)

## **Eulogy for Andrea Parker**

(by Jennifer Duncan, Andrea's daughter)

Born in Newcastle upon Tyne a true Geordie. The only child of Andrew and Irene Bell and much loved niece of Hazel and Bessie. She married Jack in1964 and went on to emigrate to South Africa for several years Before settling in Basingstoke.

In 1988 My parents separated. She met Stuart at work and they married in 1999. They have had many happy years together initially in Beaconsfield Road and then settled in Eastrop Lane.

Mum loved barbecues, afternoon tea, holidays, going to the theatre, especially musicals and visits to the Hamble watching the boats on their special bench.

In 2017, Alzheimer's struck and Mum being mum was adamant she did not want people to know. When the pandemic occurred Stuart hunkered down and protected mum with all his might. He did a magnificent job. However in June last year she moved to Pemberley House as she had become so very frail. But all of this does not nearly sum up who my mum was.

My mum is the most generous, selfless and kind-hearted person I know. But I am sure you already also know this. She is someone who I try to emulate daily and pass on those attributes to my children.

She has always invested all of her time and energy into her family, and she has always given her all as a Christian woman to improve other people's lives.

While writing this I spent a long time reflecting on how to best describe my Mum. I came up with 'My mum was a doer'. If you want something doing you know the saying "ask a busy woman". You know the kind of person I mean. One who was quietly asked to do something she just 'Got on with it and made sure it was done'. And done well. With No fan fair or look at me. She also could not say no. (Something I may add I have inherited).

This has meant that she was often involved in a wide variety of very interesting situations.

For example. Mum was one of the first women in the U.K. to open her own bank account without having to request her husband's permission. A very big deal in terms of women's equality and something she was quietly very proud of.

She was also a competent public speaker winning a certificate as part of Toastmistress International competition. This was a very proud moment in her life. She has also continued to use her public speaking skills and enjoyed reciting poetry at Trinity during the Tuesday afternoons and at weekends away.

Did you know that my mum once met Julio Iglesias when she was on holiday? He was very smitten with her, and he even asked her to join him on his tour! I can safely confirm she declined politely. I am quite glad of this fact otherwise I suspect I would be reading a completely different version of events today!

I suspect the reason behind him asking mum to come away with him is probably due to the fact that mum had the ability to light up a room when she walked in.

A good friend of both Stuart and Mums described her as "effervescent" – rather like the bubbles that escape a bottle of fizzy drink. I think on reflection this describes her perfectly.

Mum has always felt strongly about inequality and politics. In South Africa she worked tirelessly

for the PFP. The Progressive Federal Party. This political party worked actively to remove apartheid from South Africa and to ensure that everyone was treated equally. She was a friend of Helen Suzeman a prominent South African anti-apartheid politician. On looking though some of mum's things she has letters of thanks for running congress for the PFP.

I remember as a child going to her house and in addition Desmond Tuto came to our house for lunch to discuss how to bring about change in South Africa and in particular how to combat apartheid. This of course was a small precursor to events leading to Nelson Mandella being released from prison many years later. Mum was one of the first non-African women asked to take tea with the Black Sash ladies in Soweto.

However, mum being mum did not often speak of her small but significant part in bringing change to South Africa.

The final hymn in today's service "we are marching" has been chosen as Mum used to love to hear the ANC men leaving for the day singing that song in the office building she shared with them.

Mum was also passionate about education and the need for all children to receive a solid education. She was part of a movement called TEACH, which stood for Teach Every African Child. Located on the East Rand they strove to ensure that those children in South Africa regardless of the colour of their skin and gender would be offered a free education. Mum was horrified that skin tone and gender would be a barrier to education.

Her political streak continued in the U.K. as she was an active member of the Liberal Democrats in Basingstoke, alongside Stuart for many years.

She initially Volunteered as a teller at local voting stations in Basingstoke to finally running Stuart and other people's successful electoral campaigns for the local council elections.

Mum's infectious smile, laugh and open heart – full of willingness to take part meant that our family holidays were great fun. If the hotel we stayed at had a holiday club and competitions, Mum was in her element accompanied with great hilarity especially when she competed, and most nights won a highly prized certificate.

Her love of winning a certificate is something she passed on to her grandchildren. She also loved to see Maddy and Pete swimming and enjoying themselves on holiday and would always be on hand to dry them with a towel, apply sun cream and provide plenty of ice cream!

Mum and Stuart often had the children on sleepovers on holiday and home and both children remember those nights very fondly indeed.

I remember whilst on holiday in Spain, mum was enjoying a glass of sangria on the veranda in the sun. She got chatting to another couple. On discussing the drink, the lady remarked, "you need to put a gin in it darling. You will never look back" and from that day she had always done that! Try it. It makes all the difference!

Mum loved a charity shop, and always said there is nothing better than a bargain and mum was an expert on charity shop finds! This is something that both myself and Maddy love to do as a result of mum's teaching!

Her meticulous attention to detail was applied to all aspects of both her and Stuart's work life as they co ran their own successful finance business.

She also helped me enormously with my nursing career. She used to read my handwritten notes (no mean feat) and edit and type all of my essays. She also helped with the start of Matt's

law career.

She sent off countless CV's and covering letters on specialist paper and paid for all the stamps as a way to give him a leg up on his career pathway. Mum also found Matt's first suit in a charity shop so he could attend job interviews.

Stuart and mum married here at Trinity after Matt and I had married in the September earlier that year. Mum had waited until I had married and changed my surname as she did not want me to be on my own.

In fact, the reception later today to which you are invited is to be held at Hook House where they held their own wedding reception. Both Stuart and I recognise that the locations chosen today are very special and a fitting tribute to mum as she loved both of these places.

Mum has always selflessly supported each person in our family at times of their greatest need. Offering a safe haven to help them unpack what had happened, nurturing them to strength and then helping them get back on their feet.

Mum's Christian faith was vital to her being. Her father and mother were both Methodist readers. Mum has always been an active member of the Methodist Church and has been a member here at Trinity for over 30 years.

Both Stuart and I were deeply touched when she was visited before she died by a close friend and member of Trinity and given a small wooden cross. She died holding this and it Is accompanying her on her final journey to be with the Lord.

Mum's faithful serving heart meant that she willingly offered her time, skills and energy as part of her service to the Lord. She was also well known for her baking skills and successfully running the Christmas Cake Stall bringing in the family to help run it. In addition, her love of flowers and legendary flower arranging skills have also been greatly admired.

Mind you she was funny about it.

In particular she had a strong dislike of yellow and orange flowers, so much so Stuart could not plant any in their garden! She even made him dig up any that were in Eastrop Lane when they moved in! This is Something Stuart had to work very hard on to make sure it was right. With Mum in charge of course!

Mum gave so much time to her grandchildren Maddy and Pete giving up both Stuart and her own business time to play an active part in their bringing up.

They both looked after the children one day a week so that our own childcare needs were met and this enabled me to work as a nurse.

She was rewarded by seeing Maddy's first walk and it is why she was called Mummum (mum's mum). She Spent hours with Stuart on a Wednesday at my home – well known amongst the family and friends as "Guildford Day."

Her friends all knew not to ask mum for anything on that day. She missed plenty of other opportunities on a Wednesday to willingly watch school plays, play dress up, spending time cooking with the children and helped our whole family with an evening meal and did all our ironing and washing every week!

This closeness together with her legendary chocolate cake has inspired future family bakers to create great masterpieces in the kitchen! The chocolate cake secret recipe I am pleased to say is in very safe hands!

Although mum's other granddaughter Grace lives in Yorkshire meaning she wasn't able to

visit as often as she would have liked, I know Mum received much pleasure in spending time choosing and buying outfits for her and posting them to her so that Grace would know she was being thought of.

Due to the pandemic, when mum moved to Pemberley House, she was only allowed 3 visitors, and this was an especially hard time. However, both Stuart and mum received great comfort in being visited regularly by a close family friend from Trinity. She offered both support in a time of need and we know mum greatly enjoyed the visits.

Although Alzheimer's cruelly robbed mum of her ability to speak and move, even at the end she remained quietly dignified and accepted her illness with great fortitude and bravery.

We will all miss her very much, and the world is a much sadder place for her not being here. We know she is finally at peace and comfortable with God which brings the family great solace.

As I conclude this eulogy, Mum you will be missed greatly. I know that your presence will always be with me. Thank you for being such an incredible role model and for loving me unconditionally. I hope that I have made you proud.

But this is not goodbye. Now it's our turn to go live life to the fullest and keep her legacy alive in your hearts. Each of us here have been touched by her presence and we are better people because of that.

I want to Thank you all for being here today and for helping to make my mum's life so meaningful.

I'm sure I speak for us all when I say there are so many wonderful memories we share of Andrea.

She had such an infectious lust for life, which makes it all the more painful to be talking about the end of her own.

Jenny has spoken with such passion and pride about her mum's many memorable moments, and I'm honoured to be able to share some of my own reflections with you, her dear friends and family.

I'd like to talk to you today about one particularly poignant passage in Andrea's life that I now look back on with increasing affection, even if at the time I was rather hoping the ground would open up and swallow me whole!

Let me set the scene. It was Saturday 18 December 1999... a bitterly cold day, with snow softly swirling in the sky, creating an enchanting winter wonderland. This fittingly festive flurry heralded the joyous occasion of Stuart and Andrea's wedding.

Now, the happy couple gave me one task to perform at this special celebration, albeit an

extremely important one... the honour of being best man for the tying of the nuptial knot.

However, this ceremonial assignment came with one small, but unequivocal, caveat. It was explained in no uncertain terms this was to be a simple celebration. No glitz or glamour, no frills or spills. No ostentatious occasion, just relaxed reverie in the company of much loved friends and family.

And the same rule also applied to one of the traditional best man duties. Under absolutely no circumstances was anyone to give a speech.

Unfortunately, the exuberance of youth got the better of me, and I set about penning the perfect prose... perfect in my own opinion, you understand.

As the jokes fell flat, I was beginning to panic.

Abandoning the brash, it was time for the brains. I skipped straight to the more cultured content, desperately trying to regale the room with a catalogue of quotes... but I wasn't impressing anyone!

Much of the remainder of that speech passed in a blur. A haze of faces and faux pas.

The story could well have ended in complete and utter embarrassment... and it might well have done, if it hadn't been for three welcome words of wisdom.

In closing, I turned to Dad and Andrea and simply spoke from the heart, telling them I had one simple wish for their future as a married couple... that their home be forever filled with 'love, life and laughter'.

By some minor miracle, those three words turned out to be rather prophetic.

Although their time together has been cruelly cut short, I truly believe the happy home Dad and Andrea shared was bursting at the seams with exactly that – *love, life and laughter*.

It was so evident in everything they did.

The business briefings with cherished colleagues and customers, often conducted from the luxury of their garden HQ – aka 'the big shed'!

The plotting of political campaigns, both won or lost, in alliance with fellow Lib Dems.

The summer of brotherly love as Uncle Barry and Dad set about demolishing the industrial-strength outhouse, with Andrea on hand to offer bucket-loads of tea and sympathy!

Savoured moments of sanctuary as Andrea soaked up the seasonal sunshine in the back garden, set to the sounds of Dad waging war on the latest invasion of weeds.

And when the notoriously fickle British summer wound up being a washout, there was eager anticipation and excitement as bags were packed for treasured trips abroad to search out sunnier climes.

Chitter chatter over the clink of glasses – a cheeky bottle of wine at lunch with friends and family or the draining of a wee dram at the end of a demanding day.

The click clack of knitting needles and a good old natter with church friends as Andrea cheerfully crafted her latest woolly wonders, or the snip, snap of scissors as bunches of beautiful blooms were shaped and fashioned into amazing floral arrangements.

And then there was family – so central to their lives.

From up north there were visits from Andrea's mother, Mrs Bell, with many a reverse train trip or mad dash up the motorway to help care for her and Andrea's Aunt Hazel in later life.

And nearer to home there was Miriam (Gran Parker), popping over for a lovingly prepared lunch, trips to summer fairs and fetes, church services and shopping expeditions. And that same caring touch when she, too, fell ill.

Richard and Angela's whistle-stop tours, arriving bearing bags full of Betty's buns and greetings from God's Own County.

And of course, Jenny and her husband Matt, with whom they shared so many special occasions.

And it wasn't long before there was the pitter-patter of tiny feet, too, which brought with it unbridled joy for mum-mum and bumper.

First to arrive were Maddy and Pete, who were the apple of their eye. Dad and Andrea were so thrilled to play such an integral role in their lives, watching them grow and develop into the fine young adults they are today.

And late on the scene came baby Grace, a minor miracle and the cherry on the cake for everdoting grandparents.

Talking of Grace, we've been having quite a few chats about Grandma Andrea these past few weeks, of picnics, parties and parcels lovingly packed with presents. She very much believes Grandma is now in heaven... apparently, I'm told, playing games with God and Jesus, which I have to say sounds like a lot of fun!

I'd very much like to think that in between these games, however, Andrea is allowed to take a bit of a breather, to sit and relax at the table she shares with Mrs Bell, Hazel and Gran Parker.

And as they tuck into copious amounts of tea and cake, reminiscing about happy times gone by, I imagine Andrea looking back at all the loved ones she so sadly had to leave behind, with one simple wish for them all.

That in spite of the immense pain felt at her passing, their homes, too, will be blessed by those same three precious gifts – *love, life and laughter.*

I am far bossier and louder than she ever was – and I don't think I love hedgehogs nearly as much as she did – but the impact she has had on me as a person is immeasurable. That is mainly down to all the love and care she spoilt me with all my life.



Mum was a wonderful mummy to Kathryn and I, and a devoted wife to Ken, my Dad, and later in life to Edward. Mum was always kind, patient and generous and would have done anything for any of us. She loved being a Grandma too, to Beth, Joe, William and Anna. M um had a special skill which I know many adults struggle with, which was to be able to talk and actually play with children on an equal level. Mum used to look after Beth when she was little, and many times I could hear the games going on and would wonder who was enjoying it more! Even when it was a lot harder to get up than it used to be, Mum would still get down on the floor to play with my two.

As a little girl, I just loved to be with my mum. At preschool I would feign illness so I could be at home with her, at infant school I would come home for lunch just for a bit of extra time with her... Eventually she got a job as a Special Needs Assistant at Worting Infant School and I was utterly thrilled that she would be at school with me too! It's fair to say I was a mummy's girl.

Mum working in a school was a slight deviation from what she trained for. After completing an English and French degree at Essex University, she went on to train to be a librarian in London, where she met my Dad. Their love of books has filtered down to all of us; all the grandchildren are keen readers and love to spend their time with their nose in a book. Mum and Dad collected so many books, when they moved they quite literally had 'shed-fulls' of them!

Mum so enjoyed her job at Worting Infants, and loved working with the children and alongside colleagues who came to be life-long friends. She used to say that the children just thought of her as a big pal, and she confessed she was never the best at disciplining them! Mum always wanted to make her speech and language sessions with the children she worked with fun, and she would spend ages making individual games for children based on their likes and interests, as well as their needs. Mum really cared about making the children feel special and wanted them to enjoy their learning, as well as making steps forward through any speech difficulties they had.

Mum was a wonderful artist and loved to draw and paint. She especially loved to draw Teddies, and I remember for a while she used to make teddy greetings cards that were sold at a Teddy Bear Museum in Petersfield. Mum could turn her hand to drawing pretty much anything, and her love of drawing and painting really inspired my sister. So much so Kathryn went on to college to study Art, and both Kathryn and my Mum continued to draw and paint all their lives. Not only was mum creative with a paintbrush, she was also very creative with words. She wrote many articles for the Book and Magazine Collector magazine, mostly biographies of famous children's authors. She was especially proud when the authors themselves took time to write to her; we have letters of thanks from Raymond Briggs, Shirley Hughes and Jaqueline Wilson to name a few.

My mum was an avid collector of many things over her lifetime – from Teddies, to books, to ceramics to antiques... once she got an interest in something she really saw it through to the end! Mum managed to get me my first job in the local china shop, as I had said I wanted a Saturday job. While I'm sure her asking on my behalf was an act of motherly love, this particular job came with a good discount on the things in store – one that she took full advantage of! Edward is still dealing with the collections now!

Many people have shared memories of Mum with me, for which I am very grateful. Everybody who has, has mentioned her beautiful smile. Mum had a smile for everyone, and it was warm and genuine. She made friends wherever she went; I remember as a child a walk to the corner shop would take ages as we would stop and chat to neighbours on the way down the road! Only a few years ago Mum said she was going out for a cup of tea with someone she'd met and got talking to at the bus stop!

And she had so many wonderful and caring friends that she met here, in this very church. All her friends meant so much to her – going for a catch up over a cup of tea and a nice slice of cake was one of her ultimate pleasures. Once mum made a friend, she knew how special they were and kept hold of them. Mum was always loyal, happy to chat, a great listener and had a ready laugh. I know many people here will remember her as quiet, gentle and mild in her nature – but she also had a great sense of humour and loved a laugh, especially at anything a little bit naughty.

All throughout my childhood, teens and adulthood, she had such belief in me and cheered me on every step of the way. Her unconditional love, words of encouragement and never-ending support has given me an inner strength and belief in myself. As a Mum she is a role model that I aspire to be like for my children. I am so thankful to her for making me who I am today and teaching me that kindness, above all, is the best quality you can have.

The last few years have been hard, with Alzheimer's taking over my mum's personality bit by bit. The mum I grew up with had changed. But her love for her family never did. I was with mum when she died and it felt right and beautiful that while she was there at my beginning, I was there at her end.

Mum, your love, smiles and support was unwavering, even in your final years and days. You will be missed so much. I hope you are now at peace, and once again with Dad and Kathryn. I will end now with the words of one of your favourite teddy bears, Winnie the Pooh, who sums up how I feel perfectly: "How lucky I am to have something that makes saying goodbye so hard".

Canon Paul Hardingham Considers what the Resurrection Achieved.

Christian Basics: What about the Resurrection? (Parish Pump)

'Easter is not primarily a comfort, but a challenge. Its message is either the supreme fact in history or else a gigantic hoax.' (CS Lewis).

As we celebrate another Easter, what is the significance of Jesus' resurrection for us? As Paul writes, 'if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins'. (1 Cor 15:17). What does the New Testament affirm about the resurrection? It affirms that Jesus' death on the cross was not a defeat but a **victory** over sin, death and Satan, in which we share. 'But God raised Him from the dead, freeing Him from the agony of death, because it was impossible for death to keep its hold on Him' (Acts 2:24).

It points to our own **bodily resurrection** after death, 'The body that is sown is perishable, it is raised imperishable' (1 Cor 15: 42). It guarantees the **forgiveness** of our sins, 'if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins' (1 Cor 15:17). It ensures that we can know the reality of His **risen life** today, 'just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life' (Rom 6:4). The story is told of Russia under the Communist regime. A member of the Communist Party addressed a packed audience at length, seeking to discredit the resurrection of Christ. At the end an Orthodox Priest rose and asked if he might reply. He was warned that he only had five minutes. 'Five seconds is all I need!' He turned to the audience and gave the traditional Easter greeting: 'Christ is risen!' Back with a deafening roar came the traditional reply: 'He is risen indeed!'



#### SAD NEWS FOR OUR RECYCLING

In the next month or so we are going to lose two of our recycling collections.

After 31 March we will no longer be able to collect the Baby Food Pouches and Kids Yoghurt Pouches. We have been collecting these since 2016. It was slow to get started but has been increasing over the years and each shipment generates between £10 and £12.

Our biggest loss will be the Crisp Collection, closing on 25 April. This has only been running since March 2019 but has brought in over £300. We collect more crisp packets than any other item.

The reason given for closing these recyclable collections is that Supermarkets are now running their own recycling schemes. That is good news for the planet but not for our charity and I am very sad that we will not have as much to give to 'Pillars'.

However, we are still collecting cake and biscuit wrappers, flexible packaging bags used for dishwasher tabs and detergent capsules, packaging of household wipes like Flash or the anti-bacterial ones, plastic air fresheners, tinted fabric conditioner bottles or the tinted plastic boxes used for home cleaning products. So do please continue to support our scheme by recycling these with us.







Mary Magdalene stayed by the tomb, crying. She didn't understand that Tesus was no longer dead. When she looked in the tomb there were 2 angels.




