Dear Friends,

Seeing with New Eyes

I have sometimes been privileged to listen to people who have had a cataract operation and they will frequently tell me that they now see much more clearly and that colours are much more vivid than before, and, sometimes, they say that they no longer need to wear glasses. It must be wonderful to see with new eyes.

Sometimes people who come new to an area or to a workplace can see clearly what others, who have been in place much longer, may no longer notice. Their ability to see with new eyes brings an objectivity to a situation that might have been missing before, and their observations contain a challenge to the rest of us to look afresh and see things from another angle.

Some great scientific breakthroughs have come about by seeing in a different way-making connections that may not have been made before, noticing what is in front of us and seeing it afresh. Alexander Fleming's discovery of penicillin came about when he looked again and noticed with new eyes what had been beside him in the room in which he was sitting.

It is easy for all of us to get into ruts which confirm our prejudices. It is easy to go along with the tram lines which we have set as perimeters of our vision.

Some of the people who have helped us most in life have been those whose challenge and encouragement has helped us to see with new eyes. They may have been family members, teachers, work colleagues, or people whose thinking we've come across in a book or magazine.

The season of Lent will soon be upon us, moving into the glorious season of Easter. Both Lent, and Easter are radically and dynamically about seeing with new eyes, approaching life with surprise and freshness, constantly learning, continually growing as people, marvelling at the extraordinary in the ordinary, watching horizons expand.

Are we open to seeing with new eyes, pursuing fresh adventures, and discovering different insights?

In 1643, the Houses of Parliament in England abolished the Episcopal system of government in the Church of England. World Day of Prayer (EWNI)

As a single World Day of Prayer organisation, the three voices of England, Wales and Northern Ireland, have come together to present this year's service, recognising our differences but also our common ground.

Currently, the WDP National Committee includes 17 different Christian denominations. We allocate over 40 grants to national and international charities. We support prayer partners in Albania, sending representatives to visit the WDP in Albania on a regular basis. We continue to review what we do and to adapt to changes in communication and technology.

Our office in Tunbridge Wells co-ordinates the distribution of service materials, including activities for children and youth and our website carries news of all we do. We also post on Twitter and Facebook and have been delighted with the number of 'hits' we get.

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Crochet Pattern - You will need:

- DK / Light worsted weight yarn in pink and white (or any yarn in any colour really)
- 3 mm Crochet hook (or any hook size that is suitable for the yarn you are using)
- Some toy stuffing or yarn scraps for stuffing
- Yarn needle and scissors

This pattern is in US terminology – Terminology Guide below:

sl st = slip stitch sc = single crochet

ch(s) = chain(s) hdc = half double crochet

ea = each dc = double crochet

sk = skip

Heart Pattern (make twice)

Round 1

Using P, ch4, sl st in 1st ch to form a loop, ch2, [1hdc, 2sc, 1hdc, 2dc, sl st, 2dc, 1hdc, 2sc, 1hdc] in loop, sl st in top of ch2 to join - (14).

Round 2

Ch2, [1hdc, 1sc] in next st, 1sc in next 2 sts, 1hdc in next st, 3dc in next st, 1dc in next st, sl st in next st, 1dc in next st, 3dc in next st, 1hdc in next st, 1sc in next 2 sts, [1sc, 1hdc] in last st, sl st in top of ch2 to join - (20).

Round 3

Ch2, [1hdc, 1sc] in next st, 1sc in next 4 sts, 1hdc in next st, 2dc in next 2 sts, 1dc in next st, sl st in next st, 1dc in next st, 2dc in next 2 sts, 1hdc in next st, 1sc in next 4 sts, [1sc, 1hdc] in last st, sl st in top of ch2 to join - (26).

Round 4

Ch2, [1hdc, 1sc] in next st, 1sc in next 6 sts, 1hdc in next st, 2dc in next 3 sts, 1dc in next st, sl st in next st, 1dc in next st, 2dc in next 3 sts, 1hdc in next st, 1sc in next 6 sts, [1sc, 1hdc] in last st, sl st in top of ch2 to join - (34).

Round 5

Ch2, [1hdc, 1sc] in next st, 1sc in next 8 sts, 1hdc in next st, 2dc in next 5 sts, 1dc in next st, sl st in next st, 1dc in next st, 2dc in next 5 sts, 1hdc in next st, 1sc in next 8 sts, [1sc, 1hdc] in last st, sl st in top of ch2 to join - (46).

Fasten off and repeat rounds for second heart.

Edging

Round 1

Joining W in same st as last sl st on both hearts, ch1, joining each heart edge as you go crochet: 1sc in ea st along to previous increase (on heart curve), *2sc in next st, 1sc in next

Crochet Pattern, cont'd.....

Edging: Round 1 (cont'd)

st* repeat 5 times, 1sc in ea st along to next previous increase (on second curve - don't forget the sl st in the centre, it can be small), *2sc in next st, 1sc in next st* repeat 5 times, 1sc in ea st along to end but leave a small hole for stuffing, stuff your heart and sl st in ch1 to join.

Round 2

Ch3, sl st in same st below chs, sl st in next 2 sts repeat from * to * until end, fasten off and tie in all tails.

"Would you go to these lengths to sit in your seat?"

In 1884 there was a dispute over pew no. 3 in Chew Stoke Church.

Two families claimed sole rights to use it. A letter from the Bishop of Bath & Wells stated that 'no house in a parish has a right to a particular pew, unless by faculty'. The matter went to the Temple Cloud petty sessions where the magistrates imposed a fine of £2 10s with £2 8s 6d costs on the main defendants who had been accused of 'indecent behaviour' by climbing over the back of pews to gain access to the pew denied to them. There was a threat of 2 months in gaol if the fines were not paid and that, should there be a reoccurrence, the penalty would be gaol and not a fine. (Western Daily Press Wed 5 Nov 1884 p7, Bristol Mercury Wed 5 Nov 1884 p3).

The issue arose again in 1889 with an alleged assault by the previous defendants on the son of the Rector of Chew Stoke. The case 'has excited a great deal of interest in the neighbourhood, this being evident from the crowded attendance at the courthouse' (*Bristol Mercury* Sat Sep 1889 p19).

- (1) ½ lb. JUDGES chap. 5 verse 25
- (2) ½ 1b. JEREMIAH chap. 6 verse 20
- (3) 1 tablesp. 1st SAMUEL chap.14 verse 25
- (4) 3 JEREMIAH chap. 17 verse 11
- (5) 1b. 1st SAMUEL chap. 30 verse 12
- (6) ½ lb. NAHUM chap. 3 verse 12 (chopped)
- (7) 2 ozs. NUMBERS chap. 17 verse 8 (blanched and chopped)
- (8) I lb. 1st KINGS chap. 4 verse 22
- (9) Season to taste with 2nd CHRONICLES chap.9 verse 9
- (10) 1 pinch LEVITICUS chap. 2 verse 13
- (11) 1 teasp. AMOS chap. 4 verse 5

METHOD

Follow SOLOMON'S prescriptions for making a good boy.

PROVERBS 23 verse 13 and you will have a good cake.

Beat 1, 2 and 3 to a cream, add 4 -one at a time still beating. Then add 5, 6 and 7 and beat again.

Next add 8, 9,10 and 11, having previously mixed them. Last of all, add 12.

Bake in a rather slow oven for not less than an hour and a half (One of the ingredients is figs. Raisins may be substituted if liked).

Dear Revd Andrew de Ville,

I write in response to a number of postcards sent in by members of the public, on behalf of the Southampton District Methodist Church, in relation to COP26.

The Government is proud to have hosted this year's conference, which brought together tens of thousands of delegates from nearly 200 countries for the biggest summit the UK has ever hosted.

197 Parties succeeded in keeping the ambition to limit temperature rises to 1.5°C alive by agreeing to the <u>Glasgow Climate Pact</u>, which will speed up the pace of climate action this decade. All countries agreed to return improved emissions targets for 2030 next year, three years earlier than planned.

Together, huge progress has been made on coal, cars, cash and trees – areas the UK has already shown high ambition in. The Government's Clean Green Initiative will unlock trillions of pounds of private finance into clean green infrastructure so emerging economies can grow rapidly without relying on fossil fuels – modelling our new partnership to support South Africa's efforts.

Provided there is concerted effort and dedicated delivery by all countries, the combination of net zero targets, 2030 emission targets, and agreed action in key industries brought to the table will significantly reduce emissions by 2030.

After years of wrangling, the Paris Rulebook was finalised, which will keep us on track, so we measure and report in the same way. The Government has delivered the Paris Agreement, is delivering the start of its global green industrial revolution, and will use the year of the UK's Presidency to ensure countries deliver on their commitments.

I would like to thank your supporters for taking the time to write to the Cabinet Office on this important matter.

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Remembering Jill

Jill was born in London on 24th December 1932. The second eldest of five children she always spoke of a happy childhood. Even when war broke out and the family were evacuated to Worcester where her grandparents lived. Jill would always tell us lots of stories of all the happy times they had there.

In 1950 her father sadly died at the age of 42. Leaving her mother with five children, the youngest her brother Geoff who was only 4 years old. Jill would speak fondly of helping to look after him for her mother.

There was also support from the Royal British Legion as her father had served in the war. They helped out with food and paid bills which she never forgot and told us how grateful they were.



Jill had a love of the outdoors and enjoyed many happy times cycling all over the country staying in Youth Hostels. This is where she met our father John and they married in a local Methodist Church in Surrey on the 3rd May 1958.

After moving to a bungalow on the Berg Estate in Basingstoke the girls were born and in 1964 they moved to Portacre Rise.

Christine and Janet recall a very happy childhood, with Jill always being around for them. She loved gardening and cooking and they remember picking lots of different fruits she grew so she could make her delicious puddings and cakes.

Holidays always held a lot of happy memories with yearly trips to the Isle of Wight with extended family. They also enjoyed camping with Jill producing amazing meals with her pressure cooker on a small two ring camping stove, The family travelled all over the country often combining the holiday with catching up with her siblings which was so important to her. One of her favourite places to visit was Scotland with its beautiful scenery and unspoilt beaches. They recall a few occasions when the weather turned bad, both Jill despite her small stature and John holding onto the frame of the tent to stop it being blown away. This however never put her off going and loved pitching the tent sometimes in the remotest of places.

Jill was very involved in the Methodist church on Sarum Hill in Basingstoke. For many years she helped run the Sunday school. Making many friends there Trinity was a big part of her life and even when she was unable to attend the services she enjoyed reading the news letters.

Her love of children continued in her working life. Starting out as a dinner lady in the late 1960's at the local school in the road where she lived, Kings Furlong. A couple of years later working in the office in both the Junior and then Infants for over 25 very happy years. She loved to ride her bike there and around Basingstoke wearing one of the many hats she had.

As the girls grew older Janet recalls coming home from trips with the Venture Scouts, usually soaking wet and covered in mud, Jill would be there washing machine at the ready and a hot meal. Janet left home at 18, but Jill always reminded her that she returned home 9 times until the age of 35. However there was always a warm welcome, a bed and food on the table on these occasions.




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Eulogy for Terry Ayres

We stand at the beginning of another year. What will it hold for each one of us? In his poem '*The road not taken,*' the poet Robert Frost, writes of a decision, which metaphorically is like a road. We can only travel one road and might



sometimes wonder how different life would have been had we made an alternative choice.

A traveller was standing at the crossroads. Taking a stick. He threw it many times into the air. And watched its fall. An onlooker asked, 'Why are you doing that'? The traveller replied, 'It isn't falling the way I want to go.'

Life is like that, and we can be torn with indecision. We want to make the right choice. To take the right road, but we are afraid of getting it wrong.

Sitting in Trinity just before Christmas, I looked at the reflection of the cross on the wall, behind. It looks like a signpost. There are two directional arms. There is no difference in the length, and it seemed to me, that either would help a wayfarer. Being over the years a walker in the countryside, such wayside direction posts, have been very useful, and I have been grateful to see them. They have prevented many an error in my minimal map reading.

There in Trinity they are also the shadow of the Cross, which is a wonderful thought. Coming back to the poem, Robert Frost ends his poem, 'Two roads diverged in a wood and I – I took the one less travelled by, and that has made all the difference.' We have to make a choice, and that can present a dilemma. Isaiah, Chapter 30, urges us to listen to God's voice: 'This is the way, walk in it,'

At the start of another year, with all its possibilities, concerns, and yes, its joys too, innumerable questions will arise. Jesus says in John's Gospel: 'I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life' (KJV). 'I am the Light of the world, he that followeth me, shall not walk in darkness.' (KJV)

Real joy is knowing every day we can experience the companionship of Jesus on our journey, and He knows the way that we take. We just have to trust Him for the days ahead.

Eastrop Park (local news)

Eastrop Park has always been and still is a great favourite of ours as a family, and especially when the girls were young, from when we first moved to Basingstoke well over 30 years ago, so it saddened us to see the news last Summer that Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council were going to start charging for the two car parks. We found out that this had already been agreed, with the proposed charges being:

£1.10 – 1 hr; £2.20 – 2 hrs; £3.20 – 3 hrs; £4.30 – 4 hrs & £12.80 for over 4 hrs. Charges applying 8 am until 7 pm Monday to Sunday with Evening charges of £2.20, applicable 24 hrs a day,7 days a week.

Many people put in objections and we, like many others, were told it was all done and dusted! We wondered if this would be the *'thin edge of the wedge'* with other parks following suit!

But common sense has prevailed and we recently had an email from Becky Poulter, Engineer at Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council telling us that a new tariff of charges is now under discussion and these are:

£1 for up to 2 hrs; £2 for 2 to 4 hrs; £4 for 4 to 6 hrs & £7 for 6 to 8 hrs; £8 for over 8 hrs; £2 for an Evening / Overnight charge.

It's still a shame and sad to think that folk will have to pay to visit this beautiful park with the lakes, stream, swans, ducks, paddling pool, play area, outdoor café area etc, but a definite improvement on the original charges. In the summer many families with young children spend most of the day there and often it's hard to find a space to park in.

The Day the Vicar Locked the Council out of St Michael's Church

Basingstoke made headlines in the national and provincial press in 1907 when the Vicar of Basingstoke, Revd Boustead, sent an intemperate letter to the town clerk. He told the clerk that the Mayor and Corporation and the police, fire brigade and other public and voluntary bodies would not be welcome to hold the annual Civic Service in the Parish Church if they intended, in line with tradition, to hold a similar service in one of the nonconformist churches. He said that such an action would, 'degrade God's Church to the level of one of the 350 man-made sects'.

Revd Boustead's letter was reprinted with a brief introduction in dozens of provincial newspapers from the Cornishman to the Aberdeen Press and Journal under various headlines, including 'Strange Situation at Basingstoke', 'Mockery of Religion', 'Not wanted at Church' and 'Another Clerical Bigot'.

The Mayor decided not to hold the Civic Service in the Parish Church. However, the following year he decided that the custom of the Civic Service should continue, but when the procession reached the church, the Vicar had locked the church door.





2021 in Numbers

Patrols resumed towards the end of May. Between them 21 Street Pastors carried out 121 patrols in teams of 3 or 4 across 36 evenings. In total 77 vulnerable people were helped and 45 aggressive situations were calmed. Practical help was offered in a variety of ways. The highlights being that over 350 glasses and bottles were picked up to mitigate against broken glass hazard, nearly 120 pairs of flip flops were given to women with bare feet and almost 100 people were given water or a hot drink. During our encounters with people on the streets 16 led to conversations about faith and 18 led to prayers being said for individuals. There were 10 answers to prayer so far as we know.

Prayer Points

- Pray for our teams going out on patrol to be able to serve the public and venue staff well by demonstrating the love of Jesus to them. Pray that they will be kept safe, especially during this ongoing pandemic.
- Give thanks for the faithfulness of all our Street Pastors and Prayer Pastors. Please pray
 for people to volunteer to fill the gaps by those who have retired from the team. We are
 looking for 10 new Street Pastors and a similar number of Prayer Pastors.
- We are looking for a new Chaplain and additional trustees to help support and manage the team of volunteers. Please pray God will guide us to the people he has planned for these roles.
- Give thanks to God for his financial provision for Basingstoke Street Pastors. Please pray
 that we will continue to receive all the funding we need to operate in the coming year.
 Please pray that the Hampshire Police and Crime Commissioner will continue to look
 favourably on our grant applications.

ministry. We are so grateful for the dozens of people who have volunteered faithfully for so many years and continue to do so. However, we also recognise that there comes a point for every volunteer when they need to retire. During lockdown we have heard from a few of our splendid Street Pastors that it is time to hang up their boots and make way for fresh faces in the team. So, if you are reading this and have been wondering whether this might be a calling for you, please get in touch, we would love to explore this idea with you.

A really good place to start is to join one of our teams for an evening and see what happens first-hand. We are confident that you will be pleasantly surprised by how enjoyable and rewarding this ministry is. We will not pretend that it is always glamorous, and it certainly has its yucky moments. However, the warmth of the welcome we receive from the public and from the venue staff more than make up for that. Plus, knowing that we are where Jesus would be and showing his love to people in danger or distress brings an eternal reward.

As well as volunteers to go out on the street as Street Pastors, we also have vacancies for people willing to be Prayer Pastors and pray for us while we patrol. Street Pastors and Prayer Pastors connect at the start of the evening to pray using a WhatsApp video call. Then during the evening, the team will send in updates and prayer requests for the Prayer Pastor.

Donations

Although we keep our overheads as low as we possibly can, Basingstoke Street Pastors has an annual budget of around £10,000. This money goes towards the costs of training new Pastors and providing them with a uniform. We also must purchase PPE, along with flip flops, lollipops, water and safety blankets to share with people we meet. We have an annual subscription to Ascension Trust who oversee the work and provide insurance cover. Finally, there are staff admin costs.

God has been good in providing the finances we need from various sources, however we are pleased to give you an opportunity to partner with us by making either a one-off donation or making a regular gift. Chaplaincy Prayer Letter – Winter 2021

Everyone at the Chaplaincy is grateful for your support as we continue to reach out to people in the name of Jesus.

The more stable conditions have enabled us to renew contacts in shops around the town and at Asda in Brighton Hill. Generally staff changes have been extensive; Chaplains often meet people they know who are now working in different shops, and although there are still many empty premises the shops are now actively recruiting sales staff. But varied and often long hours, covering for absent colleagues, pressures at home etc, have all added considerable stresses and strains to shop workers, and we have often been able to speak into these situations, offering words of encouragement and hope.

In the Courts not all cases are heard in person, but a Chaplain is present most mornings to talk with staff, members of the legal teams and those called to attend.

At the Police Investigation Centre (PIC) our Chaplain has been involved in helping people come to terms with the shock and distress caused by being involved in tragic and distressing situations. Occasionally, we have been able to support the police on the street too.

We now have two Chaplains at the Bus Station, who are valued by management as well as the staff. We have been asked to expand the service to other bus stations and are working with others to facilitate that.

On Remembrance Day we conducted a short service for people in a care home and had the opportunity to sit and talk with some residents in an informal way.

Chaplains were also present at the Remembrance parade in the town centre and attended the short service at the War Memorial.

We also have links with the Youth Café in London Road and with The Safe.

We are thankful for all the financial support we get, from regular donors, Churches and through grants. We recently received funds to buy Christmas cards and distributed them, along with a token gift (chocolate!) during Advent.

Throughout Covid-19 we have maintained our number of Chaplains; some have left, we have welcomed some new people and some have been ill or needing to isolate, but God has seen us through! We would welcome the opportunity to talk to anyone about the possibility of joining us, even for just a couple of hours a fortnight. And we also appreciate the prayers of many more people and of churches as we continue this ministry of outreach. Next year we hope to participate in the Basingstoke Movement for Recovery, joining with Christians across the churches to serve the people of Basingstoke and to witness to God's love and desire for reconciliation.

As people see different groups of Christians joining together to serve others we add to our witness of God's love and grace towards all people. The message of the angels at Christmas is an all-year message which we carry – *Peace on earth, goodwill to all people.*

News from Karibuni

We recently had a letter from Karibuni, telling us about a young man called Wycliffe. When children aged 3 and 4, are initially sponsored by Karibuni to go to Nursery school, there is the prospect that their education will take them from Nursery to Primary and Secondary school, followed by up to 4 years of further education at University, College or Polytechnic. That can involve Karibuni's support for up to nineteen years.

In 1998, just 3 years after Karibuni Children was founded, Karibuni agreed to sponsor a little boy called Wycliffe, who was growing up in Kibra, the largest slum in Africa. He ended up studying for a diploma in Community and Public Health and in a letter to the Karibuni Children Trustees in 2017, he wrote:

"I want to let you know how much I appreciate your support throughout my studies. Just the other day I was thinking of being me without the project. I figured how much your support has been worth to me. Growing up in a slum was one of the worst things that anyone would ever wish due to its harsh environment; but through Karibuni I got the courage to move step by step hoping that one day I would have a brighter future.

Karibuni has impacted so many lives, not only me, and each one of us has a story to tell. For more than 18 years I have been in the project. I have always appreciated every bit of it from meals, clothing and everything. At times the only meal that kept me moving was from the project; my parents could barely afford our daily meals.

I do not know how best to thank you, but I am grateful."

Wycliffe subsequently went on to finish his course and, following work elsewhere, last year he successfully applied for the post of Deputy Project Manager at Kibra. So he has gone full circle: having himself benefited from Karibuni's support he is now working with sponsored children in our largest partner project.

That story serves to show how our long investment in children like Wycliffe can pay off. Every year we take new little girls and boys into sponsorship, trusting that there will be sufficient income to pay for their education for years to come.



RECYCLING UPDATE WE STILL NEED YOUR RECYCLING!



The recycling is going well and at the end of October I redeemed £90 from TerraCycle. We have now raised just over £1,000 with this scheme. The biggest collection is nearly always the crisp packets, which is not surprising since it is quicker to eat a bag of crisps compared to a packet of biscuits! I need a minimum of 8kg of crisp wrappers before I can send them off and I usually manage to send in a shipment every month. Biscuit wrappers tend to take slightly longer even though I only need 5kg. The collection of baby food pouches and kids' yoghurt pouches was slow to begin with but is picking up now although it takes several hundred to comply with the minimum weight of 8kg. Keep them coming!

The slowest collection is the Air and home collection so we really could do with boosting this. Do you get your dishwasher tablets or detergent in those flexible packaging bags?

How about the packaging of household wipes like Flash or the anti-bacterial ones? If so, pop them in the bin and we can recycle them. Other items like plastic air fresheners, tinted fabric conditioner bottles or the tinted boxes, even used tumble dryer softener sheets can all be recycled. If in doubt just ask me or check the labels on the bins.

Loved Nonetheless

Here is a thought on a verse of Scripture from the encounter of Jesus with a man described as a 'rich, young ruler'. This man was keen to follow Jesus, but when told he must share his wealth with the poor decided it was too much to ask, and he went away sorrowful. In this context we read that, "Jesus, looking at him loved him (Mark 10:21)."

This is a remarkable statement about Jesus, and the nature of divine love, a love that doesn't alter despite the ups and downs of our behaviour. It is constant and unchanging, truly without condition, and unshaken by the unpredictability of human response. We might have expected to hear Jesus say, 'You foolish man' or 'You stupid boy', but there is no such rebuke, only love. Jesus might have been annoyed, disappointed, exasperated, alarmed, shocked but all we feel is His love for someone who has missed a great opportunity.

What a joy it is to know that Jesus loves us exactly as we are. When He looks at us, nothing is hidden from His gaze. He sees through all our pretence, all our subterfuge, all our attempts to put on a brave front. He knows who I am, completely. And yet He loves me unreservedly and without reservation. Amazing.

Why walk away from a love like that?

More than conquerors: In the depth of the sea! (Micah 7:19)

The Bible is very expressive when it comes to speaking about how God can forgive our sins. It uses many descriptions to tell us how our sins are both forgiven and forgotten.

Here is a sample of these great promises. Our sins are 'forgiven,' (Ps. 32:5); 'washed thoroughly' and 'blotted out' (Ps. 51:2, 9); 'forgiven and covered' (Ps. 85:2); 'washed whiter than snow' (Is. 1:18); 'taken away' (Is. 6:7); 'put behind His back' (Is. 38:17); 'laid on Him' (Is. 53:6); 'remembered no more' (Jer. 31:34); 'pardoned' (Jer. 33:8); 'destroyed' (Rom. 6:6); 'purged' (Heb. 1:3)' 'borne for us' (1 Pet. 2:24); 'washed away' (Rev. 1:5).

What glorious news this is! In Christ we are truly forgiven! Our sins are cancelled! God will not hold our guilty past against us!

The prophet Micah has a very dramatic way of telling us this. He says that God has cast our sins 'into the depths of the sea' (7:19). So how deep is the sea? Far out in the Western Pacific Ocean, two hundred miles from the island of Guam, lies the deepest part of the earth's oceans. It is called the Mariana Trench. It is more than 1500 miles long and over 40 miles wide but it is its depth that is awesome. It plunges down into the ocean bed for some 35,800 feet. By comparison, Everest, the world's highest mountain, is 29,000 feet in height. That means that the Mariana Trench goes lower into the ocean bed than the peak of Everest stretches up to the clouds. At that frightening depth the pressure from the waters above is more than eight tons to the square inch!

While these geographical facts and figures compel our attention, the theology of our forgiveness is even more wonderful! When we are 'in Christ' as His redeemed people, our sins are truly forgiven. God has thrown them into the depth of the sea, never to be resurrected! They are buried forever in the vast abyss of God's unfathomable love and mercy. What great, good news the gospel brings! Our guilty past is both forgiven and forgotten!

A few months after his evangelical conversion in May 1738, John Wesley went to Herrnhut in Germany. He met the Moravian hymn writer Johann Andreas Rothe. Wesley had learned German and enjoyed singing the Moravian hymns. He translated many of them into English, including one of Rothe's great hymns that includes the lines:

O Love, Thou bottomless abyss, My sins are swallowed up in Thee Covered is my unrighteousness, Nor spot of guilt remains on me. While Jesu's blood through earth and skies, Mercy, free boundless mercy, cries.
