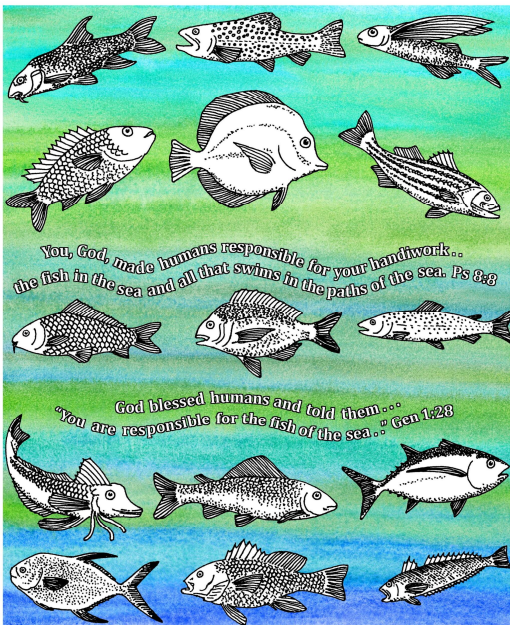

Dear Friends,

Times of Transition

We are going through times of transition.

- as a **Monarchy** - during the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations, when the Queen stood on Buckingham Palace's balcony, alongside her were the likely next three monarchs and there was a growing sense of awareness that her Majesty's long reign will be coming to an end.

- as a **Nation** - as soon as the Jubilee ended a vote of confidence by members of his own party saw 41% of them registering a vote of no confidence in the Prime Minister and we wonder how long he will still be leading us.

- as a **Church** - the opportunity for Rev Dr Ruth Midcalf to pursue another form of ministry means a change of Superintendent and a shortage of ordained ministers in our Circuit. This already impacts upon one part of our Circuit and could affect other areas too.

- and there may be other transitions of a **personal** nature around different parts of our lives - from health concerns, to moving house; from a change of career to retirement; and possibly many other life changes too.

So how do we live through such transition times?

What might help us in facing these times?

If we can recognize the times of transition which are already happening, as well as those which could be happening soon, it helps to deepen our awareness, to come to terms with change, to accept and to prepare as best we can.

It will be good to look expectantly for the creative opportunities that are likely to emerge from the transitional times.

In the Gospels we find Jesus frequently reflects prayerfully at such moments - after his baptism, within the wilderness, after his first day of healing others, after John the Baptist is put in prison, and after John has been killed. There will be many other moments too - after feeding a huge crowd, and the momentous struggle in Gethsemane.

Reflecting prayerfully in life's moments of transition will be hugely helpful to us.

In all things we can trust in God's continuing presence, encouragement, empowerment and guidance. The God of our past and present goes with us into our future.

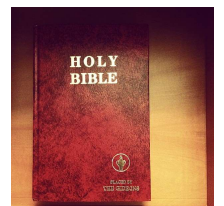

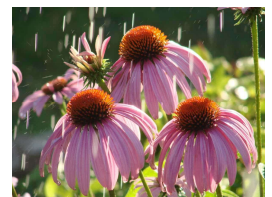

PSALM 31 AND UKRAINE CHRISTIANS

Excerpt from Premier Christian News

People in Ukraine are turning to Psalm 31 to bring them hope and comfort as they shelter in bunkers in fear of their lives.

Bible Society has worked in Ukraine for the last 30 years, translating and distributing Bibles. Its Director of International, Oldi Morava has been speaking to Premier about the current situation.

“Our dear colleagues are still working in Kyiv, where they have their headquarters. They are working very closely with a number of local churches and Christian organisations to distribute food and medicine, but also to distribute the Bible and especially Children's Bibles, as they go from one shelter to another.

They have noticed that during this particularly difficult time, many people want to find strength and rest, but also comfort in their faith and in God's word. They're finding it particularly inspiring.

“They're reading the Book of Psalms for their own particular context. One of the Psalms that is becoming almost a Psalm for the whole of Ukraine is Psalm 31. (*Very relevant, worth a read*).

“I would encourage everyone to read that, but read it from the perspective of young people, children and elderly people reading it in shelters, reading it in fear and the anxiety that they're experiencing, and see what those words actually mean to them.”

Christians across Ukraine have been continuing to distribute Bibles and resources to as many people as possible despite the dangers.

John Chamberlain from Mission Without Borders has been in contact overnight with one of the group's workers, Volodia in Ukraine. Despite the size of the invading army, he tells Premier Volodia, confident faith can play a big part in defeating the Russian armed forces.

“They've started a full-scale war and we Christians have started a full-scale prayer. They are 150,000 and we are 2.5 billion Christians all over the world. Guess who is going to be victorious.”

Oldi Morava agrees and says there is a real sense of the world uniting in prayer at this time.

“What people in Ukraine have also experienced is this sense of unity amongst themselves and all the churches of different traditions, praying for their own people, praying for their country, but also a huge sense of solidarity around the world, from different church traditions and faiths praying for peace in Ukraine.

“I urge people to continue to pray for peace, especially for the leaders of various parties who are having to take important decisions that the Lord will change their heart and mind and they will change their plans – and those plans will be a plan for peace.

“It can feel that things are getting worse, but we need to hold fast to our faith that God is the Lord of history, and he is the one who can bring change beyond our imagination. So please pray for that.”

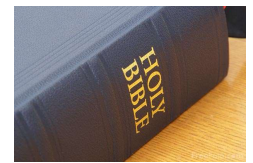

**War in Ukraine:
Appeal for more Bibles**

The Bible Society is appealing for funds to send more Bibles to Ukraine. It says that Christians in the UK “*can speak hope*” into the crisis by providing Ukrainian pastors and churches with more Bibles with which to share “the love and power of God’s Word.”

Oleksandr, who leads the Bible Society team in Ukraine, tells the story: “A few days ago, a pastor visited our office, asking for Bibles. When he heard that we had none left, he pleaded for Bibles that were damaged or even copies with pages missing. He said,

‘These Bibles would be of immense value to my congregation and the community!’ It was heart-breaking. “God’s Word can help bring comfort, peace, and reconciliation to our nation. We long for more Bibles.”

The Hymn Society

Some thirty years ago, I joined the Hymn Society of Great Britain and Northern Ireland. This is, a Christian ecumenical society, concerned with hymn writing, and the marriage of music with words, given by talented linguists and musicians, to the glory of God.



Some may remember the celebration of the Society's 75th Anniversary, when a Festival of Hymns was held in Basingstoke. This brought together, Christians from all the churches. It was held in the URC, on a very hot afternoon in July 2011. Organised by a small committee, headed by Hannah Williams, and Di Ogborn, supported by Basingstoke Male Voice Choir. A prominent member of the Society came to share the occasion.

The church was full, and the singing amazing. That particular year, was significant for the Society. Hymn Festivals were held through the UK and I am pleased Basingstoke was chosen for one.

Every year the Society holds a conference, which attracts members from far and wide. Different aspects of hymnody are discussed, and singing is a vital part of the sharing together.

What is the value of the Hymn Society? Individual members would answer differently, and perhaps the Society's web site would give a bigger picture. For me, a non-musician, and a person not particularly schooled as much as some, its appeal is ecumenism of Christian faith and practice. The faith demonstrated among the members and the joy of singing in praise to God, is wonderful and cannot be overstated.

We have come by many different paths, and our unity is confirmed in the Cross. It is a joy to know many hymn writers of our present generation personally.

Some of us started with 'Gentle Jesus meek and mild' and as our faith has grown, led by the Holy Spirit, we have moved to more challenging words. The hymns, songs, refrains, choruses, we learnt stay in our memories, and are alive and present whenever we hear a tune or reference.

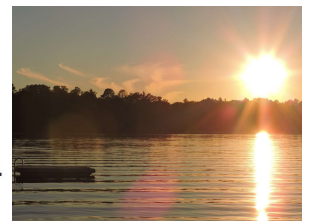
May we all experience that happening, as the years unfold.

WHY ON EARTH did Jesus come?

I recently picked up John Blanchard's pamphlet "Why On Earth did Jesus Come", an EP Books (Evangelical Press) publication. It is a fascinating read in 40 pages and gives a concise and accurate assessment of who Jesus is and why He came to the Earth. It also reviews and assesses who Mary was in the birth and upbringing of Jesus. It draws upon Bible references as the firm foundation for its conclusions and does not make unsubstantiated assumptions. I have given some of Blanchard's conclusions here as an appetiser to read his full account.

Simply put Blanchard concludes "Christ Jesus came into the World to save sinners. He came as a Saviour to solve our greatest problem. He alone can transform our lives by bringing them into a living relationship with God here and now. What is more he alone can ensure that we enjoy a future life in God's heavenly presence for ever."

On the subject of Mary, Blanchard refers to the "mistaken ideas" made by some Christian Churches today that Mary was 'born without sin', namely the 'Immaculate Conception'. He writes that the Bible clearly identifies that "she was not born without sin". She was no different in this regard to us today. Mary herself confirmed this when she spoke of 'God my Saviour' in Luke 1:47.

He concludes "We can learn a great deal from Mary's example of piety, humility, and obedience, yet her contribution to the virgin conception of Jesus was simply to submit to the revealed will of God. She was clearly chosen to play a unique role in human history, but to go beyond that by worshipping her, treating her as a mediator between us and God, and believing that she can answer prayer is to go far beyond anything we are told in the Bible."

Well worth the read.

Further to Blanchard's conclusions regarding Mary, I am reminded of Paul's Letter to the Corinthians, 1 Co 3:10-15. Paul is giving a severe warning to the future leaders and builders of the Church that at the time of God's Judgment, the quality of each believer's work will be judged with fire. The work of some will survive the test, and they will be rewarded. The work of others will disappear, burned up by the fire of God's holy justice and judgement. "If it is burned up, he will suffer loss; he himself will be saved, but only as one escaping through the flames." (1 Co 3:15). Thus, emphasizing the importance of teaching the pure Word of God.

- 65 years ago, on 6 July 1957 John Lennon and Paul McCartney met for the first time at a church hall in Liverpool, where 16-year-old Lennon was performing with his skiffle group the Quarrymen. 15-year-old McCartney joined as a rhythm guitarist shortly afterwards, and the pair went on to form the Beatles.

- 15 years ago, on 1 July 2007 smoking was banned in all enclosed workspaces in England. Similar bans had already been introduced in Scotland (May 2006) and Wales (April 2007) and Northern Ireland (April 2007).

Sea Sunday by Canon Paul Hardingham (Parish Pump)

Over many years the 2nd Sunday of July has been kept as Sea Sunday, with a special focus on prayer for all seafarers. The Mission to Seafarers supports the work of sailors facing difficult waters, piracy, and separation from loved ones for long periods at sea.



However, we can also experience storms in our own lives. In Acts 27 we read how Paul was being taken as a prisoner to Rome, when he was caught in a storm off Crete. After 14 days they were shipwrecked on the island of Malta. Paul had warned the crew that it wasn't a safe time of year to sail: *"I can see that our voyage is going to be disastrous and bring great loss to ship and cargo, and to our own lives."* But his words were ignored, and the ship sailed into a violent storm. By the third day they *'finally gave up all hope of being saved'*. How do we face up to storms in our lives? Do we worry and panic? God doesn't necessarily prevent storms from taking place, but we can trust His purpose through them. Paul urged the sailors to *"keep courage, because not one of you will be lost, only the ship will be destroyed"*. His confidence rested on an angelic promise: *"Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you."* Only the sovereign God, who created the wind and waves, can promise to save people from a storm. What does this mean for us in our circumstances today?

'Through many dangers, toils and snares I have already come. Grace has brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home.' (Amazing Grace: John Newton)

Showers of Blessing by Lester Amann (Parish Pump)

According to British folklore, if it rains on 15 July, then we can expect 40 days of showery and stormy weather. This myth arose after the buried remains of St Swithun (Swithin) was removed from its original site in a church garden and taken into a Saxon cathedral. Swithun was an Anglo-Saxon Bishop of Winchester. During his decade in office, he was known for his devotion and passion to build new churches and to restore old ones. Before he died on 2 July 863 AD, he didn't want any veneration of his tomb and requested that his body be simply interred in the church grounds. He wanted people to pass by his grave and for it to be touched by the weather. So far so good. But – a century later, it was decided to move Swithun *inside*, into the refurbished basilica. From that day it rained every day for nearly six weeks – as if this was his displeasure at being moved!

The Bible mentions rain (and water) many times. These include the great flood and Noah's Ark (Genesis 7); Ezra's open-air public assembly in Jerusalem in the pouring rain (Ezra 10:9) and the parable by Jesus about two houses in a rainstorm (Matthew 7:24-27). Over the centuries, hymn writers have also used water and rain to describe our need for God. They've used such phrases as *I need Youlike refreshing summer rain* and *Father, like rain from the skies send Your word into our lives*. Some hymns include rain as a metaphor for the Holy Spirit to come and refresh, restore and revitalise us; to cleanse us of our sins or to wash away our sorrows. Here are two verses and the chorus from an old hymn written by Daniel W. Whittle (1840-1901) that reminds us that when overwhelmed with gloom and despair, God can and will pour new hope into our lives.

There shall be showers of blessing, this is the promise of love;
 There shall be seasons refreshing, sent from the Saviour above.
 There shall be showers of blessing, O that today they might fall,
 Now as to God we're confessing, now as on Jesus we call!
 Showers of blessing, showers of blessing we need;
 Mercy-drops round us are falling, but for the showers we plead.

Drought in East Africa (Parish Pump)

Extended drought is fuelling a hunger crisis in East Africa that has been called “one of the worst climate-induced emergencies in its history.” So warns the UN Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Co-ordinator, Martin Griffiths. Speaking recently, he said that an estimated 7.2million Ethiopians are already not getting enough to eat, and in Kenya half a million people are close to “catastrophic levels of hunger and malnutrition”. In South Sudan, floods and insecurity are pushing a further eight million people towards hunger and malnutrition.

Finn Church Aid, a Finnish NGO and a member of the global faith-based coalition Act Alliance, said that the crisis has been man-made. “The drought is because of climate change.” Meanwhile, the war in Ukraine has only aggravated the crisis. Grain prices are up by 45 per cent, and 90 per cent of the region’s wheat imports come from Russia and Ukraine. SAD NEWS FOR OUR RECYCLING



In the next month or so we are going to lose two of our recycling collections.

After 31 March we will no longer be able to collect the Baby Food Pouches and Kids Yoghurt Pouches. We have been collecting these since 2016. It was slow to get started but has been increasing over the years and each shipment generates between £10 and £12.

Our biggest loss will be the Crisp Collection, closing on 25 April. This has only been running since March 2019 but has brought in over £300. We collect more crisp packets than any other item.

The reason given for closing these recyclable collections is that Supermarkets are now running their own recycling schemes. That is good news for the planet but not for our charity and I am very sad that we will not have as much to give to 'Pillars'.

However, we are still collecting cake and biscuit wrappers, flexible packaging bags used for dishwasher tabs and detergent capsules, packaging of household wipes like Flash or the anti-bacterial ones, plastic air fresheners, tinted fabric conditioner bottles or the tinted plastic boxes used for home cleaning products. So do please continue to support our scheme by recycling these with us.
