Dear Friends,

I'm writing this in October ready for publication in the November newsletter.

By then we might know whether we have been matched with a Minister to look after all the Methodist churches in Basingstoke.

At the same time the Circuit is seeking a new Minister for Caversham and Woodley in Reading, and a Probationer Minister for the churches around Tadley.

These are always uncertain times, because we are aware that there is a shortage of Ministers and it is unlikely that we will receive people to lead us in all three situations.

At the same time our Minister, Audrey, will be seeking a new appointment, and we pray for her as she discerns the suitability of the Circuit with which she may be matched.

The Basingstoke churches have been here before, and have known times of prolonged waiting, as when Rev. Jayne Webb left and Rev. David Shaw held the fort for a year, while carrying many other responsibilities.

Please pray for everyone involved in this process - for Ministers who may consider coming to us, for the people involved in the decision about their suitability for us - our District Chair and the Circuit Invitation Committee, made up of Ministers and Circuit Stewards.

The issues it might raise for us include the part we can play in the Church's life in the offer of our skills and experience. We recognise that we are the Body of Christ and that, helpful as it is to have a Minister's leadership, it is the people of the Church who ultimately make the difference in the way we live and serve.

Our Church has many positives, including the depth of our welcome and care for one another.

Another issue that affects this particular situation is that of discerning together a person's gifts and personality and assessing whether what they offer is what we need now.

Discernment through prayer and consultation is one of the many, vital areas of our Christian life together.

It is a great gift to pray for and to seek to deepen among us.

At this time of changed leadership - a new Monarch and a new Prime Minister, it isn't only the Church that needs God's great gift of discernment.

Advent Liturgy 2022

Our Advent candle liturgy this year will involve the whole congregation and use the whole church.

There will be an 'Advent candle station' at four corners of the church, each with a large candle decorated with evergreen foilage.

They will be labelled for the four weeks of Advent with the words HOPE, PEACE, LOVE and JOY. The final candle (for Christmas Day) will be at the front of the church and labelled LIGHT OF THE WORLD.



Each week the congregation will be provided with paper and pens on arrival and are invited to write their own short prayers on that week's theme, before or during the liturgy. These prayers will be gathered and added to each 'station' after the service.

Each week the previous week's candles will be re-lit before the service begins and the new candle lit during the liturgy, with the congregation invited to turn to face that week's candle as it is lit.

The liturgy will include a short reading linked to that week's theme, time for people to write their own short prayers and a prayer to be read after that week's candle is lit. Each week there will be an opportunity to contribute to a retiring collection to support the people of Ukraine.

We hope the liturgy will be a time of blessing as we journey through Advent together.

125 years ago, on 15 November 1897, Aneurin 'Nye' Bevan, British politician was born, the sixth of ten children. The family lived in Tredegar, Monmouthshire, where his father was a miner, and his mother was the daughter of a colliery blacksmith. He was the Minister of Health 1945-51, who led the establishment of the National Health Service.

The document below was prepared by Michael Parker and Margaret Hayes following discussions at the Trinity Church Council Meeting in October. They were authorised by Church Council to do so and then to send it out. Diane Bath read it out at the Sunday Morning Service at Trinity on the 23 October.

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Trinity Methodist Church: The Way Forward – for discussion

As a part of Church Council on Tuesday 18th October 2022 we discussed the three questions that all churches have been given by the last circuit meeting.

- **Are we able to fill the key roles in the church in a way that is sustainable?** (2 Stewards, Safeguarding Office, Property Steward, Treasurer, Church Council Secretary, and Pastoral Secretary)
- **Is our property likely to become prohibitively expensive in the next 3 years?** (Maintenance, cleaning, or energy costs)
- **Is there some way that we might alleviate the pressure on the preaching plan between 10 and 12 on a Sunday?**



The meeting was also attended by 8 other interested Church Members and there were oral presentations on behalf of a CC member who couldn't attend.

We considered the questions in the light of our mission statement – To know Christ and to make him known.

In answer to the first question we concluded that we can't fill these roles and Treasurer and CC Secretary are particularly challenging.

In answer to the second question we were told that free will giving has declined by £10,000, we had a deficit of £25,000 last year, have run a deficit for the last 3 years and budget for a deficit of £15,000 for 2022-23 although that is likely to be more with Utility price rises. There is outstanding work to be done and the quinquennial inspection (property inspection every 5 years) carried out last year focused on replacement of flat roofs which would wipe out our reserves.

It was said that we have a lot of history in the building and love for it, but it is cumbersome, bizarre and too expensive so we need to agree a way forward.

The options discussed were

- **Close the church and disperse our members to other congregations.** This was rejected by the meeting, and it was felt that we should move together although not all might come along. Also that House Groups could support our sense of identity including reforming a Southern House Group.

Trinity Methodist Church: The Way Forward – for discussion (cont’d)

- **Merge with another church on their premises - specifically St Andrews**
There was a long discussion, and it was seen to be a viable option which requires more and wider consideration including the need to understand how their mission is aligned with ours. We understand that this may not resolve all the problems of fulfilling roles.
- **Are there other options to consider?**
Some present wanted to maintain a Methodist presence in the town centre (or even on the current site) and explore options such as renting shop premises or merging with another denomination to form a Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP). We wanted to ensure that no possibilities were ruled out.

The meeting overall felt that the merger with St Andrews (if they are also agreeable to this) was the most realistic option but we didn't want to exclude any other possibilities.

We plan to have an Extraordinary General Church Meeting (EGCM) after the service on 27th November 2022, chaired Rev'd Audrey Browne, where we can receive everyone's views on these and any other ideas following your prayerful reflection.

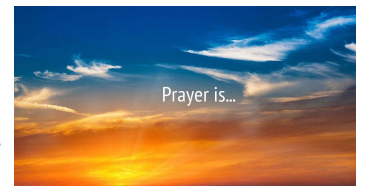
We have chosen this date to allow time for consideration before we fully enter the Advent Season.

In the New Year there will be a further Church Council meeting to agree the definitive way forward. If the merger is agreed, St Andrews will also need their Church Council meeting to agree to this.

Please can you keep the people of Trinity Methodist Church in your prayers as we travel through this process.

100 years ago, on 4 November 1922, British archaeologist Howard Carter discovered the tomb of the Egyptian pharaoh Tutankhamen. On 26 November he reached a second sealed doorway and discovered the famous treasures.

30 years ago, on 20 November 1992, the Windsor Castle fire broke out in a private chapel and spread to a large part of the building. Damage was extensive and took five years to repair, at a cost of £40 million. Buckingham Palace was opened to the public for the first time to help raise the money.

Trinity Church Council Meeting on 18 October 2022

This meeting was scheduled to include discussion about the Way Forward for Trinity. Church Council were joined by eight other church members.

Rev'd Audrey Browne led the meeting in reflection and prayer, welcomed everyone and thanked them for attending this afternoon.

Worship Leaders: Hilary's reporting service was last Sunday (16 October). The meeting welcomed Hilary as a new worship leader, and Hilary expressed her thanks for the support given to her by June Hardcastle and Tony Pitt.

News from the Circuit: Margaret Hayes continues as the Circuit Steward for Trinity. The stationing process is well under way, and profiles have been received. The meeting was asked to keep this in their prayers.

The Worship Group will continue making arrangements for 10 - 12 Sunday services.

Mission Action Plan: Things remain the same as before. The three key people working on this were not at today's meeting.

Finance: Reports had been submitted in advance of the meeting.

A £10,000 'sundries' item was clarified as the fees incurred re the easement to the Community Church for their emergency use; these fees will be recouped. Also, the Church Council had agreed to make a £6,000 contribution towards the shortfall in the ministers' pension funds. These two items account for more than £9,000 of this sundries item. Audrey asked for these items to be itemised.

Margaret Hayes asked that Jennifer Pitt be authorised as a bank signatory. This was approved unanimously by the meeting.

Margaret also asked for approval to purchase a software program specially geared to churches like ours, which will make her life easier. Cost is £179, and this was approved unanimously by the meeting.

Support Services:

In regard to the Jill Wigney legacy, Tony Pitt proposed that the money be made available to JAM. This was approved unanimously by the meeting.

Documents had been submitted in advance of the meeting, and all were approved. Property Checklist. Property Return Information: this goes to Circuit, and is much the same as last year's report.

A list was provided of maintenance work which has been carried out through the past year. Thanks were expressed to everyone involved in this work.

Hiring and parking: It is clear that our power costs will increase, and that to keep pace with that we would have to increase lettings by 25%. Current rate is £16.75 per hour, and this could soon need to be of the order of £25 per hour. The Nursery have already increased the amount they are paying for rental.

Proposal was that we increase letting rates by 16% but keep this in review through the year. Parking fees increase of 5% was proposed.

Both of these proposed increases were approved unanimously by the meeting.

Church Council Minutes (continued)

Finally, the Quinquennial Report (five-yearly major property inspection): The surveyor report was from five years ago, and one year has already passed. We estimate that we shall have to spend over £100,000 on the building, the main cost being the flat roof. This spend does not improve insulation, it simply stops the building falling down.

Safeguarding: Report much the same as last year, just need to change the date. It was agreed that this can be done by email.

GDPR: We are trying to follow the rules.

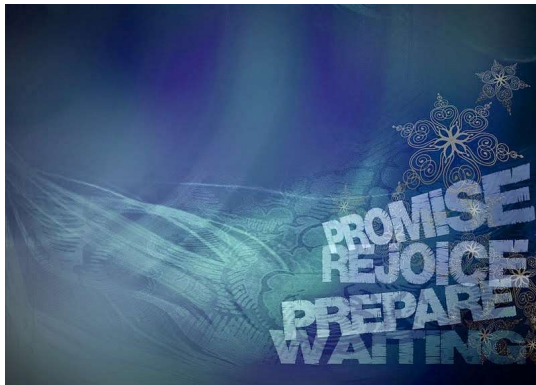

Then there are other feelings of uncertainty. What do I take? Nothing too expensive or unsuitable, it is a dilemma. Shall I just refuse the invitation? There are parties where no gift is required, just our presence, so much easier to deal with.

Some of us may remember the first real big party we attended. It was a street party. Trestle tables lined the road, union flags flew everywhere, people sang patriotic songs, food for everyone in abundance, more than we could eat, and for us children newly back from evacuation, excitement, amazement. Neighbourliness was the key, we had all suffered, now we all rejoiced.

The next party I recall was my son's 4th Birthday party. The little guests came clutching their gifts for the birthday boy. The boys had their hair held firmly in place with hair cream, the girls in pretty party dresses, the jelly, cakes, candles to blow out, the games, the laughter, once the shyness was over and the happy waving when they went home, while, we sank into the armchairs.

As we get older the invitations become fewer and cost more. Now there are parties for all kinds of occasions. Engagements, Weddings, Christenings, Exam success, Retirement etc. We share in the joy, which hopefully makes us feel good, grateful to have been asked to the party.

Some of us remember Miriam Walpole. Miriam had been a Maths Teacher, she was very alert, although 100 years plus old. I sometimes used to take a bagatelle game to her home, she loved this, but I always asked her to add up each round. She was quicker than me.

The last time I saw her, Miriam was in a care home. I had arrived there at lunch time. I asked the nurse if I could see Miriam. She said yes, and asked if I could persuade Miriam to have her soup, which was getting cold. I sat next to Miriam. She had very little interest in the soup. Miriam just said, with real urgency, 'I have to get to the party, they are all waiting for me.' This, she repeated over and over again. My urging to have the soup was ignored, this was more important.

That night, Miriam died. She had heard the invitation, and she went to that party, what did she know that I was unaware of? To her, it was so real. I am pleased I went to see her. Sleep well my friend.

In Matthew Chap 25 we read of that invitation, '*Come you who are blessed by my Father, take your inheritance the kingdom prepared for you, since the creation of the world.*'

What shall I wear? Isaiah Chap.61 verse 10 reads: '*He has clothed me with garments of salvation, and arrayed me, in a robe of righteousness*' (INV).

I realised as soon as I got in that there was something unusual in that. I had a joystick waggling about in front of my knees. It was a dual control – I had never been in one before or since for that matter.

He thought about it for some time and then turned round to talk to the two in the back and said 'what do you think?' They both said 'yes, why not'. He then said 'alright but we are a bit low, I will take her up a bit', which he did. Then suddenly he took his feet off the pedals and folded his arms and said 'I haven't got her, have you Nobby?' I made a frantic grab for the stick and put my feet on the pedals and I was flying.

We all knew how to fly, but I found it quite different actually doing it. The three others in the plane were laughing at me, how gingerly I was doing it but I did not mind because I was having such a wonderful time doing it.

It was one of the best experiences I have ever had. I flew for quite some time and then out of the blue, the plane dropped like a stone. I do not know how far but it seemed a long way to me. The plane became very unstable and I was glad the pilot took back control. No one said anything. We all knew what the situation was and relied on the pilot. He had quite a job because we were quite low and the plane became quite unsteady.

We got quite low and people in the fields stopped work to wave at us thinking that we were looking at them whereas we had nowhere else to go. It was just then that the pilot steadied the plane and throttled up and pulled us out. Straight back to the drome and to be dropped off at my work. None of us said anything to anyone.

What happened was not the result of a mistake. It was just that we were quite low and over hilly country and we must have encountered some up or down draughts.

What a thought – in 1944 I very nearly 'bought it' and now in 2022, within a few weeks I am to become a great, great grandad.

Canon Paul Hardingham Considers the Value of a Brief Silence – The Two Minutes Silence

In the month when we think about those who have given their lives in war, the Two Minutes Silence is a significant act of remembrance. The silence provides an opportunity to remember those who have suffered in war and how we can work for a peaceful world. However, we can also find ourselves thinking about lunch or whether we’ve switched off our phone? Victor Frankl, a victim of Auschwitz, suggested that the most intolerable of all human conditions is not imprisonment or hunger, but lack of meaning. The two minutes of silence enables us to connect with Jesus’ message, which offers true meaning to our lives and world. He spoke of giving ourselves in love for each other and the world, ‘Love your enemies and pray for those that persecute you’ (Matthew 5:44). He also demonstrated such love in sacrificing His own life, ‘Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends’ (John 15:13). When observing the silence, let’s use it to reflect on this sacrificial love, as we call to mind those who have laid down their lives.



In our busy lives, where so much clamours for our attention, silence gives us an opportunity to reflect on our priorities and rediscover true meaning in our lives. This is not just for Remembrance Sunday, as Jesus often withdrew to find silence to seek God (eg: Luke 5:16). Let’s use silence in our lives as space to seek God’s will and offer ourselves to Him, just as those who gave themselves in conflict through the years. *‘They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.’ (Parish Pump)*

Here are some tips for Everyone with a Garden...

Help your Hedgehogs this Autumn

With our warmer British autumns, hedgehogs now tend to begin hibernation later – in December or January. In the meantime, it is critical that they build up enough body weight to get them through those lean, bleak weeks of January to April... so now is the time to help them, by feeding them. The hedgehog is carnivorous and, in the wild, lives on a diet of beetles, earthworms and other invertebrates. But in the winter, the bugs are dead or buried, and the worms deep underground. So a hedgehog would appreciate your help! But don't put out milk and bread – both are actually bad for hedgehogs. Instead, they will thrive on tins of dogfood or non-fishy cat-food and water. And while your spiny guests are noisily munching their dinner, you can prepare a bedroom, should they decide to move in. A nice deep compost heap will keep a hedgehog warm. It is also possible to buy hedgehog hibernation nests – ask our local wildlife centre or the RSPCA for details.

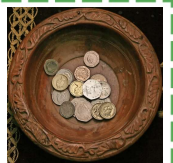

The Foodbank is 10 years old! October was the 10th anniversary of the Basingstoke Foodbank. Every year since 2012 it has fed around 3,000 people in crisis in the Basingstoke & Deane area, including 800 children. Since 2012 a total of over 42,900 people have been fed and 488 tonnes of food distributed. “While we are immensely grateful to the people and businesses of Basingstoke for their support over the years, and for the sterling efforts of over 100 volunteers, we’re sad that in 2022 there is still a need for a foodbank in our town” said Phil Thomas, Chair of Trustees. “The current economic crisis means demand for our services is growing again and until the benefits system in this country is reformed, there will continue to be people and families in crisis with not enough to eat”.

The Foodbank provides a three-day supply of food to anyone in crisis who is referred to it by over 120 different agency teams across the town. There are now believed to be more foodbanks in the UK than there are branches of McDonald’s. The foodbank’s work is a massive achievement and a reflection of the fantastic effort by a dedicated group of volunteers from churches and the community across Basingstoke. The whole community of Basingstoke & Deane generously provide crisis food for some of the neediest people in our town” *said Phil.* (taken from *One Church Basingstoke*)

Our foodbank Relies on Your Goodwill & Support. Monetary Donations big or small also gratefully received. Over 90% of food distributed by foodbanks in **The Trussell Trust** network is donated by the public – that’s why your food donations are absolutely vital to enable us to give everyone referred a balanced, nutritious 3 day food supply.

Our **Basingstoke Centre & Warehouse at Houndmills** remains open for donations of food & toiletries including fresh veg, bread & eggs during regular opening times **10 am – 3 pm, Mon to Frid**. If you would like to donate items, please look at the Foodbank website or previous newsletters where you will find fuller information – you can **‘Shop and Drop’** goods into the permanent crates provided by our supporting supermarkets – **see website.**

SAD NEWS FOR OUR RECYCLING



We can no longer collect **Baby Food Pouches & Kids Yoghurt Pouches**, and no longer collect **Crisp Packets**. The reason given for closing these recyclable collections is Supermarkets are running their own recycling schemes. This is good news for the planet but not for our charity and I am very sad that we will not have as much to give to 'Pillars'.

However, we are still collecting cake & biscuit wrappers, flexible packaging bags used for dishwasher tabs and detergent capsules, packaging of household wipes like Flash or the anti-bacterial ones, plastic air fresheners, tinted fabric conditioner bottles or the tinted plastic boxes used for home cleaning products. So please continue to support our scheme by recycling these with us.
