



Dear Friends

On Sunday 19th May there will an important birthday. It's Pentecost, recognized as the birthday of the Christian Church, because it celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit to Jesus's apostles (Acts 2). The Greek word Pentecost means 'fiftieth' and derives from a Jewish harvest festival called Shavuot, which is 50 days after the festival of Passover. The apostles were celebrating this festival when they received the Holy Spirit with wind and flame.

Many of us will recall the old name of Whitsun, named after the white garments worn by those baptized on that day. Whit Monday was a Bank Holiday and church and chapels, particularly in the North of England celebrated with church and chapel parades known as 'whit walks.'

Pentecost is certainly up there with Christmas and Easter in terms of its importance and significance in the Christian calendar so why doesn't it have the same prominence as the other two festivals? Certainly, it is unlikely to attract the same degree of commercialization as the other celebrations but I think, even for Christians, that there is something about the concept of the Holy Spirit which we find difficult to get our heads round. We are physical and relational people and while it is easy to relate to God the Father and God the Son, it is difficult to imagine God the Holy Spirit — it is too elusive, rather an abstract idea. In a Star Wars sort of way thought of as a 'force' being with us' rather than a person.

A week after Pentecost, we celebrate Trinity Sunday when we affirm the concept of three persons in one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This can be a tricky subject if you are preaching that day although the option at Trinity was to celebrate the Church Anniversary instead! But the Bible is clear that the Holy Spirit is a person: he talks, he teaches, he guides, he leads (John 16:13-15). And, as God, he doesn't just want to 'power us up'; he wants to have a relationship with us. So, we should use a personal pronoun when referring to

the Spirit (i.e. he/she) not 'it'.

Jesus said "He who has seen me has seen the Father" and the Holy Spirit is the Father's life and power reaching through all the world. Therefore, Jesus too shows us what the Spirit is like. If we look at the life of Jesus on earth, we see that everywhere he went he made an impact How did he teach with authority, heal the sick, drive out demons and raise the dead? Through the power of the Spirit and that Spirit is available for us too, to use for God's work in the world although it may challenge us with new ideas and different ways of thinking about what it means to be God's people in today's world.

When we speak of the church, we are not talking of an organization or a club. We are talking about people called to be together to share Jesus' love and show that love to the world. Do we really believe the Holy Spirit is still as powerful and active in the world today as it was nearly two thousand years ago when those first believers received it with wind and flames? 'What influences the power and scope of the Spirit in our world is up to us and our response to its calling and prompting.

So, as we celebrate Pentecost, we thank God for His gift to us of the Holy Spirit. Let us open ourselves up to his presence, his truth and his power in our lives and we offer up a prayer that we may become God's Spirit filled people in his Spirit filled Church.

Happy Pentecost and may the Spirit be with you!

Sound and Vision in our building!

I wanted to say a thank you to everybody who filled in the questionnaire on sound and vision things in the main hall. Also a thank you to everybody who came to our meeting on 6th April, when we explored the issues in a different way. Some of you who could not come to this meeting have spoken to me separately.



There seems to be a common view that:

- 1. It is often difficult to hear sufficiently clearly, especially if at the sides or back of the hall or near the organ.
- 2. People who use the loop probably have better sound than those who do not.
- 3. The screen is difficult to see if for those who are short, or sitting, when there are people, especially tall people, standing in front.
- 4. There is a light cast from the East window which makes things difficult to see on the screen.
- 5. For those leading worship the screens are placed badly.

There were varied views about the differences between fixed microphones and clip on ones, and there were varied views about the colours used in the projected words.

There were also views expressed about whether people needed training to use microphones effectively, and also about the use of pictures and videos with the words of hymns etc. Whilst important, these are not anything to do with the equipment, but how it is used, and so the solution is about how we use the technology.

To solve the sound equipment issues is likely to involve some detailed technical discussions and I have asked our team of specialists to suggest what might be needed. These solutions however are expected to be generally invisible.

To solve the visual issues on the other hand is likely to be simpler, and several of you have made different suggestions, which accord with those of the working group. However the solutions will be more visible and change the appearance of the hall in some way.

At the meeting on 6th April, we also discussed what else we would like to have to further benefit our worship and mission, beyond just fixing the problems we experience. There were few views expressed, and my sense was that people needed some time to answer this. As a result, we felt that we should not tackle everything, until the church was clearer about what was needed in addition to "fixing" the system.

We did feel though that it would be worth putting some effort into solving some of the sound problems, using our in-house expertise, supported by external contractors. This would offer some improvement whilst we all, as a church, decide what technology is required for worship and mission.

This last element is very important. Understanding our wider mission is key to the process of establishing our Audio-Visual needs:

Therefore I plan to bring to Church Council on 13th May,

- 1. A proposal to provide a "quick fix" to address some of the sound issues.
- 2. A proposal to have an open discussion about what to do about visual issues.
- 3. A proposal to have an open discussion about our wider worship and missionary work.

Church Council is open to everybody – you do not have to be a member of Church Council to attend, speak or ask questions. People who are not members cannot vote on formal proposals, but speaking personally, I think it helps members to hear comments and thoughts from as wide a group as possible. So I would invite you to come, whether or not you are a member of Church Council.

2,000 Years of Christian Song

Where do you start? Well, this was the title of a retreat day at St. Columbia's House in Woking. This Christian Retreat House, belonged to the Guildford Diocese, C of E, is a place I often visit, and I had looked forward to this day, for several months.

The subject is massive, and only the tip of it was explored, but it was enough to whet the appetite, towards new discovery.

We started with Caedmon's Hymn (673-735). He was an unmusical cow herder, who miraculously empowered, sang in praise of God the Creator.

We went on to look at Gregorian Chants, (I am pleased I am not a monk!)

Then on through the medieval period, to the reformation, Luther, Calvin, and Knox, where things were rather restrained, to the Hymn explosion of Charles and John Wesley, Issac Watts, John Newton and William Cowper.

Followed by today's hymn writers, Elizabeth Cosnet, Fred Kaan, Timothy Dudley-Smith, Fred Pratt Green to Grahem Kendrick and Martin Leckebusch, picking up along the way, 'Ubi Caritas' from Taizé, and then. Calypso Denominations also have their own doctrines of belief, and these are expressed in their Hymn singing.

The psalms praise God, in every situation of human life.

The psalmist sings in Psalm 27 'The Lord is my light, and my salvation. Whom shall I fear?'

It was a full day in Woking! Not for the faint hearted, but a day of praise to God, and I enjoyed it immeasurably.

Testing Our Core Beliefs

My wife Llyn, and I have been having discussions in recent weeks with members of the Jehovah Witness (JW) Christian Community who periodically call at our home. We always welcome them in as we enjoy hearing the views of other Christian groups to see how their views differ from our Methodist teaching, and also importantly to see if we share common ground with them. On several occasions I have been invited and attended meetings at the JW Kingdom Hall in Winklebury to see first-hand how they conduct their worship.

There are many serious differences between JWs and Methodists in our Christian beliefs:-

- JWs do not believe in the Trinity, only in the one God Jehovah.
- The Holy Spirit is not a person but God's active force.
- Jesus is not God, but an archangel created by God.
- Only JW leaders take Communion, the congregation as a whole are only spectators.
- Only 144,000 JWs (JW leaders) will enter the Kingdom of Heaven, and reign with Jesus, Revelation 7. The rest of the JWs, the great multitude, will cease to exist, and only be retained in Jehovah's memory. When God creates His Kingdom on Earth they will be recreated, live their lives on a Paradise Earth, and never see Jesus.
- JWs do not believe that sinners are punished in Hell, only that they cease to exist on their mortal death.

There are many more differences that can be seen in their literature.

Our discussions are always respectful of each other's views and invariably end in a stalemate, as neither party can agree with the belief of the other. The differences in fact are mainly due to our differing interpretations of the original Hebrew and Greek translations of the Gospels, a subject for theologian academic debate. What we did find however was that there are some core Christian beliefs that we all share which are fundamental to our Salvation, and which in fact are the foundation of Christian Belief across the whole worldwide Christian Church. These being:-

- The blood sacrifice of Jesus has paid the price for the sins of all mankind.
- We must sincerely repent of our sins.
- We must be obedient to God's two Greatest Commandments, "Love the Lord our God" and "Love your neighbour as yourself", Matthew 12:28-31.
- We must work in the Vineyard as in Matthew 20:1-16.
- At the day of judgement we will be judged in accordance with Matthew 25:31-46, "The Sheep and the Goats.

Ultimately our Lord will judge us on our belief in Him and our obedience to His Word in our lifetime. For my part my Methodist Church community provides me with all the love and support that I need to follow this path, and to work for Him in the Vineyards that He has chosen for me.

It is not for us to be judgemental on the beliefs of others but only to share with them our understanding of the Christian Faith, and how it has transformed our lives.

• Tell me how it is that in this room there are three candles and but one light, and I will explain to you the mode of the divine existence – *John Wesley*

REFLECTIONS

During the past three weeks (which included Easter) I was confined to my flat due to a severe chest infection. Most importantly, I wish to thank my Church family for the telephone calls, get well cards and especially the healing prayers said on my behalf. After several changes of medication, and God's blessing, I am pleased to say that my life is now getting back to normal.

As someone who goes out every day, I found being stuck indoors quite difficult. I therefore decided to use this enforced rest, as a time of "retreat", spending time on Bible study, prayer and contemplating the state of our world. I also read a couple of journals I wrote during the first year of my retirement (24 years ago); the first journal was a daily record of my life as a retiree, the other journal was my experience as a first-time allotment holder. In many ways my ill health became a blessing, as it gave me a much-needed opportunity to do nothing but rest and reflect on past, present and future hopes. All in all a very cathartic experience.

Jesus was born to facilitate reconciliation between sinful humans and a Holy God, through his sacrificial death, burial, resurrection and ascension back to God. During my three weeks convalescing, the only real changes I could see in our World from the time of Jesus and now, is that we have advanced in all manner of things like technology, and sciences, but fundamentally humanity has not changed. Two bible passages come to mind that are very relevant in today's world:

Prior to his death Moses spoke at length to a diverse nation, facing uncertain times.... **Deuteronomy 30. V15-20.**

"Today, I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing. Choose life, that you may live loving the Lord your God, obeying his voice and holding fast to him".

Hosea's plea to a nation in turmoil.... Hosea 6. V1-3.

"Come, let us return to the Lord for he has torn us that he may heal us; He has struck us down and he will bind us up.

Let us know, let us press on to know the Lord, his going forth is as sure as the dawn; He will come to us as showers, as spring rains that water the earth".

I love the diversity of different cultures and we benefit so much more by learning their histories and shared experiences, all beginning with hospitality which is 'basic' to most other religions in the world.

I wonder have we Christians been too quiet or too polite, over recent years? Perhaps it is now time for all Christians worldwide, to unite and bring some light, and common sense to a very strange world that is now emerging.

He could not leave quick enough, he practically ran.

The boys of course noticed this and I went up in their estimation no end. To work with boys you have to gain their respect, it is not given – you have to earn it. This happening did me a power

of good in that direction.

I went on many courses but I think this was the most informative.

Canon Paul Hardingham – What's the Big Idea? – Introduction to Books of the Old Testament: Deuteronomy & Joshua

The setting for these books is Israel's entry into the promised land after 40 years of wanderings in the wilderness. Deuteronomy gives us Moses' addresses on the plains of Moab, as the Israelites prepare to enter Canaan. The book of Joshua recounts the crossing of the Jordan and the victories that give the people control of Canaan.

The theme of Deuteronomy is God's covenant and his call for His people's obedience, loyalty and love. The 'shema' (Heb: 'hear'), expresses this response to God: 'Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts.' (Deut. 6:4-6).

The book contains instruction on how to live intentionally as God's people in response to His love and mercy. Total loyalty to God is also crucial, with the worship of any other gods being totally rejected. It is also widely quoted in the NT eg. Jesus' temptations (Deut. 8:3, 6:13, 16).

The book of Joshua, with its description of the conquest of the land and the destruction of cities and peoples, reminds us that God's love and purposes for us are worked out in the messes, storms and sins of our daily lives. As God says Joshua: 'Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go.' (Joshua 1:9).

Joshua ('The Lord saves') is the same name as Jesus Himself. Jesus overcame all powers of evil to bring God's people into their eternal 'rest' (Heb 4:1–11).

Duke of Edinburgh is Appointed as Lord High Commissioner (PP)

Prince Edward, the Duke of Edinburgh, has been appointed as the Lord High Commissioner to the 2024 General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, a decade after he last took on the role of royal representative at the annual gathering.

The Lord High Commissioner is the Sovereign's personal representative to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland and is appointed by His Majesty the King to attend proceedings on his behalf. The Duke of Edinburgh is also expected to participate in other events and functions while visiting the capital.

Prince Edward was previously Lord High Commissioner in 2014, when he held the title of Earl of Wessex, and represented his mother, the late Queen.

Canon Paul Hardingham Considers the Ascension,

which this year we commemorate on **Thursday 9 May** (taken from PP)

The Truth of the Ascension

'While He was blessing them, Jesus left them and was taken up into heaven.' (Luke 24:51).

The Ascension is a hugely neglected festival, which deserves to have a bigger place in our church life. How do we understand it?

The Ascension tells us that Jesus is in control: 'Jesus has gone into heaven and is at God's right hand' (1 Peter 3:22). Jesus occupies the top spot in the universe; the control of our world is in the safe, scarred hands of Jesus. We can offer Him our worship and allegiance, knowing that His plans are better than those of any Prime Minister or President.

The Ascension tells us that God is committed to His world: 'And God raised us up with Christ and seated us with Him in the heavenly realms in Christ Jesus' (Ephesians 2:6). Jesus did not leave His humanity behind when He ascended, for we are raised with Christ to heaven. Therefore, God is bound to His world and we can trust Him to fulfil His purposes for our lives and world.

The Ascension gives us a job to do: 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations' (Matthew 28:18,19). God's way of working in the world is through us. He commissions us for this task at the Ascension and equips us at Pentecost. We are called to make disciples, starting in our workplace, family and community.

'Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which He looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which He blesses all the world.' (Teresa of Avila).

The Story behind the Hymn – 'Praise my Soul the King of Heaven'

Praise my soul the King of heaven. To His feet thy tribute bring; Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven, Evermore his praises sing. Alleluia! Alleluia! Praise the everlasting King. Alleluia! Alleluia! Widely yet His mercy flows.

Praise Him for His grace and favour To our fathers in distress: Praise Him. still the same as ever. Slow to chide and swift to bless. Alleluia! Alleluia! Glorious in His faithfulness. Father like, He tends and spares us: Well our feeble frame He knows; In His hands He gently bears us, Rescues us from all our foes.

Angels in the height, adore Him, Ye behold Him face to face; Sun and moon bow down before Him. Dwellers all in time and space: Praise Him! Praise him! Praise with us the God of grace!

by Henry Francis Lyte (1793-1847)

This stately poetic paraphrase of Psalm 103 has been included in probably more solemn ceremonies than any other hymn in the English language. It was even chosen by Queen Elizabeth for her wedding to the Duke of Edinburgh in 1947. Henry Lyte had been a brilliant theological student at university in Dublin, with a gift for versifying. After graduation he moved to a tiny and remote parish in County Wexford to serve his curacy. It was here, when he was about 25, that Henry had a religious experience which would transform his life. A close friend of his, another clergyman, had fallen ill, and was clearly dying. Henry went to visit him. The friend was not as distressed as Henry had imagined he would be. Instead, the friend confessed that he had been re-reading the New Testament, with an eye on eternity, and had made a great discovery. There was no need to rely on religious duties and formalities and good deeds to gain peace with God. Instead, we can trust completely in the mercy of Christ and His saving power.

Henry was sophisticated and had been very formal in his ministry. But this encounter with his friend's faith at death's very door, made him reconsider his faith. He wrote later that his dear friend 'who died happy in the thought that there was One who would atone for his delinquencies' made him 'study my Bible and preach in another manner than I had previously done'. And soon after this hymn appeared, in 1834.

Lyte rejoices in the majesty and wonder of the living God, who in turn loves us. He captures the measure of the Psalm in enduring lyrics, which combine time, eternity, God and man all swept up into one embrace. Its last verse summons all the created order to join in a great act of joyous praise – surely a preview of eternity!
