



Dear Friends,

Ramblings

I have been thinking all summer what a strange time it has been. Despite wonderful weather here, heat and wildfires further south and the extreme melting of the Arctic sea ice have all brought home the reality of climate change with all its potential problems and disasters.

Even as a Christian I find it increasingly difficult to cope with all my worries about what the future holds for my grandchildren and their generation. The Bible tells us to cast all our cares upon the Lord and not to be afraid. However that does not mean that we should be silent about our concerns or unresponsive. I cannot imagine that God is pleased if we look away from big world problems. After all, the Bible tells us that God placed Adam in the garden of Eden to cultivate it and guard it. So when I am bored collecting and sorting my rubbish and recycling paper and glass, I remind myself that small contributions are not insignificant and I am part of God's stewardship campaign and a guardian of His great creation.

As I write, in the middle of September two other events are filling my thoughts. The Conservative party leadership campaign has occupied much of the news in the past weeks.

The often acrimonious and vindictive campaign waged by the leading politicians has not filled me with admiration for any of them. It reminded me of the time when the disciples asked Jesus "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?

Jesus' response was to place a little child in the middle with the answer "whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven." There will always be contests for the great offices of state but those people humbly and quietly serving others may well be the greatest (and least recognised) among us.

As I get older, I am more and more aware of

the love I have been shown throughout my life by the people around me. All too often I have been blind to the time others have given me, or the ways in which they have smoothed my path. How ungrateful I have been! I now realise that it is in care and kindness shown and in understanding and tolerance that love is expressed. It's absolutely no point saying you love someone if you're not prepared to wash their dirty socks or listen when they need a friend. Perhaps one of the benefits of growing older is the ability to recognise and respond to love wherever we find it.

The other event in all our minds in the next few days will be the funeral of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. There have been so many comments and so much written about our Queen that there may be nothing I should add. However the more I think about it, the more I value the virtue of persistence, loyalty and determination which we see in her dedication to the job she undertook at the beginning of her reign.

In my experience there are so many things which we begin with enthusiasm but it is only after a long commitment to the task that we see their true worth. Fulfilling all the promises we make to God may be out of our reach. We have only to look at Jesus' disciples to see how often they failed to live up to their words and good intentions. However God is faithful in His promises to us and He will see his transformative task in us through to the end.

That is really something to celebrate!



Winter Challenge for Ukrainians

Eight months since Russia's invasion, Christian Aid is warning that millions of Ukrainians face a bleak winter in temporary shelters and damaged homes. Christian Aid is working hard to help Ukrainians get through the cold months, when temperatures can plunge to – 20C.

Alongside its local partners and other charities, the programme for winter includes insulating shelters, restoring toilet and shower blocks, and handing out cash, food, blankets, toiletries and other essentials to support 57,000 people.

Christian Aid CEO Patrick Watt said: "Thanks to the unprecedented generosity of the British people, Christian Aid is helping local people to take the lead in tackling their own priorities. But with disrupted power, freezing temperatures lie ahead for conflict-hit Ukrainians already struggling with trauma and a lack of medical treatment. We must do more, and quickly.

"One helpful measure would be for the Ukrainian government to lift the tax on humanitarian aid. We urge the UK government to use its relationships in Kyiv to achieve this. We want to complement state activities – not replace them."

A Visit to the Wheels for the World Warehouse by Paul Webb and Angela Webb



Last month we wrote about launching Angela's book, 'Grace upon Grace' and raising money for the 'Through the Roof' project, 'Wheels for the World'.

On Wednesday 7 September, we visited the 'Wheels for the World' Warehouse in Aldershot.



We unloaded four rollators from my wheelchair accessible vehicle and handed them over. We were told that a shipping container containing 140 wheelchairs had been sent to India from Felixstowe docks. In the

When we arrived we saw Tim Wood, the CEO of 'Through the Roof' and Shaun Burrows, the International Missions Manager (responsible for 'Wheels for the World') waiting for us beside a double height stack of beautifully refurbished manual wheelchairs bearing the 'Wheels for the World' sticker.





future there are going to be distributions in Nigeria and Ukraine. Containers of 140 wheelchairs will be sent in advance.

I showed Tim and Shaun the speech I made at the launch of 'Grace upon Grace' and the article we wrote for last month's magazine. We handed over a cheque for £600 which will sponsor 12 wheelchairs and 8 Bibles.



Photographs were taken so that our story could be included in the magazine, 'The Vital Link'.

Thank you to you all for your generous donations.

Wheels for the World saves old wheelchairs from landfill in the UK, refurbishes wheelchairs in prison workshops, changes the lives of people with disabilities across the world. Every £50 we raise will sponsor a wheelchair and a Bible.

A Tin of Buttons

I was very much an outdoors type of child. Growing up in South London, on the border with Kent.

Most free time was spent over the nearby fields and lanes. Some find it hard to believe that such places existed, but post war they certainly did.

When the weather was really bad, we stayed indoors, and I had a tin of buttons. It was an old cocoa tin, and the buttons were of all shapes, sizes, and colours. Some were black, or dark in shade, others brightly coloured, and then there were the tiny pearl ones.

The holes on them just four or two affected the game, for this was a toy, and to a child with a rich imagination, they were people.

The dark ones were men or boys depending on the size, and the bright coloured ones were ladies or girls, the tiny pearly ones were infants. The number of holes indicated strength and prestige from these, characters would emerge, and stories of love, adventure, and life.

I am sure a psychiatrist would possibly suggest some mental capacity or lack of it. How the characters developed and the relationships formed, were predetermined by appearance, in a sense the way in which people are typecast today.

For a child with no siblings, the characters were real enough, until mother said to pack the buttons away, then they became just buttons, and the story would end.

To create a whole society in one's mind, with just a tin of buttons, requires a rich imagination.

Sometimes it is interesting to go back in one's mind to those days.

The people who influenced us, teachers, friends. Leaders, and neighbours. The places we roamed, the local shops, the songs we sang, and the games we played.

The people who introduced us to Jesus, and helped us in those formative years. We remember them with gratitude today. I was a teenage Salvationist.

One Sunday, I decided to do something different than go to the 'Army.'

A few days later, a young Salvation Army lady, stood on my doorstep, 'I missed you' she said. Thank God for her influence. Next Sunday I was back in my usual seat.

God had something for the child / teenager with imagination to do for him.

He still needs us to encourage and see the possibilities in the characters we encounter today, so let's not just put them back like the buttons, but let's see what they could become.

I am a member of a Home Group in Christ Church Chineham which was led by Liz Williams until she passed away last year. We used to pray for Badia as she was experiencing difficult times in her life. These prayers gave Badia the comfort and support she needed and were well received. Liz and Badia shared a common interest and passion, in that they both were cat lovers, and looking after and caring for stray cats in their neighbourhoods.

Recently when driving alone and pondering on life's difficult problems, Badia suddenly felt that someone had said something nice to her. She thought, where did this come from, and suddenly Liz's name came to her mind. She found this very odd. She felt an overwhelming presence of comfort and love around her. She was not at all distracted from her driving and continued safely but felt that she had a really good lifelong friend travelling with her and encouraging her, and she responded to Liz with some kind words. It was a positive and safe appearance lasting only a few seconds.

It was afterwards that she recalled the times, now several years ago, when Liz and the Group had prayed for her with those very same words. This confirmed to her that it was indeed Liz who was with her. After Liz had passed away Badia had prayed for her too. Badia sees this experience as being that Liz could see and understand her current problems today as she was pondering on them in the car, and was again praying for her and encouraging her as she had done in the past when she was with us.

Badia shared this experience with me, and I was truly amazed by it, and told her that the only explanation I had was that our Lord through His Holy Spirit was recognising the wonderful work that she was doing in her active and ongoing mission of love and care for His Creation, in this case His cats, and was encouraging and supporting her through Liz to continue to do so, as did Liz when she was with us.

Indeed, the Holy Spirit is always with us, and will guide, comfort and support us in His chosen mission for each one of us here on Earth. He is truly International and has no limitations or boundaries.

October brings St Luke's Day and Canon Paul Hardingham Considers Healing... (Parish Pump)

Healing for Today

This month we focus on healing, as we remember St Luke (18th October), who was a doctor by profession. The healing of the paralytic man by Jesus (Luke 5: 17-26) gives us some key principles for healing for our lives, as the man was lowered to Jesus through the roof!

Faith: It was the adventurous and persistent faith of the man's four friends that brought him to Jesus to be healed. Jesus was the focus of their faith, as they trusted His ability and willingness to transform the man's life. We are also called to such trust, exercising faith in a great God!

Wholeness: Jesus' first words are surprising, "Friend your sins are forgiven" (20). Before anything else, Jesus wants the man's relationship with God to be right. God wants to bring wholeness to our lives, including spiritual, emotional, relational, as well as physical healing. Often, He needs to deal with sin, hurt, unforgiveness, guilt or fear before physical restoration.

Authority: Jesus challenges the Pharisees with the question, "Which is easier: to say, 'Your sins are forgiven' or to say, 'Get up and walk'?" (23). By healing the man's legs, Jesus not only confirms that He has authority over sin and sickness, but that He is truly God. We can confidently bring all our needs to Him prayerfully 'in the name of Jesus'.

'Almighty God, you called Luke the physician, whose praise is in the gospel, to be an evangelist and physician of the soul: by the grace of the Spirit and through the wholesome medicine of the gospel, give Your Church the same love and power to heal; through Jesus Christ Your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with You, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.'

A National 'Don't Step on a Bee Day' was held on 10 July

Bees need our help. And we need their help. Not only do bees help provide the honey, propolis and beeswax, but they also help to keep us all fed and watered. Without bees, more than a third of everything we eat would disappear

from our tables. The majority of our honey here in the UK is imported (85%), but there are also many beekeepers on our doorstep. So why not visit a near-by farm shop or deli and enjoy the precious produce of local beekeepers for breakfast? You can also help bees by planting wildflower seeds that will provide a food supply. Download the Great British Bee Count app created by Friends of the Earth which allows you to log the bees you spot out and about. This builds a picture of bee health and activity in the UK. Finally, build a bee hotel! Continuing the Occasional Series from Parish Pump, Looking at the Stories behind some of our Favourite Hymns.

Here are the first three verses of the hymn – 'O God, our help in ages past' and the story behind the hymn

O God, our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come, Our shelter from the stormy blast, And our eternal home! Under the shadow of Thy throne Still may we dwell secure; Sufficient is Thine arm alone, And our defense is sure...

A thousand ages in Thy sight
Are like an evening gone;
Short as the watch that ends the night,
Before the rising sun.

Isaac Watts (1674 – 1748) is often called the 'Father of English hymnody'. Certainly, before his hymns came along, congregational singing was a tedious business.

Watts was born in July 1674 in Southampton. (At the time of his birth, his father, an educated deacon in a dissenting Congregational church, was briefly in prison for his non-conformist beliefs.) As a boy, Watts showed outstanding ability with language (learning Greek, Hebrew, Latin and French). He also had an unusual ability for easy rhyming in English. (At the age of five, when scolded for giggling in family prayers, it was because he had seen a mouse on the bell-rope, and instantly composed the line: 'There was a mouse, for want of stairs, ran up a rope to say his prayers!')

Watts' literary ability, combined with his interest in theology, made him very unhappy with the congregational singing of the day, which focused almost entirely on strict metrical versions of the psalms. One Sunday after church, Isaac complained to his father about this. His father challenged him to write something better. Though only 18, Watts accepted the challenge, and produced his first hymn – which was duly sung the following Sunday.

It was such a success that he wrote new hymn texts every Sunday for the next two years. In all, he went on to write more than 600 hymns. Some of them are still well-loved today: from this one, 'O God, Our Help in Ages Past', which is a paraphrase of Psalm 90, to 'When I Survey the Wondrous Cross', and the Christmas Carol 'Joy to the World'.

Isn't it comforting to know that God knows what you need, He knows when you need it and He knows how best to get it to you. All He asks you to do is trust Him.




God's Word. Dominic Dring, who serves at two prisons, says he brings ten Bibles in with him and every one of them gets taken.

Hunger in East Africa Doubles in One Year

The response of the international community in responding to the early warning signs of a hunger crisis in East Africa has been branded "hugely inadequate". In a recent report, *Ripping off the Band Aid*, Christian Aid



warns hunger has "more than doubled in one year." On World Humanitarian Day 2021, there were 2.1 million people in Kenya facing food insecurity while 4.1 million Kenyans facing the same fate in 2022.

In Ethiopia, people facing food insecurity have dramatically escalated from 5.2 million to 20 million. Across Ethiopia and South Sudan, the UN reports that gaps in funding have forced a cut to rations, incomplete food baskets and a reduction in the number of people helped. In addition, there has been a catastrophic impact on crops, livestock and pasture, caused by conflict, flooding, desert locust infestations, the lingering effects of Covid on prices and now disrupted supply chains.

Christian Aid warns that the crisis in East Africa has shown the aid system cannot meet the ever-increasing scale of emerging crises. It is calling for a scaling up of locally driven approaches that builds on existing capacity and local knowledge.

Christian Aid said: "To break the cycle of food hunger, it's time to rip off the band-aid and invest in building resilient communities during and between crises. That demands government backed finance and local knowledge to complement early warning systems and anticipatory action." *from Parish Pump*
