



Dear friends,

We marked the beginning of this solemn season of Lent with our Ash Wednesday Service. As we continue to journey collectively and individually, may each of us know more deeply God's gift of love in His Son Jesus Christ. I want to share with you a poem I read in my personal devotions on Ash Wednesday by R S Thomas, in Janet Morley's book 'the heart's time – a poem a day for Lent and Easter.'

The Bright Field

I have seen the sun break through to illuminate a small field for a while, and gone my way and forgotten it. But that was the pearl of great price, the one field that had the treasure in it. I realise now that I must give all that I have to possess it. Life is not hurrying on to a receding future, nor hankering after an imagined past. It is the turning aside like Moses to the miracle of the lit bush, to brightness that seemed as transitory as your youth once, but is the eternity that awaits you.

Lent invites us to turn aside from our daily routine for a few moments each day, in order to reflect and to notice what is going on around us, and more importantly, inside of us. And, to pay attention to those things that may seem insignificant that might otherwise go unnoticed, but may help to give deeper depth to our lives.

There's a story of a man who decided to let his garden grow naturally. One day a neighbour asked him why he had his garden in such a mess, he said, 'I am leaving it to God.' Well, God will not do for us what he has given us the ability to do. Recently, I gave the Manse a deep clean, and I certainly felt knackered afterwards. But I can see the difference it has made, not only in my physical space but in the way I feel about the space in which I live. If you want a well-kept garden or a well-kept house or a well-kept life, you have to work at it. You will get what you put in.


Lent is a time for looking at what you have and making improvements. In a garden some plants need splitting to give them more room to grow; otherwise, they will choke themselves. Splitting the plants gives you extra so you can share and at the same time make room for the new growth. In our lives, there is a constant need to get rid of what hampers growth. A good gardener learns how to work well with the soil and the seasons to cultivate the plants. We too, must learn how to work with God to cultivate good qualities, attitudes and habits that will continually transform our lives. Nothing is achieved without effort. If you want a good garden, you have to tend it — the same is true for our lives.

Traditionally, Lent has been marked by self-discipline — through prayer and fasting to enable Christians to be more aware of God in their lives and in the world around them. During Lent nowadays, many people try to do something that requires some sacrifice with the hope of forming a good habit or skill and at the same time, do something charitable.

However, the prophet Isaiah tells us that fasting is nothing of itself - but the kind of fasting that pleases God will lead to compassionate of kindness, acts especially toward those who are less fortunate (Isaiah 58:1-12). Lent invites us to actively seek to be transformed inwardly. bv setting aside time prayerfully reflect on the temptations of Jesus in the wilderness, in preparation for his mission. So Jesus' fasting had a purpose to it — to sort out the priorities for his mission. We too, are invited to make this solemn season of Lent count for us. by setting aside time out of our daily routine, to spend time with God, to hear God's voice and to know God's presence more clearly in our lives. Thanks be to God!

OUR FUTURE CHURCH

No one could have foreseen the traumatic impact that the Covid-19 pandemic would have on all our lives. Communities have been profoundly impacted in so many ways and the rhythm of our Church life altered as eventually Churches were forced to close their doors and government restrictions meant we all had to stay at home. The income we received from lettings ceased as did Trinity's outreach projects. We ask ourselves, will life ever return to normal, or will we be looking at a new type of 'normal'. One thing we have learnt from lockdown is that 'church' is not our building, it is you and me and all our members. Despite the restrictions, Church life has continued to flourish, and we have had to adapt to new ways of communicating through the telephone, Zoom, e-mails and post.

Looking to the future, the Methodist Church requires all Churches to have a Mission Action Plan (MAP) in place by the end of August, for implementation in September 2021. The aim is to have our Church's Mission Action Plan in place by the autumn. We acknowledge that each Church in our Circuit is different. Mission planning is not setting impossible goals. 'Lockdown' has given us time to pause and reflect, so perhaps a good starting point would be 'Our Calling'.

ACTION FOR FEBRUARY TO MID-MARCH – PRAYING FOR GUIDANCE

A mission plan will fail unless it is prayer driven. Jennifer has written a prayer for Trinity, and we ask you to include this prayer (and / or Psalm 25: v 4-5) in your devotions throughout the coming weeks, so that by the end of March we may have gained some insight as to where the Holy Spirit is guiding us to discern God's mission for Trinity.

ACTION FOR MID-MARCH AND APRIL – A SURVEY TO COMPLETE (please keep this)

Looking at the questions, consider your comments in the light of any insights you may have had from your prayers. It will be your comments that will guide our mission action plan. All voices will be heard, so don't hold back your views, be honest and frank. If you have e-mail please send your comments to Diane Bath. For those not on the internet please write your comments down, as we will be ringing you to have a conversation about your thoughts.

In your deliberations consider where we were before Covid, where we are now, where we hope to be when our Church can open once more. With Easter and spring fast approaching perhaps it is time for us to look for the 'green shoots' at Trinity. Let us all pray together that whatever the vision God reveals to us, will be met with enthusiasm and joy. If you have any questions please feel free to contact either Diane, Barbara or Jennifer.

Travelling North I was unaware of what was to come.

There was laughter and chatter and excitement in our car. Friendship making sweet the long drive.

The hills stole into view, majestic and unchanging but they were kept in the background by plans to shop and eat and make ourselves at home for our time away.

The house when we arrived was a place of profound welcome where every window framed a glorious view. Each panorama felt like a gift, each lamb and calf that played a blessing.

Later we visited Friars Crag. Here was water and reflections, a foretaste of lakes of shimmering light in the stillness and with stormy waves cresting on one wilder day.

5 March 2021 – Vanuatu Praying this year with Vanuatu

Build on a Strong Foundation

Vanuatu – On the other side of the world in the South Pacific, 2000 miles east of Australia, lies an archipelago of 80 islands called Vanuatu. With



Vanuatu Today – The people are mostly Melanesian, with a Polynesian minority. The population is around 3000,000 of whom nearly a fifth live in Port Vila, the largest city.

113 languages and numerous dialects were spoken until recently – more languages than anywhere else in the world. Bislama, which is widely spoken, French and English are the official languages. Education is not compulsory or free. Most families can only afford to educate their firstborn child, and boys get priority. However, in the past 20 years there have been changes and the gender gap in literacy and education has narrowed. Heath of women and children are key national priorities of the government. Malnutrition is a growing problem, accounting for most of the deaths in children under 5. Malnutrition has been aggravated by the introduction of processed, western foods. Safe drinking water and adequate sanitation facilities are major concerns. In rural areas people may have to walk up to an hour to find water. Violence, physical and / or sexual affects 60% of women and girls.



Did You See?



During the past year, some things have perhaps, become more obvious.

I noticed high in the branches of the trees opposite my kitchen windows, a disused nest. Or is it? It certainly looks as if it could fall any minute.

The winds, have not dislodged it though, and now, although once hidden by leaves. I can see the clever construction of a home suitable for new beginnings. Patiently the birds have retrieved all kinds of items, and their natural ingenuity has produced this nest. But where are they?

The nest is quite plainly empty. Have they gone to warmer lands? Will they return in the Spring?

It made me think of my former homes. Some I can remember, others are farther back in my infancy. The 'rooms' where my parents cared and nourished the sickly infant. Various places of evacuation during the war years, followed by my childhood homes on the fringes of London.

Then later, the home my husband and I shared with our young family in Hertfordshire, before moving to Basingstoke. 'What would you think about moving to Basingstoke'? 'The office is moving there.' That was over 50 years ago. So I had a new home in Hampshire.

The birds know when it is time to move. They leave behind their carefully constructed nest, take to the air, and search for pastures new.

At present Covid 19 has created uncertainty, loss, and fear, but we still have our 'nests.' It's true, that for many even this is threatened.

In Psalm 91 God says, 'I will cover you with my feathers, and under my wings you will find refuge. '

It is a wonderful assurance of his care, and protection. His love for us is beyond question. The simple prayer of Teresa of Avila says:

'Let nothing disturb you, nothing frighten you.

All things are passing away, God never changes.

Patience obtains all things, whoever has God lacks nothing.'

We are beginning to see evidence of new life in our gardens. Crocus are in bloom and the 'daffs' are in bud, waiting to spring into yellow loveliness.

Soon the birds chatter will increase, as they begin to gather all those 'bits' for new nests. Life's circle is starting again.

God says, 'See I am doing a new thing'. (Isaiah 43) It is new, every day.

We take it for granted; we cease to appreciate the wonder that is there.

The small child's concentration on the smallest detail, should teach us something, when we choose to rush on.

Go Green for Lent!

We hope most of you realise by now that we are looking at whether we can achieve an Eco-Church certificate for Trinity Church. This involves a number of different areas, such as the property itself, our worship, our involvement with the local community, and also the lifestyles of our people.

Lent is traditionally a time for giving up things. This Lent, we would challenge you to consider the environmental impact of your own lifestyle, and to consider whether you could improve it. What this means will be different for each of you and so we're not going to provide a list of things for you to do. Instead, here are some pointers to areas that you might consider.

- 1) **Think about your use of transport.** Are there times when you can reduce the amount of driving you do? Could you share lifts, or use public transport, or walk?
- 2) Think about your use of plastic, particularly the "single use plastic". Is there any way that could be reduced? Could you buy fruit and vegetables loose instead of packaged? Could you reduce your use of cling film? Could you use refillable bottles for shampoo or soap?
- 3) **Think about the things you throw away.** Do you recycle everything that you can? Did you know that you can recycle plastic wrappers from "non-savoury" biscuits and the tops and sprays of many home care products at Trinity, in the blue bin beside Sarum Hall?
- 4) Think about where the things you buy were made. Can you buy more locally sourced products? Could you eat more seasonal fruit and vegetables instead of ones grown in other parts of the world?
- 5) **Think about the use of energy in your home.** Do you switch lights off when they are not needed? Could you reduce the amount of TV you watch? Could you reduce draughts to save energy?

Caring for the environment is increasingly recognised as the Christian response to God's wonderful creation. Instead of giving up a luxury this Lent, try to find a way to reduce your impact on the environment, perhaps in one or more of the ways suggested above.

If you are really serious, try to calculate your Carbon Footprint, using one of the many websites on the Internet such as https://footprint.wwf.org.uk/.

Finally, please pray about these issues, asking God's guidance on how you can respond as an individual and how Trinity can as a Church.

This article was written by Revd Tim Macquiban to accompany Revd Clough's Sermons and Papers and passed on to me by Bill Jeram

James Leonard Clough: 1909 - 2010 (Minister B/Stoke 1967-75)

The surviving papers of this distinguished and long serving minister have been given to us by his grandson, Professor David Clough, of the University of Chester who is a noted expert in animal theology and ethics, and a local preacher in the North Cheshire circuit.

When Leonard Clough died, he was the oldest and longest serving minister in the Methodist Church and the only link with the pre-Union Primitive Methodist Church. He was born in Consett, County Durham in 1909. He had deep roots in Primitive Methodism: his father was a Local Preacher, his maternal grandfather was a Primitive Methodist minister, and his great grandfather was one of the first Primitive Methodists in Durham.

He trained at Hartley Victoria College, representing the College at the Uniting Conference of 1932. In 1933 he was stationed in Scarborough. He then served in the following circuits: Tunbridge Wells (to 1934), St Leonard's & Bexhill (to 1938), Torquay & Paignton (to 1945), Portsmouth (to 1950), Gosport & Fareham (to 1960), Southampton (to 1966) and Basingstoke (1967-1975). He then retired first to Caernarvon and then to Appleby in Cumbria. He died in 2010 in the one hundred and second year of his age and the seventy-eighth year of his ministry.

That ministry is remembered for his work in building churches, both physically in schemes to develop and extend premises and through his powerful preaching, especially in Torquay during the second world war where he established a Clubland for young people, St. James' Road Southampton and Basingstoke where he brought three churches together to form Trinity.

He is remembered for his caring and compassionate pastoral work and his work with young people. His ministry was marked by a willingness to assert what he believed right, challenging authority, and a compassion for others. He was an avid reader and writer having two books and some poetry published and maintaining a journal covering significant events of the twentieth century from the outbreak of the First World War onwards, many of which are to be found in the papers now located in the museum store at Englesea Brook. He also was a prolific correspondent keeping in touch with his many friends to the last days of his life. A thoughtful and reflective man, he was also a poet and hymn writer, and well-read in English literature.

This collection, which has now been given a summary listing, is a treasure trove, particularly for those wanting to discover what ministers serving in the war and reconstruction years of the twentieth century preached to congregations under pressure, from changes in society, secularisation and declining numbers. It comprises well over 1,000 sermons and miscellaneous papers relating to church life in the circuits he served.



Into 2021

Over the last few months we have continued to reach more people in and around Basingstoke and Deane. With the distribution through our hubs we are currently in contact with around 1000 people.

They have discussed things such as: how being furloughed or being made redundant has caused great difficulty, or having to leave work in order to home school, and how the food gives their weekly shopping that extra boost. Welcome to the Town Chaplaincy Prayer News for February 2021

Last weekend's One Church service was inspiring and it was especially good to see the number of Christian organisations associated with the collected churches in Basingstoke. We are called to work together and support one another in prayer and action as we share in God's mission.

You have probably seen that all Debenhams stores will close after the company is sold to Boohoo. It is not known what Boohoo will do but their focus may well be on-line shopping.

Moments of optimism that we will soon get back to some form of normality keep being dashed. The inoculations are being given but there is still some way to go and the impact is still to be assessed. Will they restrict transmission, how long will the protection last?

I don't know about you but I am getting increasingly frustrated with the fears of infection, delays and the unfulfilled raising of hopes. Symptoms raise questions about what infection there may be and there is stress associated with that. (My wife tested negative for Covid-19 yesterday). And I see the damage that is being done to people who are isolated from their loved ones. Reading the Exodus story in the Bible can gloss over many of the time lags. The Hebrews were suffering and life was becoming harder well before Moses was born. He was at least the third child born to a couple and he disappeared for a number of years, only returning to lead the people to the Promised Land after 80 years more hard labour had passed.

We need time to learn and, like everyone else, patience to endure the situation. But more, we are privileged to be part of God's plan which will be completed in His time. The Holy Spirit shows us our part but we may not see the impact we have made as the plan is fulfilled. We can show patience, trusting in God's guidance and goodness. And we can pray – for patience, and for God's will to be done during this time.

Give thanks that Eric ran a Suicide Awareness course several times that Chaplains and others from different churches and organisations found very helpful.

That Libby's work keeping in contact with people and maintaining the clerical work will continue smoothly.

For talks with the Rail Community Officer Team to arrange for Chaplains to be Platform Pastors. Pray that discussions will go well and speedily and that we will have Chaplains to train and work at the station.

Give thanks to God that He continues to provide for our needs. Financially we are just covering our costs but we do need more Christians to volunteer to become Chaplains, especially as we look to train and start Platform Pastors.

Thank God that we have trained one new Chaplain and are interviewing a recruit, even though current circumstances are difficult.

Pray for wisdom as we look to engage with people in new ways while the pandemic continues.

Book Review

<u>The Grande Finale, The Apocalypse in the Tanakh, the Gospel, and the Qur'an Author - Prof. Dr. Anton Wessels</u>

I recently read a book review by Rev. Dr. Jan Slomp on "The Grande Finale", a recent publication which gives us a new insight into **Eschatology in Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Key issues identified are as follows.**

Dr. Wessels proposes that Apocalyptic writings are not a prophecy about the future, but about understanding our situation today. They had a meaning for the believers in the time they were written and they have a meaning for us today, and contemporary in all future generations. We should be reading the prophecies in this light and learn now from it, not trying to project into the future, which is our established understanding of prophecy. The Apocalyptic message being that God will put an end to the unjust dominion of violence, money and lies. God's Kingdom will certainly arrive, but not through violence.

It sounds very complex and thought provoking, but might well have an element of truth as every generation in history can relate to an "end time" in their time and location, e.g. French Revolution, Communist Revolution, WW1, WW2, Cold War, Vietnam War, ISIS, etc.....

Food for thought. I have not yet read it but might well do so.

Football Club Takes Faith to the Airwaves

Four of the team's leading players joined the Buckinghamshire club's Chaplain Benedict Musola for the special Act of Worship broadcast across the country's 38 BBC local radio stations.

Professional footballers Adebayo Akinfenwa, Jason McCarthy, Alex Samuel and Cameron Yates spoke of their Christian faith during the 30-minute service broadcast in January. He told listeners: "I am grateful for the opportunity to serve God in this role, which uniquely combines my passion for God and my passion for football." The service featuring Wycombe Wanderers underlined the close links between football and faith.

Do you know the popular series of books entitled *Where's Wally?* These books are filled with very detailed cartoon drawings in each of which is hidden Wally. He is dressed in a red and white striped ski cap and glasses and the challenge is to find Wally. You have to search for some time to pick him out of the crowd, but Wally is always there! In many ways, like finding Wally, we need to develop the skill of identifying God's presence in our daily lives. One approach that can help us to find God throughout the day is to do a daily review of our day with God. It can provide us with a means of seeing where God has been at work during our day. It's an opportunity of remembering how God has been at work and how we have responded to Him. As the psalmist says, *'On my bed I remember you; I think of you through the watches of the night'* (Ps 63:6).

What does this look like in practice? Here is a step by step guide:

- 1. Be still for a moment, and quiet your mind.
- Acknowledge that Jesus is present. Invite Him to guide you.
- 3. Recall the beginning of the day, when you first woke up. Watch that scene, as if on film. What is your reaction to what you see? Talk to God about it.
- 4. Continue through the film of your day, going from scene to scene. As you reflect on each one, some scenes may fill you with gratitude, others with regret. Speak directly to God about this. You may also want to pray for those you encountered during the day.
- 5. End your review with a prayer of thanksgiving for God's mercy and love. Ask him to refresh you as you sleep.

As you begin reviewing your day with God regularly, you can expect to see two things beginning to happen: Firstly, you will become more aware of recurring negative patterns in your life, which will challenge these wrong attitudes and habits and increase your desire to grow and change. Secondly, you will become more aware of God's presence in the ordinary moments of your life. And when you start experiencing the reality of God's presence with you every day, it's not ordinary anymore! (*Parish Pump*)

The Revd Dr Herbert McGonigle, Considers the Problem of Prayer When your Prayer is not Answered

2 Cor. 12:8; 'Three times I asked the Lord about this ...BUT...'

Paul is talking about one of the most mysterious and one of the most baffling aspects of prayer – when God does not say yes.

On the face of it, Paul's prayer was very modest. For some time he had been troubled by 'a thorn in the flesh.' He doesn't tell us what the 'thorn' was and down the centuries theologians and commentators have made suggestions. Most of them have thought that the affliction was physical because Paul says it was 'in the flesh.' Some have suggested that he suffered from epileptic fits which caused him to fall down, while others have suggested that he was laid low by constant fevers or that he had very poor eyesight, the last based on his remarks in Galatians 6:11. But in spite of this great servant of the Lord praying earnestly three times that the thorn would be removed, God did not answer as Paul expected. A number of things in this passage (verses 7-10) are very helpful to all of us in the matter of prayer.

First, although God's answer was not what Paul asked for, God did answer him. God is never indifferent to the prayers we utter from the depth of our heart. Unlike the idol Baal in the Old Testament story about Elijah, (1 Kings 18) the God and Father of our Lord Jesus is not on a journey, nor is He busy elsewhere, nor is He sleeping. He hears our prayers and our cries when we come to Him in our need and pain and distress.

Second, although Paul did not get the answer he wanted, God made him a wonderful promise. He said, 'My grace is sufficient for you' (v.9). This was not what Paul asked for, yet what a promise it was! God said in effect. 'I will not take the thorn away – but my daily grace is all-sufficient.' In spite of the thorn, Paul will triumph. When God gives us all-sufficient grace, it will take care of everything in our lives.

Thirdly, Paul learnt that God's wonderful grace meant that in his weakness 'the power of Christ' (v.9) would be with him, the power that would make him effective and fruitful in his ministry.

Fourthly, this experience taught Paul that he could be 'content with weaknesses and insults' (v.10) because it was for Christ's sake, and when he is weak in himself, he is strong in Christ (v.10).

So what about unanswered prayer? Unless our prayer was selfish and not for our good in the first place, God <u>does</u> answer our cry. When the answer is not what we expected, then it means that our loving Father has something for us even better and more important than what we asked for

How our Church can get Help for our Struggling Children

There is a Christian charity that helps churches who want to reach out to their local children in need. 'Transforming Lives for Good' (TLG) offers three programmes with which local churches can partner.

The "Early Intervention" programme is where TLG train and support volunteers from local churches to be coaches in schools supporting children who are finding school and life hard for a variety of reasons.



One coach is matched with one child, and gives them one hour a week through the school year. Just that small amount of time with a caring adult can make a big difference.

The "Make Lunch" programme is where TLG enables and equips a local church to run a holiday lunch club for struggling children. Each club provides free, hot and healthy meals to children and families who would otherwise go hungry. Through TLG Make Lunch, a church can thus make contact with some of the most vulnerable families in the community. In addition, TLG have also been running the "Box of Hope" project. Since the first Lockdown last March, local churches in partnership with TLG have delivered a staggering 510,000 (and counting!) meals to children and families in crisis. These emergency care packages – Boxes of Hope – have given churches another opportunity to build good relations with the needy in their communities.


