



Dear Friends,

Strike a light!

When I was growing up I spent quite a lot of time listening to the "wireless," so *Journey into Space*, *Children's favourites* and *Listen with Mother* were all important parts of my weekly routine at different times of my life.

I have recently re-discovered the radio. How different it is now that I can tune into BBC Sounds on my ipad and download programmes to listen to when and where I want. I can even make the experience private by listening on my headphones.

One of my favourite stations is Radio 4 extra, where there is a mixture of comedy series from the past, old detective serials, modern music, podcasts and other programmes. I was recently captivated by a broadcast called "The Moth Radio Hour" where ordinary people recount exceptional or mundane, happy or sad events from their own lives. The surprising part is that they do this in front of an audience and without notes. Tune in and hear it for yourself, you will be enchanted.

The "Moth" programme reminded me of a visit I paid as a young student in the 1960s to an evangelical, protestant, Polish church in Northern France. It was an amazing place both because of the community of Polish coal miners that it served but also because the services were so different from any other worship I had experienced before and because they lasted three to four hours each time.

I vividly remember some of the congregation being called to the front of the Church to give testimonies of what God had done in their lives that week. Each person was given a long, lit match to hold and they were only allowed to speak while the match burned. Everyone had so much to say that I am sure there were quite a few singed fingers.

I decided this week to try this for myself....you can imagine how difficult I found it to say anything meaningful within the space of 53 seconds, even though I chose a very long

match! However the match itself taught me a great deal about my life and experience as a Christian.

Firstly, on first lighting the match, it flared up and burned really brightly, just as I, as a young Christian was full of certainty about my faith and my understanding of what God was doing in my life and everywhere else. I had so much confidence (and not a little arrogance) in sharing that certainty with other people.

As the match continued to burn, it was in danger of going out. That reminded me of my later teenage years.

Having accepted Jesus when I was a young teenager, I tried to offload his influence during the 1960s, living through the era of swinging London (or in my case Bristol). How grateful I am to those other Christians who kept my faith "alight" through those years. In fact I would never have been in that Church in France, if it had not been for one of my lecturers and his wife, both committed Christians, who needed me to translate for them on a fact-finding trip for a book about The Slavic Gospel Association.

Halfway through its burn, my testimony match was looking pretty dodgy and the flame was quite feeble. If I turned the match onto its side...quite an awkward position to hold, I could keep the flame going and it seemed to find new fuel in the stick.

I too have found the awkward positions and situations in my life have been times when my faith has found new fuel in God's word, in The Bible, to keep me going. The oxygen of The Holy Spirit has kept my flame (however feeble) from going out. I have always been encouraged by the fact that the Holy Spirit filled the Disciples with such understanding and courage after Pentecost because they were such an unlikely lot to begin with. They were always failing to understand Jesus' stick.

Eventually my match burned out. I was of course forced to drop it (onto a safe surface) before I was burned too. I needed far more time to tell my story or recount all of God's goodness to me (Undeserved all the time and under- appreciated most of the time). Cutting the time short made me realise just how much I have to be grateful for...I could have used a whole box full of matches and still not be finished.

When my life's match has come to its end I know I will still want more time to recount just how amazing is the offer God has made to all of us, to experience life in all its fullness through the death and resurrection of His son. Let's appreciate the opportunities we have to speak, while our matches are still burning and set the whole world (or even just Basingstoke) ablaze with the story of Jesus.

From Andrew Pitt - 08.03.22

For those of you who have known me for a while, you will probably know that I like a challenge and if I can raise money for a good cause while doing it then that's an added bonus.

In 2020 I set myself the challenge of running the London Landmarks Half Marathon & taking part in my first Triathlon. Sadly, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic neither of these challenges could happen. However due to the generosity of family and friends I raised £700 for Mind.

In 2021 I finally got to complete my 2020 challenges as I took part in the Vitality Big Half, Blenheim Sprint Triathlon & The London Olympic Triathlon. Not satisfied with this and having slightly caught the triathlon bug I started to look at what to do in 2022. My head - perhaps foolishly - has settled on trying to complete a Half Ironman or 70.3 Triathlon. This consists of a 1.2 Mile Swim, 56 Miles Cycle & Half Marathon (13.1 Miles - thus completing the 70.3 distance).

In the latter part of 2021 I also thought about fundraising as part of the journey and Mind is a charity that is very close to my heart. 1 in 4 people will experience a mental health issue of some kind each year in England. This may or may not come as a surprise to you, but we live in a society where mental health isn't getting the funding or publicity that it needs. All too often people go through their battles alone, on an NHS waiting list, or not knowing who to turn to.

When I needed someone to turn to, the people at Mind were there to help and guide me and I will forever be grateful for that. This is my way of giving back to them and hopefully providing some much-needed funding to help others in their times of need.

Here is a post from one of my recent blogs:

For the past 2 weekends I have been down to Sevenoaks to recce the cycle route for one of the buildup events that I will be doing before tackling the full

Half Ironman Event. Last weekend me and Henry went and did the 28km ride and this weekend Tom joined me.

On the 24th April, Me, Tom, Henry & Rebecca will be taking part in the 70aks Triathlon. This Sprint Distance (400m Swim, 25km Cycle & 5km Run) is a perfect starter event for Tom, Henry & Rebecca who will be tackling their first ever Triathlon. For me it will be a good reminder of the Race-day routine and a good measure for how my training is going.

The Swim will be 400 metres in the pool at the Sevenoaks Leisure Centre – one of the most common fears for first time triathletes is swimming in open-water and so this event is a perfect introduction to a Triathlon. The distance is quite short with people likely to take between 5-15 minutes and obviously there's no chance of a fish nibbling at you to freak you out. The bike route is a 25km ride around the Kent rolling countryside with 2 – 3 noticeable climbs, followed by a 5km run through Knole Deer Park.

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Reflexions

I am truly spiritually sustained with the items I see in the Trinity newsletter which have been sent in by members of our congregation, and for Hazel's encouragement to do so; she says, "I so look forward to receiving your lovely and varied articles. PLEASE KEEP THEM COMING."

Well, at this moment of time, I would like to thank the Lord for the lives of Doris, Gordon and Kathleen Crouch, and to make a special mention of Kathleen's participation in all this.

When I first came to Hampshire as a raw greenhorn recruit in the field of the hearing impaired, I was handed a long list of deaf persons to visit in North Hants, and the first deaf folk I visited were these lovely folk. Doris opened the door and I introduced myself, very sensitive at using another language (British Sign Language) and not my own. She beamed with that delightful smile of hers. That put me at ease immediately, and as I stepped over the threshold, the 1st question she asked was "Would you like a cuppa tea?"

After that first visit and in my first week in Hants, Doris and family and about a dozen deaf friends of theirs came to the Basingstoke Social Services to see me. Doris was their spokesperson. She said, with a polite smile, "We would like a church to worship in, like hearing people do".

By coincidence my family and I had been looking for a church only a couple of days before and spoke to the Revd Leonard Clough, Trinity's padre at that time. We had decided that Trinity was the church we favoured. Later I contacted the Revd Clough again regarding the issue Doris and Co presented to me. A wonderful welcome opened up for them too.

Since those distant past years when we all worshipped together, and have all grown old together and I feel sad when I see photos of those Christmas services over the years when deaf and hearing folk worshipped together, especially at that time of the year. The sadness comes because I see joyful faces that are no longer with us. They have all been promoted to glory, as Babtist's friends would say. Well, I still know I can talk to them through prayer. There will be no worries about deafness. Kathleen had normal hearing but was not able to speak. She is now with her parents, and she will be overjoyed in their presence and being so happy with her new spiritual body.

Hallelujah!

Longest overdue library book has been returned - 313 years late!

If you have ever been late in returning a library book, take heart: the 1704 copy of 'The Faith and Practice of a Church of England Man' was recently handed back to Sheffield Cathedral.

A handwritten inscription inside reads: "This Book belongs to ye Lending Library in Sheffield Church 1709." It left the library just over 300 years ago.

Sheffield Cathedral's Reverend Canon Keith Farrow said that the family of a deceased woman who lived locally had asked in her will for it to be returned.

"Now it's come back home. It's a joy to have this little jewel back in the Cathedral." With overdue fines of 50p a day, librarians could have charged the family more than £54,000 for the book — which itself is worth about £300.

The Canon joked: "We might have got a new roof or something."

90 years ago, on 9 May 1932 London's Piccadilly Circus was lit with electrical lighting for the first time. The road junction later became famous for its neon lighting and video advertising displays.

"It Can't Be Carried Alone"

Circuit Responses to the Ukraine:

This is a very quick note to thank everyone who responded to this week's appeal for food and sleeping bags for Ukraine (also see the images attached). More than a dozen local churches contributed. Across the Circuit, churches from Caversham Heights to Basingstoke, and from Lower Early to Mortimer turned up to contribute to this mammoth effort. Neighbours shared posts on whatsapp, and facebook, and we estimate that more than 1000 individuals and families contributed to this appeal.

On Friday around five tonnes was boxed and loaded into trailers, including approximately 1700kg of fish, 1400kg of meat, 1100 kg of baby food, 241 sleeping bags, 18 boxes of

sanitary products, 276 can openers and more than 1000 sturdy bags. Further boxing on Saturday, and an £18,000 shop at a local wholesaler, brought the total to approximately:

3.5 tonnes of fish
2.5 tonnes of meat
2 tonnes of baby food
25 boxes of sanitary products
300 sleeping bags
300 can openers
1250 bags for life





We apologise that we can't be more precise with final weights and have definitely found it hard to capture the enormity of this collection in pictures. We've attached two images that show something of the scale, and a link to a brief video showing some of the action in the Reading School Chapel on Friday can be found here. At the time of writing six vehicles and trailers have been weighed and are ready to travel to Newcastle. The vehicles that have left Reading will be joined by a further convoy in Darlington.

We would like to thank everyone involved and ask for your prayers for those whose efforts over the next few days will see this load arriving in towns and villages from Krakow to Kharkiv. In particular please think of those from Kyiv to Kharkiv who are still sheltering underground, and for whom the current situation is becoming desperate.

Thanks to everyone who gave anything. For those sheltering from hypersonic missiles, from cluster bombs and from barbaric and inhuman acts, your kindness will make a difference. Anyone who would like to join with others in taking the next step and hosting Ukrainian refugees or supporting them in any way when they come to the UK is invited to sign up via this form https://forms.office.com/r/QSMWfrejpU.

Over the next few weeks we will be working as hard as we can to pair local families and begin VISA applications. We'll be phoning those who've signed up, asking for photos of host families and will begin actively trying to match hosts with refugees in Poland from April 4th. We've currently got 23 hosts signed up in the local area, and would love to reach 50. We've got training, support and a network of 100s who can provide meals, social activities, donations of food and toys and support with job hunting. Please don't hesitate to reach out if you can help at all in this next phase. We'll be in touch again if another convoy looks likely. With thanks again for all your efforts,

The Ascension

This month at Ascension Day, we remember Jesus ascending to 'God's right hand' (1 Peter 3:22). It's a somewhat neglected Christian festival, taking place on a Thursday, 40 days after Easter. However, this phrase is used in three different contexts in the New Testament.

Sitting at God's right hand

Jesus occupies a position of power and authority at the centre of the universe, 'exalted to the right hand of God' (Acts 2:33). This position was secured by His death and resurrection, enabling us to experience the life of heaven, including eternal life, forgiveness, healing and the power to transform lives and communities. Is this our expectation and experience?

Standing at God's right hand

Our experience of heaven is only partial because of the presence of suffering and disappointment in our lives. Stephen, the first Christian martyr, saw Jesus 'standing at the right hand of God' (Acts 7:56), when being stoned to death. Do we see that Jesus is on the throne and has a purpose for our lives, even when we are going through setbacks and difficulties? As a result of Stephen's death, the church grew and the apostle Paul was impacted. Where do we see the fruit of the suffering in our lives?

Praying at God's right hand

Finally, we are told that Jesus is *'interceding for us'* at God's right hand (Romans 8:34 & Hebrews 7:25). Jesus is on our side at the heart of the universe and fully knows our needs when praying for us. He is for us, even when we feel defeated by the wrong things in our lives. How does this help us now?

So where has Jesus gone? Because He is in heaven, the Ascension opens up the possibility that we can experience the life of heaven, both now and in eternity.

Christian Basics: Understanding the Bible

The Bible is a popular book, with five billion copies sold worldwide every year, as well as a uniquely precious book. At her Coronation the Queen was given a Bible, 'the most precious thing this world affords'.

The Bible isn't simply one book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over a period of 1500 years in a range of styles including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (looking at the end times). Despite having a number of different writers, the Bible claims one author – God Himself! As the Word of God, it is the primary way by which God speaks to us. 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and is a manual for life, equipping us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit, who helps us to apply its words to our lives: 'But when He, the Spirit of truth, comes, He will guide you into all truth' John 16:13.

The Bible can also be described as a *love letter* from God, as it deepens our relationship with Him. Jesus said: 'You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by them you possess eternal life. These are the Scriptures that testify about Me, yet you refuse to come to Me to have life' (John 5:39,40). Christians follow a person not a book, and the Scriptures are intended to help us to know Jesus better. Like a signpost,

the Bible points us to the person of Jesus.

Chaplains also chat to passengers, passers-by, concession holders, staff and taxi drivers in and around the railway station – it is a very busy area. We now have two Chaplains regularly meeting bus drivers and staff.

We need more Chaplains – Christians willing to give at least one hour a week to meet people in different contexts in the town centre or in a care home. We have been active in making our presence known and have received support from Festival Place (we are now advertised on their App) and the Borough Council, where the Mayor has invited representatives from the Chaplaincy and Street Pastors, to tea to express thanks for our services to the community.

A few printed versions of the new Highway Code available for people to look at, might just save somebody from an accident!

Out and about on the roads? Remember the NEW Highway Code

When did you last read the Highway Code? Various 'fundamental' changes were recently made which will surely affect you. For example, there is a new hierarchy of road users, where drivers now have new responsibilities to watch out for people who are walking, cycling, or riding a horse. Another example is that cyclists are now advised to cycle in the centre of lanes in slower-moving traffic.

Finally, do you even know how best to open your car door? According to the Highway Code, you should use your hand on the opposite side to the door you are opening; for example, use your left hand to open a door on your right-hand side. This will make you turn your head to look over your shoulder. You are then more likely to avoid causing injury to cyclists or motorcyclists passing you on the road, or to people on the pavement.

Time to Welcome your Slugs and Snails!

So says the Royal Horticultural Society, as it recently began a campaign to encourage us to see the gastropods in our gardens in a better light.

The RHS says that the species play a key role in garden ecosystems, and thus are in need of 'positive PR'. It seems that only nine of the 44 known species in the UK are likely to threaten our gardens, and that all of them play a vital role in recycling dead plant material and animal waste, and acting as a food source for hedgehogs, frogs, birds, beetles and flies. In fact, the RHS's principal entomologist says that we should consider our slugs and snails not



as marauding pests bent on eating our flowers and vegetables, but rather as 'garden visitors'.

Continuing the occasional series looking at stories BEHIND some of our favourite hymns.

The story behind 'Thine be the glory, risen, conquering Son'

Here is a hymn that is so well known and loved that it has simply burst the bounds of Easter, and gets sung regularly at other times of the year. It has two stories behind it.

First, the music. The rousing music did not start out as a hymn, but instead was written by Handel for his opera 'Judas Maccabeus', first performed in 1746. Originally the words ran 'See the conquering hero comes', for Handel's opera tells the story (found in the Apocrypha) of the leader of the Jews, Judas Maccabeus, who led an army against the Syrians and restored worship at the Temple. With its triumphant refrain after each verse, the music is easy to learn and sing, and can be (and has been!) played to great effect either by the trumpets, on an organ in a large resonant church, or even on guitars (!).

Secondly, the words. They were not written until 1884, which was 138 years after the music. We owe them to the Revd Raymond Budry, a Swiss pastor from Lausanne. Ordained in the Free Evangelical Church in Vaud, he spent 35 years as the pastor of Vevey on Lake Geneva. Budry wrote the hymn in French ('A Toi La Gloire!') to console himself after the death of his first wife, and a year later (1885) it was published in *Chants Evangeliques*. Soon it found its way into English – translated by a Baptist minister from Kingston-upon-Thames, Richard Hoyle. It is not clear who first had the happy idea of teaming those words with that music, but when they did, the hymn really took off. By 1904 it was being translated into other languages. The theme of 'battle' is never far from this hymn, whether it was the battle of Judas Maccabeus, or the battle over sin which was won by Christ on the cross and in rising from the tomb. Easter, of course, marked the biggest victory over the biggest enemies of all time: sin and death.

What would Handel make of it, if he could know that his battle music had become one of the world's most popular and well-known Easter hymns? He was a devout man, working for the poor, praying twice each day, and attending St Paul's Cathedral.

So, it seems pretty certain that he would be delighted. (Parish Pump)

Nigel Beeton writes: 'Now our thoughts are overshadowed by the terrible situation in the Ukraine. I looked at the masses of people on the station platforms, and I thought, "only a couple of months ago, each one of those people had a life, a home, a shop to buy food, perhaps somewhere to grow daffodils, maybe a church to worship God, and their own hopes and dreams for the future. Now they are just part of a mass of people shuffling towards a westbound train.'

Everything's gone, and all that is 'me' summed up in a word - the word 'refugee'. I have no control, no say in my fate, just one in a crowd, I stand and I wait.

Waiting for what? The future's unclear, for armed men have taken all that I held dear Along with my hopes, and all I had planned all swept away by the tanks in my land.

One thing alone puts a smile on my face a far nicer stranger has come to this place; A bed for the night? A cup of hot tea? And - best of all - someone who sees me as me.





SAD NEWS FOR OUR RECYCLING

In the next month or so we are going to lose two of our recycling collections.

After 31 March we will no longer be able to collect the Baby Food Pouches and Kids Yoghurt Pouches. We have been collecting these since 2016. It was slow to get started but has been increasing over the years and each shipment generates between £10 and £12.

Our biggest loss will be the Crisp Collection, closing on 25 April. This has only been running since March 2019 but has brought in over £300. We collect more crisp packets than any other item.

The reason given for closing these recyclable collections is that Supermarkets are now running their own recycling schemes. That is good news for the planet but not for our charity and I am very sad that we will not have as much to give to 'Pillars'.

However, we are still collecting cake and biscuit wrappers, flexible packaging bags used for dishwasher tabs and detergent capsules, packaging of household wipes like Flash or the anti-bacterial ones, plastic air fresheners, tinted fabric conditioner bottles or the tinted plastic boxes used for home cleaning products. So do please continue to support our scheme by recycling these with us.






