
Good News



Sometimes when you're doing a simple job, thoughts pop into your head and then take root so that you can't help yourself following up on the idea. These few are the things which have been rattling around my lockdown brain for the past few weeks.

During the last nine months I have had three operations on my eyes; two cataract operations and one procedure to scrape skin off the retina at the back of my eye.

I have been so grateful for the skill and care of the clever men and nurses performing the procedures but I have been even more amazed by the results.

Instead of being very short-sighted, I can now see clearly without glasses. The focus of my eyes has been completely changed. True, I still need specs for reading but that's no great problem.

Soon after the last operation I was struck, while doing my nightly Bible reading, by God's ability to do exactly the same thing. With a few short words from Scripture (and no doubt a bit of prodding from the Holy Spirit), He can change the focus of my thinking and enable me to see both problems and people in a completely new way.

Why am I surprised? because it often takes me a long time to cotton on to the fact that God is speaking and sometimes even longer to respond.

Lockdown has been a great trial and it has changed a lot of us in ways we might not have chosen. However it has provided me with the opportunity to read the sermons my father wrote during his time as a lay reader in The Church in Wales.

He drew quite heavily on his experiences in

World War 2 and his time helping to set up the mechanisms of the Welfare state and NHS in our home town in the Valleys of South Wales during the 50s, 60s and early 70s.

One of the sermons that most spoke to me was headed "Send your best man" and recounts a number of experiences when the Commanding Officer of Dad's Squadron in the RAF was asked to pick someone for a stand-alone mission or task. The instructions would usually end with the order, "Send your best man."

The sermon goes on to liken this order to God's communication with Israel, his chosen people. God sent them lots of leaders and prophets, because they often ignored them or complained about the messages that were sent. The people often changed their ways for a while and then lapsed back into bad habits. In Jesus, God "sent his best man," his son, to deliver his ultimate message of love and redemption. Just like the vineyard owner in the Bible story, who was trying to communicate with difficult tenants, God's son was put to death by those for whom his message was intended. We also get the chance, every day, to hear and respond to God's message delivered through his son or metaphorically put him to death by ignoring it.

Have you become bored with deciding what you will eat every day, deciding on menus and compiling your shopping list to make sure you have all the ingredients? I am pretty bored with housework too, partly, because it is always there, but also, because I am not very good at it. While cleaning today I was reminded about the story of Martha and Mary when Jesus visited their home at Bethany. Martha was the busy one, getting all the domestic arrangements sorted out and Mary was just listening, drinking in Jesus' message. We all need to be both Martha and Mary: it's all about deciding which needs to be

done when or most.

I am absolutely sure that I haven't got the balance right but I am working on it.

What do you keep in your pockets? Do you always remember to have a face mask handy? I often find that my pockets are full of old tissues, loose change (for parking!) and receipts from shopping. Quite a mess!

Simch Bunin, a Polish Rabbi, suggests that we should keep two notes in our pockets, left and right or front and back. If one day you were feeling full of yourself, he suggests that you should pull out a note which says "I am nothing but dust and ashes." To counteract that, the note in the other pocket would have the words "I am made in God's image."

It's an amazing paradox of our existence that we are a bag of jelly, held up by bones and powered by electrical impulses and yet we are in some way the image of the Divine. We are loved and we have been given infinite value through the sacrifice of God's son.

I hope you like this prayer by Gideon Heugh of Tearfund, it seems to follow on....

"Dear God, I am made of dust, yet you have poured out a whole universe of love on me. Thank you for this love, the gift of life and for all your creation. Help me to be humble enough to know I have earned nothing, whilst also seeing that you have given me everything." Amen




Getting to Know You Podcast with David Jenkins:

The Grey Pullover

I looked at the parcel of his belongings, sent to me as next-of-kin.

Shirts, trousers, underwear, and his grey pullover. I held the knitted wool close to my face and wept'. I would be able to part with these things, but not yet. The pullover smelt of him, they hadn't laundered it. I didn't mind, I was glad.

Memories came flooding back of my Dad, who had lifted me onto the crossbar of his bike, and taken me to the fair at Blackheath.

Memories of our visits to the cinema, when we queued in the 1/3d or 1/9d or even the 2/3d, such extravagance! The pullover wasn't anything special, just a V neck, with a stain on the front, that had always been there. It must have been one of his favourites. He wore it almost every day.

It was unpretentious, like him. Inclined to be shy, he would never make a fuss about anything. He was proud of his medals though, and they weren't in the parcel.

He earnt them in Flanders, going 'over the top' with his comrades. He earnt them alright, but he knew they had been stolen. My husband offered to buy a set in London for me. I said 'No, they wouldn't be Dad's'.

The items went to the charity shop, but I kept the pullover a little longer. It wasn't worth much in monetary terms, but to me it was gold.

Why do we say in such disparaging terms, 'it's only of sentimental value?' Is it because we only appreciate 'hard cash?' Sentiment is deeply personal. The grey pullover had to go, because I had to let it go. Sometimes I think, perhaps there is an angel wearing a grey pullover. It still has that stain on the front though.

Medals? Who needs them?

A Tribute to - Stanlake Stirling Mbavarira

Stanlake Stirling Mbavarira was a gentleman and a scholar as they say. A quiet man indeed, of a few spoken words, humble and always shy to proclaim his achievements.

He was a man who had a passion for Christ evidently when you engaged in conversations with him about Christianity. An avid musician who was experienced at being a choir master back home within the Zimbabwe Methodist church. From the time of his arrival in the UK he would persistently seek to acquire the Methodist hymn book with tonic Sol-Fa (I'm sure a few of the members at Trinity got queried by him at one point if not several occasions).

He thoroughly enjoyed attending church and would make it special by dressing smartly as well as enquiring several times if we would attend (on days leading up to Sunday's).

He taught me about synoptic gospels as he would time and again express passionately his conviction of their importance in Christianity. Up to the time of his passing he continued studying the word despite physical difficulties that naturally came with age. Believe me he left a lot of notes from his studies, testimony of his dedication to growing in his understanding of the Lord's word.

Lastly his passion for education for all remains as his key legacy. As a teacher and then Headmaster in Zimbabwe he would Sacrifice to go the extra mile by teaching extra lessons to not only his children but grandchildren and their friends.

Another key legacy was his kindness and love as he looked after many children of other relatives and even those not related to him. He managed to pay school fees and even housed many children over many decades who can testify his generosity and gratitude.

May his soul rest in the eternal peace of the dear Lord that surpasses all understanding.


"Well, please let me have £3,000 now".



MOVING FORWARD WITH ECO CHURCH

I have recently been watching the David Attenborough series of "The Perfect Planet". You may have seen it yourself when it was aired on the BBC. I found it very enlightening and very alarming. The bottom line is that Planet Earth is now far from being the "perfect planet" that God created and it is nearly all down to humanity. We are simply using too much of the earth's resources, burning too many fossil fuels, destroying too many forests and plundering the oceans.

The result is that far too much carbon dioxide is being released into the atmosphere (our carbon footprint as it is known) whereas before much of it was absorbed by the oceans, trees, ocean creatures and plant life. This has caused our climate to heat up. This in turn causes glaciers and icebergs to melt, crops and animals to die due to lack of water and oceans to rise. Even in the temperate UK we have seen more drought conditions in the summer, more heathland fires and more flooding in winter. I recall as a child that we could expect 2 or 3 heavy falls of snow every winter (great fun) but no more. Many would say that is a good thing and for some of course it is but it is also a good indicator of how the UK climate has changed in just the last 50 years.

It is with all this in mind that A Rocha UK was formed to help and encourage churches across the UK to do what they can to show that we care for God's creation and to actively participate in initiatives to help to reverse some of the actions that have caused climate warming in the first place.

As you may have seen from previous articles in the Trinity monthly magazine A Rocha has instigated an award scheme for churches to work towards in England & Wales. The awards of Bronze, Silver and Gold status for churches who are trying to demonstrate that the gospel is Good News for God's earth.

A Rocha have produced a survey that covers five key areas of church life:

- Worship and teaching
- Management of church buildings
- Management of church land
- Community and global engagement
- Lifestyle

On behalf of Trinity, Basingstoke we have completed one of these surveys as far as currently possible and submitted it to A Rocha for their appraisal for each of the above headings. Much to our surprise we qualify for Bronze in the Worship & Teaching sections and Silver in the Buildings section. This is of course good news but only the start of the journey. We still have a long way to go. The 1st step is to qualify for Bronze in all the sections.

While the 1st 3 sections are concerned with church-based items the 4th and 5th are things that we can all get involved in. The Lifestyle section for instance not only concerns the church but also our personal lifestyle. If you heard Tony Pitt's sermon on Sunday 9th May he covered some of the things that we can all try to do such as car sharing, using public transport where possible and using ECO friendly energy suppliers.

The Parable of the Great Banquet

One thing that we've probably missed over the past year is parties. Well, this month should enable us to party again! Lots of Jesus' parables focus on parties, as they are a picture of the joy, hope and life of the kingdom of God. The parable of the Great Banquet (Luke 14: 15-24) challenges us not to miss out on this. In Jesus' day, when people accepted an *invitation* to a banquet, they were only told the actual time on the day: 'Come, for everything is now ready' (17). Jesus' invites each one of us to share in the life of His kingdom.

However, the guests made *excuses* for not coming. At the time, this would have been extremely insulting to the host. They said: 'I have just bought a field; I must try out my new team of oxen; I have just got married' (18-20). These are all good things in themselves, however they reveal their priorities were elsewhere. We too can be pre-occupied with our own routines of work,

family, retirement, holidays, friends, home, social media, that we forget God's priorities for our lives. Jesus calls for total commitment from His disciples. What priority in my life is holding me back from accepting His invitation?

How did the host respond? He ordered His servants to 'Go out quickly into the streets and alleys of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind and the lame.' (21). He invited the unexpected and unacceptable people to His banquet. Jesus makes the point that God's kingdom is open to all! Thinking about our family, friends, colleagues and neighbours, even if they're not like us or show little interest in God: Are we willing to offer them God's invitation to share His love and life? (Parish Pump)

Don't make decisions on an empty stomach

Scientists at Harvard have found that when you have higher levels of the body's hunger hormone, ghrelin, in your system, you are more likely to be impulsive. This means that you will be liable to make poor decisions, tending towards instant gratification rather than long-term achievement.

Gardening really is good for you

According to a recent study conducted by the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) and two Universities, people who garden every day have well-being scores 6.6 per cent higher, and stress levels 4.2 per cent lower than those who do not garden at all. Dr Lauriane



Chalmin-Pui, RHS well-being fellow and lead author says, "The evidence overwhelmingly suggests that the more frequently you garden, the greater the health benefits.

"In fact, gardening every day has the same positive impact on your well-being as undertaking regular, vigorous exercise like cycling or running." "Gardening is like effortless exercise: it doesn't feel as strenuous as going to the gym, but we can expend similar amounts of energy."

British birds are in big trouble. 80 per cent of our most popular species are in severe decline, according to recent data from the RSPB's annual Big Garden Birdwatch

The world's largest wildlife survey has found that 16 out of the 20 most spotted garden birds have been in decline since 2020.

There are now concerns about the greenfinch and chaffinch, which were seen in their lowest ever numbers this year.

The top five birds seen in people's gardens were: house sparrows, blue tits, starlings, blackbirds and wood pigeons.

Only robins, blackbirds, carrion crows and the song thrush grew in number in 2020.






Flower Arranging

- 14. A clever flower arranger can keep a lovely bloom until last. The centre of all should be Christ.


May Place Works

Basingstoke Town Chaplaincy Newsletter May 2021

Chaplains are now back on the streets and visiting shops and other workplaces. We have been welcomed back and it is encouraging and humbling to hear how we have been missed so much.

For many people, including Chaplains, returning to a public social life has been a challenge. We have not been used to being around a lot of people, or engaging in conversation with others, and still must be aware of the possibility of spreading Covid-19.

Loneliness is widespread and an issue many people mention to Chaplains; it can lead to self-doubts and depression, and being unable to unburden these problems causes them to become more serious and distressing. The meaning of life and death become more significant and Chaplains are finding that people are more willing to discuss spiritual matters. We want to speak to all people - of faith and no clear faith. It has been good to encourage some Christians we meet. Chaplains chat, discuss concerns and pray with people as well as bring prayer requests to the team. It is very rare for anyone to decline an offer of prayer!

Chaplains can play an initial part in reassuring people and sharing the good news of Jesus, but people often also have needs to which churches and other organisations can respond. Since it is easier facilitate that connection if we have a named contact in a local church, we would like to improve our contacts with other Christian organisations and local churches. We are happy to make a presentation of this ministry to churches – on-line or in person.

What will Basingstoke look like in the future? This is a question on many lips. The closure of a number of chain stores and the loss of both Debenhams and John Lewis are likely to have a major impact on the town with many uncertainties created. The Borough has invited residents and businesses to offer opinions and suggestions for re-invigorating the area and, hopefully, there will be opportunities for town centre churches and other pastoral organisations to be involved in future plans.

He was Manager and Director General of the BBC in its formative years. He also formed BOAC (now British Airways).

The Revd Dr Herbert McGonigle considers the Power of God's Grace

Grace - God's kindness towards us

The word 'grace' is one of the most important words found in the New Testament. It means God's loving disposition towards us as sinners. God's 'grace' is almost another word for God's love. This grace is the foundation of our salvation. So Paul can say that 'we are justified freely by His grace' (Romans 3:24); 'where sin abounded, grace abounded all the more' (Romans 5:20); 'by grace you are saved through faith' (Ephesians 2:8).

But the word 'grace' is also used in another way in the New Testament. It means the godly character being reproduced in Christians; Christ living in His people by His Spirit and making them like Himself – gracious. Luke records that as Jesus grew up 'the grace of God was upon Him' (2:40), and that the people wondered at the 'gracious words' that He spoke (4:22). John says that Jesus was 'full of grace and truth' (1:14). The most common benediction bestowed on Christians in the letters of the New Testament is 'the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ' (eq Romans 16:20; 1 Cor. 16:23).

From this understanding of grace comes the reminder and the exhortation that all of us as Christians are 'to grow in grace' (2 Peter 3:18). Our lives should manifest the grace of God in love and compassion and kindness. But grace is not something we can achieve on our own. True grace is only found in close communion with our Lord Jesus Christ.

The story behind the HYMN: 'Lord, for the years'

Lord, for the years your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way, sought us and saved us, pardoned and provided:

Lord for the years, we bring our thanks today.

Lord, for that word, the word of life which fires us, speaks to our hearts and sets our souls ablaze, teaches and trains, rebukes us and inspires us: Lord of the word, receive your people's praise.

*Lord, for our hopes, the dreams of all our living, Christ and his kingdom one united aim; Rulers and peoples bound in high thanksgiving, Lord of our hopes, our trust is in your Name. ...

This well-loved hymn was written in 1967 by the Revd Timothy Dudley Smith, who later became Bishop of Thetford. He later confessed: "I wrote it on a train when I was very pressed for time. I'm thankful if something I write gets picked up, but I suspect anyone who does something in a rush later regrets that they didn't find time to apply the sandpaper a bit more!"

Dudley Smith had been asked to write a hymn for the centenary service of the Children's Special Service Mission, now Scripture Union, in St Paul's Cathedral. His commission was to write words that could be fitted to Jean Sibelius's *Finlandia*, as it was to be accompanied by an orchestra with this tune in their repertoire. And so – 'Lord for the years' was written.

Dudley Smith need not have worried about lack of time – his lyrics were a 'hit' in the Cathedral on the day, and went on to become so well-loved that George Carey chose the hymn to be sung at his consecration as Bishop of Bath and Wells, and then again later, in 1991, for his consecration as Archbishop in Canterbury Cathedral.

The hymn continued to be widely sung and loved, until in 2002 Timothy Dudley Smith was asked to write an extra verse for it so that it could even be sung around the time of the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

Many of the words in the hymn are true for the Queen herself, as she celebrates her 95th birthday this month. She does indeed thank God 'for the years your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way'...

And so indeed the 'extra' verse added for the Queen has also held true:

Lord for our hopes, the dreams of all our living, Christ and his kingdom one united aim, Rulers and peoples bound in high thanksgiving, Lord of our hopes, our trust is in your Name.
