

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Dear Friends,

Many thanks to you all for your prayers and good wishes as I travelled to St Vincent and the Grenadines, and your warm welcome back. It was indeed a precious gift to be able to complete my sabbatical by spending quality time with my mum and other relatives. The delay completing my sabbatical over the past two years has made my time in SVG even more meaningful. Being four hours behind the UK, I found myself waking up around 4 am every morning, which gave me some wonderful moments of quiet that afforded me the opportunity to keenly listen to the inner voice of God. It was also a delight to prepare my mum's meals each day and to give my eldest sister a well earned break. Each day I marvelled at God's handywork as I sat in my mum's kitchen and looked up at 'Mount Saint Andrew', which has an elevation of 1,486 feet. It doesn't matter where we are, there is always something in the created order that would point us back to God. We just have to be willing to be drawn into God's presence wherever we find ourselves.

It is that time of the year again when we pay closer attention to the 'temptations of Jesus' in order to find strength and courage for our own lives, as we seek to be better disciples of Jesus. The holy season of Lent can be very challenging for us because we are invited to look inward and to deal with ourselves by the help of the Holy Spirit. It is also a time when we are invited to look outward toward others with love and compassion and to treat others as we would want to be treated. This looking inward and outward is designed to transform us more and more into the image of our Lord Jesus Christ. Our journey through Lent doesn't need to be onerous, because genuine relationship with God is a delight. However, our journey through Lent to the heart of our Christian faith (Easter), requires us to be intentional in our relationship with God, in order to better appreciate God's transforming grace in Jesus Christ. I encourage us all to take this personal journey through Lent beginning on 'Ash Wednesday' to the heart of our Christian faith (Easter), and to intentionally receive God's love afresh, as we engage with

This year, I feel drawn to dwell in the Psalms in my personal journey through Lent. I am intrigued by the way the Psalms often move from lament to surging praise and/or thanksgiving, even in the most challenging of circumstances. Psalm 27 is one of my favourite Psalms and verse one says, "The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom then shall I fear?" As Christians, we are not insulated from the troubles of this world, and very often we find that the world is against us because of our witness for Christ. The Psalmist David in particular speaks of the real dangers and terrifying threats he faced all around him; enemies, false-witnesses, violence, illness etc. The Psalmist neither denies the dangers nor dismisses the threats, but faces them with confidence in the God he serves. When it feels like everything is against us, the Psalmist invites us to trust in God's goodness and to always seek God's face. We know that God's face is revealed to us in the face of His Son Jesus Christ, who brought to us the light of God's salvation. This is why in the midst of the dangers and the threats that may be all around, we can burst forth into surging praise and/or thanksgiving for God's goodness and deliverance, and say with confidence that 'the Lord is our light and our salvation'.

What I appreciated best of all about my sabbatical was being drawn into that place of the presence of God, where I could behold the beauty of the Lord. In God's presence we find both solace and safety, and gain strength for the journey of life and everyday tasks become a delight and an act of worship, rather than a struggle. The discordant noises that seek to distract disappear in God's presence, as we immerse ourselves in praise and worship to God, who offers us His light and His salvation. We all are invited to live daily in the 'rest of God' so that all that we are and do reflect God's glory. With so much distraction all around us this may seem

difficult. However, God's invitation to live in His rest is always open to us.

God, our light and our salvation, illuminate our lives, that we may see your goodness in the land of the living, and, looking on your beauty, may be changed into the likeness of Jesus Christ our Lord.

With recent events the Ukraine has been very much on our minds, as we had Helen and Olga staying with us and Olga's brother, who also came, stayed with another family. Jennifer and Tony also had two girls and have been back in touch with Liz for several years now. Jennifer contacted Liz on Thursday 24 February. (Liz now lives in Spain and has two children) but her parents and grandparents still live in Kharkov. **This is what Liz said:** 

'Hi Jennifer, Thank you for your message. My Children and I are still living in Spain so we are fine. My parents and grandparents are in Kharkov they have been up since 3 am, the city outskirts are being shelled as there are military airports and warehouses in that area. The explosions are heard everywhere and at some point the family were instructed to move to the metro underground. There are lots of people there, stuffy air, little children, cats, dogs etc. There is no way they can leave the city now. I have been unable to contact my other grandparents on the other side of the city. Horrendous nightmare, surreal, love Liz'

We all had a lovely time with the children taking them out as a group and individually in our family groups, to the New Forest, Winchester, London, Southbourne, a canal trip, the ice rink, a visit to the Mayor, a Hot Air Balloon experience and more, with some activities at Trinity too. We wonder where they all are now....... and will keep all of them and their families in our prayers at this dreadful time, Hazel and Peter (a few photos from the 1997 visit)

## A Collect for Ash Wednesday

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent:

#### **Chaplain for the Coastguards**

A full-time chaplain has been appointed by the Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA) for the first time in its 200-year history. The Revd Tom Ebbens, who will be based in Cornwall, has been appointed to the position after a pilot project. He has previously worked in MCA operations centres and as a coastal officer, and will provide support for front-line staff. Mr Ebbens, 30, says that he will offer support to colleagues of any faith and none. "People have fears and concerns, worries and challenges, and sometimes they need someone to walk with them in those dark moments; to listen, share the hurt and support them." HM Coastguard director Claire Hughes said it was a "landmark appointment". She said: "Tom is going to bring another level of care alongside the welfare-led support systems we already have in place, such as trauma risk management. "People know they can talk to him in confidence about their concerns and problems, and that he will provide the support they need."

## 1 March Shrove Tuesday Pancake Day

Ever wondered why we eat pancakes just before Lent? The tradition dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, when



Christians spent Lent in repentance and severe fasting. So on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, the church bell would summon them to confession, where they would be 'shriven' or absolved from their sins, which gives us *Shrove* Tuesday. At home, they would then eat up their last eggs and fat, and making a pancake was the easiest way to do this. For the next 47 days, they pretty well starved themselves.

Pancakes feature in cookery books as far back as 1439, and today's pancake races are in remembrance of a panicked woman back in 1445 in Olney, Buckinghamshire. She was making pancakes when she heard the shriving bell calling her to confession. Afraid she'd be late, she ran to the church in a panic, still in her apron and still holding the pan.

Flipping pancakes is also centuries old. A poem from Pasquil's Palin in 1619 runs: "And every man and maide doe take their turne, and tosse their Pancakes up for feare they burne." Some people have noted that the ingredients of pancakes can be used to highlight four significant things about this time of year: Eggs stand for creation; Flour is the staff of life; while Salt keeps things wholesome and Milk stands for purity.

Shrove Tuesday is always 47 days before Easter Sunday and falls between the 3 February and 9 March. (Parish Pump)

#### There's a Queue

How good are you at queuing? Apparently, the British are supposed to be quite good at it. There are those who get annoyed, frustrated perhaps, but generally we accept it with good grace. Of course, it all depends what the queue is for.



Years ago, we queued for the cinema, at the doctors, in the shops for counter service. And many other places. Have we become less patient?

My mother urged me, just after WW2 to join a queue if I saw one. It could be for bananas, or something else we had missed for a long time during those dark days.

The habit remains. Sometimes I find myself in a queue without really knowing why. Strange person!

I remember waiting on Brussels Central Station, all the announcements were in French, or Flemish, neither of which I understood. My daughter-in-law was in a queue for train tickets. I was unaware of the queuing procedure, which didn't really exist, so I became quite nervous, waiting for her return.

There are queues that we would rather not be in. Fortunately, most are with reasonably friendly people, who we can chat to, and strangers can become friends in these situations. Queues to avoid are those with hard faced officials, queues for the dentist, and of late, especially queues at the casualty department of most hospitals.

I have a book entitled 'At the end of the day' written by David Winter. It's subject is, 'God's waiting Room.' Directed at those of us over a certain age, it encourages positivity. Most people are not in a rush to reach the head of this queue, so the writer suggests contentment, and purpose as we wait.

The queue experience is an opportunity to slow down, it doesn't have to be time wasted. It is a chance to learn patience, to develop friendships, to ponder and think, possibly about what we could write for Trinity News. It is not such a bad place to be.

Listening to each other, learning empathy, and relating to our inner feelings of thanks to God for all we share. Let's appreciate that not everything moves quite as fast as we would like, and take time. It's God's gift.

#### **Christian Basics – Why the Cross?**

The cross is a picture of violence, yet the key to peace;

- a picture of suffering, yet the key to healing;
- a picture of death, yet the key to life;
- a picture of utter weakness, yet the key to power;
- a picture of capital punishment, yet the key to mercy and forgiveness;
- a picture of vicious hatred, yet the key to love;
- a picture of supreme shame, yet the Christian's supreme boast.

The cross really is the key to everything! Although a horrifying instrument of torture and death, it is also a symbol of love and peace. On the cross Jesus died to deal with the problem of our sin and defeat the powers of death and evil. He identified with our sufferings and set us an example of self-sacrificial love.

As Peter writes, 'He Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by His wounds you have been healed ..... Christ died for sins once and for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God'. (1 Peter 2:24, 3:18).

Jesus died in our place on the cross and took away our guilt, to pay the full penalty for our sin. Access to God's presence is now open to all, symbolised by the Temple curtain being torn in two from top to bottom. The barrier between us and God was torn down in order 'to bring us to God'. Jesus is the bridge providing access between us and God. 'If Jesus Christ is to be our Saviour then He must be able to place a hand upon a pardoning God and another hand on a penitent sinner and draw them together in an act of reconciliation' (Bishop Handley Moule). 



#### The Story of the Yellow Ribbons

We are loved with everlasting love! One of the greatest and most comforting doctrines taught in the Bible is the love of God for His people. In the Law and in the Prophets; in the poetical and historical books; in Gospels and Letters – all agree to tell us what God said to His people



Quite simply there is nothing in all creation more reassuring, more comforting, more encouraging, more uplifting than to know that God loves us. And we can go further and put it in personal terms as Paul did. 'He loved me and gave Himself for me' (Galations 2:21). How can we illustrate the illimitable love of God? One such illustration was told by the Revd John Wilbur Chapman of Indiana, an ordained Presbyterian Minister who in 1893 went into full-time evangelistic ministry.

One evening Chapman was travelling by train in a rural part of Kansas. The other passenger in the carriage was a young man who kept glancing out the window and then covering his face with his hands. Chapman asked if he could help. The young man confessed that many years before he had run away from home and 'sown his wild oats.' He had not written to his parents at all, until a few weeks before, telling them that he would be travelling on this train. At a certain point it passed very close to his home. In the letter he had begged his parents' forgiveness and asked if they wanted him to come home. If so, they were to tie a yellow ribbon on the old apple tree that grew right beside the railway lines.

"Sir," he said to Chapman, "the train will soon pass my home but I'm afraid to look. If there's a yellow ribbon on the tree, I'll get off at the next station and go home. If there's no ribbon, I'll just travel on. But I'm too afraid to look out for the tree." So Chapman offered to look for him. "You can open your eyes now,' he said a few minutes later. The returning prodigal looked at Chapman with tears and quivering lips. 'All is well,' said the evangelist. 'There is a yellow ribbon on the apple tree. In fact, there's far more than one. Every branch is hanging with yellow ribbons, scores and scores of them. Your parents love you that much, they want you to come home."

If parents can love their wayward children like that, how much greater is the love of God! Truly, we are loved with everlasting love. (Parish Pump)

Loving God of all the world, we hold before you all nations, their needs and their potential.

God, who reigns over governments, bring justice where injustice rules.

God, who carries a weary world without growing weak, give strength to the struggling and hope to the hopeless.

Creative God who dreamed up our world, grant vision and insight to those with a heart to change things for the better.

With grateful hearts we thank our loving God, whose compassion never ceases, whose love for us never runs dry and whose fight against injustice never relents. Amen

#### 17 March – St Patrick, Beloved Apostle to Ireland

St Patrick is the patron Saint of Ireland. If you've ever been in New York on St Patrick's Day, you'd think he was the Patron Saint of New York as well... the flamboyant parade is full of American / Irish razzmatazz. It's all a far cry from the hard life of this 5<sup>th</sup> century humble Christian who became in time both Bishop and Apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a Town Councillor in the west of England, between the Severn and the Clyde. But as a young man he was captured by Irish pirates, kidnapped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery. He was made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his earlier years, when he "knew not the true God". Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him with them away from Ireland.

After various adventures in other lands, including near-starvation, Patrick landed on English soil at last, and returned to his family. But he was much changed. He had enjoyed his life of plenty before; now he wanted to devote the rest of his life to Christ. Patrick received some form of training for the priesthood, but not the higher education he really wanted. But by 435, well-educated or not, Patrick was badly needed. Palladius' mission to the Irish had failed, and so the Pope sent Patrick back to the land of his slavery. He set up at Armagh and worked principally in the north. He urged the Irish to greater spirituality, set up a school, and made several missionary journeys.

Patrick's writings are the first literature certainly identified from the British Church. They reveal sincere simplicity and a deep pastoral care. He wanted to abolish paganism, idolatry, and was ready for imprisonment or death in the following of Christ. Patrick remains the most popular of the Irish Saints. The principal Cathedral of New York is dedicated to him, as, of course, is the Anglican Cathedral of Dublin. (*Parish Pump*)

500 years ago, from 9 to 17 March 1522, Martin Luther preached his *Invocavit Sermons*.
 He urged citizens to adhere to the core Christian values and trust in God, rather than using violence to bring about change.


It read: "No Christians in Cardiff – try Swansea."

#### The Moran's - A Methodist family of Ireland

Why am I writing about a Methodist family in Ireland? It is partly personal as it is about two Great Grandfathers, a Grandmother and another 12 Uncles and Aunts of the editor of Trinity News, Hazel. But also because I have been researching both Hazel's and my family trees for a good number of years and Family Tree Research really interests me, as did the story about 5 brothers, whose father was a Methodist Minister, and who all became Methodist Ministers with one of their sisters marrying a Methodist Minister too, a story Hazel knew from childhood and intrigued and interested me when she told me, so I decided to do some research into it, and write an article.

The original research on this part of Hazel's family was undertaken by Thomas Whitley Moran who was Hazel's First cousin once removed. Born in 1898 in Ireland, he died in 1978 in Birkenhead. He was an Engineer who at one time worked on the building of the Mersey Tunnel. He undertook much research into his family history and had at least 2 articles published; one on the *Moran* families of Ireland and a book in 1962 on "The Whitleys of Enniskillen". In the National Library of Ireland there is a Manuscript (Ms 111H, fol 98) which is titled: "Copy of Confirmation of Arms to Capt. Thomas Whitley Moran of Hoylake, Cheshire, son of Revd Francis Moran, son of Revd Thomas Moran, son of Ballina, Co. Mayo, Jan 2, 1959."

This brings us to the reason for writing this article. He mentions Revd Thomas Moran who was Hazel's Great Grandfather on her father's side. I have been extremely fortunate in having contacted the **Methodist Historical Society of Ireland**. They have an extensive collection of the stationing, family history and photos of many of the Methodist Ministers who served in Ireland.

The picture on the right is Hazel's Great Grandfather Revd Thomas Moran who was born in Ballina in Co Mayo (sometimes it was in Co Sligo) in 1828, son of Thomas Moran and Mary Rutledge. Thomas grew up in Ballina and he wrote for the Ballina Herald. In 1851 he was accepted for the Methodist Ministry at the Conference in Belfast. He was initially stationed in Omagh where he took part in a mission. From his appointments' list he mostly moved every 3 years becoming a Supernumerary in 1897. In total he was a Methodist Minister from 1851 to 1904 and he was known for travelling around Ireland on horseback. He was mentioned in Cruikshank's "History of Methodism in Ireland".



Pictures of Downhill house near Ballina as it was (Painting), as it is now as a Hotel, with myself and Hazel outside the entrance. Hazel's Grandfather, the Revd Thomas MORAN was probably born there and it was also the home of his parents (Thomas & Mary) and grandparents (Francis & Margaret).





His marriage was in the Londonderry Standard and Londonderry Sentinel June 5, 1857: "Moran – Hickey. On Monday, the 25<sup>th</sup> ult, in the Wesleyan Chapel, Omagh, by the father of the bride, the Revd Thomas Moran, Wesleyan Minister, to Margaret Cecilia, eldest daughter of the Revd Thomas Hickey, Wesleyan Minister, Omagh."

Revd Thomas Hickey (1815-1882) is another of Hazel's Great Grandfathers and again he was a Methodist Minister 1835 to 1882. He was initially at Coleraine finishing up at Kinsale in Ireland before coming to Manchester in 1866 as a Supernumerary in the Oxford Road Circuit and then the Cheetham Hill Circuit where he was Chaplain to the Cemetery. Thomas and Margaret Moran had 13 Children, of which two died as infants. Of the rest, 5 went on to become Methodist Ministers and one of their daughters married a Methodist Minister. Details as follows:


1. Eldest son Revd Thomas Moran (1858-1927) - Methodist Minister from 1878 to 1927

He was Wesleyan Chaplain to the Troops, Curragh Camp 1889-1895, and to the Naval and

Military Forces at Queenstown Harbour and other Naval Ports on the South and West Coast of Ireland. He opened up the Methodist, Naval work at Berehaven and other Naval Ports in the S.W. of Ireland and was the first Free Church Minister who obtained permission to conduct parade services on board HM Ships. His final posting was to Queenstown (now Cobh) from 1902 until his death in 1927.

He was an Author of 'Corporal Stanley and his Comrades: A Curragh Camp Story', published 1898 by C H Kelly (Service in Song with associated lanternslides); 'Bravo, Sergeant Campbell!!' (A set of 40 slides); 'Three Cheers for Campbell'; J W Butcher (Service in Song with associated lantern slides); 'Jack ashore'; 'Timothy O' O'Brady and his Tormentors: a Tipperary Temperance Tale' or 'Tarbarrel Tim'.

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> son Revd Francis Moran (1859-1943) – Methodist Minister 1885-1943


At Trinity College Dublin he was a Sizar, a Scholar and a Moderator in Mathematics, a First Honourman in Experimental Science, Senior Exhibitioner, and a Prizeman in English Literature and in Hebrew. He was a member of the Board of Examiners of the Methodist Church and also held the appointment of examiner in mathematics under the Board of Intermediate Education, Ireland. Like Thomas he regularly moved with appointments of 2 – 4 years duration becoming a Supernumerary from 1928 ending up in Bangor. He had 3 children. a son, Francis who was killed on the Somme on 23 August 1916, age 23; Thomas Whitley Moran, previously mentioned and a daughter, Alice Griffin Moran.



John was only a Methodist Minister from 1885 to 1904 when he voluntarily retired and transferred to the Church of Ireland becoming firstly a Deacon, then Curate and Chaplain in WWI, etc, retiring in 1938. He Published: 'On the Shores of the Lough. Lougbar'. Also songs: 'Shadows and Sunlight', 'Caminarry', 'When the sun goes down on the Shannon', etc

#### 6th son Revd William Patrick Moran (1875-1952) - Methodist Minister 1900-1952

William was a Methodist Minister from 1900 to 1952 commencing his service at Abbeyleix (Home Mission Station) in 1900 and ending up at Belfast, Donegall Square from 1944-1952. He was a Chairman of District (Londonderry) from 1937-1939, and Supernumerary from 1941 onwards. He married 5 July 1905 at Abbey St MC, Dublin, Adelaide Mary Tomlinson. Their wedding photograph is in the Folk and Transport Museum, Cultra, Co Down, along with her wedding dress and shoes.







#### 5. 7th son Revd Bertram Carson Moran (1878-1962) - Methodist Minister 1902-1962

Bertram worked for a few years as an assistant in a chemist's shop in Skibbereen before becoming an Evangelist in Boyle for a year before being accepted as a candidate for the ministry. He married at Wesley Chapel, Cork 16 Sept 1909, Margaret Crawford (Daisy) Henderson, music teacher. They had no children. As with his brothers he moved every 3 – 5 years commencing at Fivemiletown and finishing at Belfast Ballymct (Sydenham). He was a Supernumerary from 1944 onwards.

Bertram corresponded with Hazel for some time but unfortunately the letters appear not to have survived. Also no pictures of him appear to have survived!

# 6. 2<sup>nd</sup> daughter Kathleen Maria Moran married Revd William Moore (1865-1035) Methodist Minister 1889-1935)

William commenced his ministry at Newtownbutler ending up at Belfast in 1933 as a Supernumerary. In 1930 he was President of the Methodist Church in Ireland. He married Kathleen 18 April 1894. They had no children. Also no picture of him appears to have survived.

I acknowledge the help of the **Methodist Historical Society of Ireland** who have given permission for me to use the photos and biographical information on the various Ministers. Also to Thomas Whitley Moran (and his wife) without whom this article may have never seen the light of day.

#### **BRF Celebrates its first 100 years**

The work of *BRF* (*Bible Reading Fellowship*) recently featured in BBC One's long-running programme *Songs of Praise*. Presented by Kate Bottley, the programme explored the power of the Bible to transform lives. It included features highlighting BRF's Ministries Anna Chaplaincy, Living Faith and Messy Church, along with interviews with Chief Executive Richard Fisher, Anna Chaplaincy founder Debbie Thrower and BRF author Amy Boucher Pye. BRF has its roots in St Matthew's Church in Brixton, South London, where, towards the end of 1921, the Vicar, the Revd Leslie Mannering, was talking with a member of the congregation about the spiritual needs of the church. What could be done to help people 'get a move on' spiritually?'

In January 1922, the Fellowship of St Matthew was launched, with the aim of encouraging spiritual growth through prayer, Bible Reading and Communion. Leslie Mannering produced a leaflet of daily Bible readings, reflections and prayers which, as Richard Fisher explains in the programme, "had such a transforming effect on his congregation that before long other churches in the area started asking if they could have copies for their own congregations." After the programme Richard commented: "We are so delighted with the *Songs of Praise* programme that featured BRF's centenary. Many people have been in touch following the broadcast and we've been very moved by the messages and encouragements that we've received about BRF's ministry." In the years following 1922 the BRF work grew into a worldwide ministry. Even today, the encouragement and resourcing of daily Bible reading remains at the heart of BRF' Living Faith Ministry, alongside newer initiatives such as Anna Chaplaincy, Messy Church and Parenting for Faith. #### SAD NEWS FOR OUR RECYCLING

In the next couple of months we are going to lose two of our recycling collections.

After 31 March we will no longer be able to collect the Baby Food Pouches and Kids Yoghurt Pouches. We have been collecting these since 2016. It was slow to get started but has been increasing over the years and each shipment generates between £10 and £12.

Our biggest loss will be the Crisp Collection, closing on 25 April. This has only been running since March 2019 but has brought in over £300. We collect more crisp packets than any other item.

The reason given for closing these recyclable collections is that Supermarkets are now running their own recycling schemes. That is good news for the planet but not for our charity and I am very sad that we will not have as much to give to 'Pillars'.

However, we are still collecting cake and biscuit wrappers, flexible packaging bags used for dishwasher tabs and detergent capsules, packaging of household wipes like Flash or the anti-bacterial ones, plastic air fresheners, tinted fabric conditioner bottles or the tinted plastic boxes used for home cleaning products. So do please continue to support our scheme by recycling these with us.

This is one of my favourite Bible passages. It sums up in a simple, helpful way what true religion should be. The message is simple: God does not want empty promises or lip service, but our real devotion, from our heart.

#### What does it mean for us?

**Do justly** – Be honest and open in our dealings with others. Be dependable. We should say when things are going wrong and be appreciative when they go well. Be fair in our dealings, whether at home or at work or in church. Keep confidences and never pass on gossip.

**Love mercy** – Give people the benefit of the doubt, do not take advantage of others and do not always criticise or complain. Accept apologies and explanations where we can and be generous.

**Walk humbly** – Quietly get on with things. Do not make a big show of what we do.

**Lastly** we are *required* to do these things, they are not options or choices but requirements. Like many requirements in the Bible, they are simple to understand but not always simple to do.
