

Lord God, strengthen our faith and teach us to trust in your love, that we may live each day with confidence in the hope given by grace through Jesus our Saviour. Amen. Dear Friends.

I hope you all were able to make the best of the summer, especially when it wasn't too hot and humid. In my own personal reflection of the heat waves and the drop in our water reserves, I was reminded that the earth's resources are not infinite. But we serve an infinite God who has promised to be with us always.

The opening of 2022 promised an end to the pandemic restrictions, a return to normality, and the beginning of something better. Since then, we have faced (and are still facing) many challenges both globally and at home.

The war in Europe has led to even sharper increases in basic living costs. Anxiety levels have risen with every newsfeed update and newspaper report regarding the currents of uncertainty surging through our part of the world. The economic forecast from the Bank of England only adds to people's anxiety and fear. We continue to hear stories of the poorest having to cut back on food and other basic essentials, and it is becoming ever-increasingly difficult to have any kind of certainty even for the immediate future. Yet, amid all that may be happening in us and around us. we can be certain that we serve a God who has promised to be with us and to provide and to care for us. I like the way the 'Easy-to-Read Version' puts Matthew 11: 28-29: "Come to me all of you who are tired from the heavy burden you have been forced to carry. I will give you rest. Accept my teaching. Learn from me. I am gentle and humble in spirit. And you will be able to get some rest. Yes, the teaching that I ask you to accept is easy. The load I give you to carry is light."

Jesus invites us all to "Come to Him" — anyone who is weighed down by life can turn to Jesus in humble dependence and find rest in Him — whether it is rest from fear, worry, lack or whatever we are dealing with in our lives or in the world around us.

I found these words by *Nick Fawcett (2006)*, *Poems to help you Pray* — based on Psalm 146:1-3 — really helpful in these challenging and uncertain times:

I don't know what life may hold, if good or ill I'll see, what twists and turns may yet unfold, what trials yet may be. I cannot say if light will shine or darkness falls once more, what destiny might still be mine, what future lies in store. But even if the way is tough and storms begin to blow, the gales prove strong, the water rough, one thing, Lord, still I know: that you'll be there, supporting me, a faithful loving guide a constant help who will not fail to strengthen and provide. I have no need to ask for more nor any cause to fear: whatever life may hold for me I know that you'll be near.

We serve a God who provides, who invites us to his lavishly laden table, where we find provision for all our needs. God has said, "I will never leave you; I will never run away from you (Heb 13:5 - ERV)." God's promise to be with us is not some kind of abstract wishful thinking, but a promise we can rely on and which always proves true even in the toughest of times.

What Houseplants can do for Cars

Common houseplants are your friend if your home or office is near a busy road. A recent study has found that where houseplants are placed in a

poorly ventilated room, they can suck up the nitrogen dioxide from traffic emissions by up to 20 per cent. The researchers at the University of Birmingham used peace lilies, corn plants and fern arums with good results. Nitrogen dioxide is produced when fuel is burned, and so is present in car emissions. It can damage the respiratory system, making people more vulnerable to infections, lung disease, heart disease and asthma. (Parish Pump)



VALUING TIME

Dame Deborah James who died recently, was a teacher before her cancer diagnosis and in her book "How to Live when You Could be Dead" she mentions a translation of a poem by the French writer Marc Levy which she had loved since her teens. She shared this with her pupils encouraging them to value time, not realising that how much more it would mean to her following her own diagnosis of terminal bowel cancer at 35.

The piece asks the reader to imagine that they have a bank account that is credited with \$86,400 every day, but every evening anything that isn't used is lost, only to be topped up again with the same amount the next morning.

If you had such an account, you'd spend every dollar, wouldn't you? Marc Levy goes on to explain that we do have such a bank account, but that every morning we receive 86,400 seconds, and the time that we don't use is lost for ever:

"If you fail to use the day's deposits, the loss is yours. There is no going back. There is no saving time for tomorrow.

The message of the piece is of course that we should receive each day as a blessing and use the time we are given wisely knowing that time is precious.

As Deborah says in her book, "We all know, rationally speaking, that it will eventually be taken from us, and yet we somehow don't really think it's ever going to end – many of us don't truly get past our teenage perception of infinite time.

"We think that we can put things off to another day or that we can buy more time. But sometimes there is no tomorrow."

Diane and Pauline have been working in the office once a month, mostly to print the magazine, and occasionally also at other times during the month.

If we were to have coffee after the service at Trinity, volunteers would be required to do this. It has not yet been possible to resume coffee mornings at Trinity, but the Mug & Biscuit café is open on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings.

Heather Shepherd has carried on running the prayer link by telephone. Diane said Heather's house group is meeting once a month.

Treasurer's report: David Gunton has now moved, and we are fortunate that Margaret Hayes has agreed to do the treasurer's job, but only for one year. Barbara is working with Margaret, and they are now dealing with the bank to bring about the necessary changes. Everything has to be done online which has proved to be a problem. Thanks were expressed to Margaret for all her work.

Diane Bath, Jenny Leighton, Katrina Cox, Edna Rawlins are continuing as stewards. Because relevant people were not present at the meeting, the items regarding Communion Stewards and Door Stewards will be dealt with at a later date.

Thanks were expressed to everyone for all their work.

Barara Johnson was confirmed as the Church representative on Church Council, and Diane Bath as Circuit representative at Synod.

Sue Doust pointed out that none of us is getting any younger, and it is difficult to find anyone willing to take over from people who have been working in various posts for the church but are unable to continue.

Trinity Methodist Church Basingstoke, Church Council Meeting on 7 July 2022

Rev'd Audrey Browne led the Church Council meeting, welcoming everyone to the meeting and thanking them for attending this afternoon.

Membership of the Church Council: David Gunton is no longer a Trustee. Margaret Hayes is now a Trustee because she is standing in as Treasurer.

Reports from Groups:

Church Stewards: the four remaining stewards (Diane Bath, Jenny Leighton, Edna

Rawlins and Katrina Cox) have managed to do all that has been required for church services over the past three months.

Worship Group: Jennifer Pitt was not at today's meeting; Hilary Reed chaired the last Worship Group.

Prayer Link: Still continuing, mostly by email for the time being.

JAM: has still been running successfully, even if sometimes with only one person in charge.

House groups: Northern Group will not be meeting again until September. Winklebury group are continuing to meet monthly.

Coffee after service: Resuming as from Sunday 10 July. It is difficult to get enough people to work behind the counter for this.

Admin Office: Diane and Pauline are in the office once a month, printing out copies of the magazine, and sometimes also on other occasions. Church emails can be dealt with from home.

Worship leaders: Hilary Reed's reporting service will be on 9 October, and then we shall be looking to arrange her Commissioning service.

News from Circuit, District or Connexion: Margaret Hayes reported that a meeting has been held regarding Stationing, and we are going for three Presbyters, so there is a lot to do, and work has begun on a profile.

Conference happened last week and is available on YouTube: there were some interesting conversations.

Mission Action Plan:

We shall be starting Sunday coffee after the service from this Sunday. Sadly we do not have the people resources to do more, such as a re-start of the Wednesday coffee mornings.

Finance Report:

Margaret Hayes reported that all those bills which are paid by direct debit are continuing to be dealt with, and we are able to pay money into the bank acount. Margaret is now gathering all necessary documents together so that she can resolve various issues at a meeting with the bank in a week's time. The mandated cheque signatories will be Margaret Hayes, Barbara Johnson, Michael Parker and Diane Bath, with two to sign.

SSG: There was general discussion about the problems of individual churches having separate administrations. Two Methodist churches in Caversham have now put themselves under one administration, with both churches continuing to meet in their own premises. They both enjoy a good income from lettings.

We might have to pay someone to manage the buildings, and would need sufficient letting income to justify that.

An exploratory letter has been received, expressing interest in acquiring the Trinity premises for re-development. We have to decide: it is important that the wider congregation be involved in wider discussions before conversations with someone outside. Peter Harris, Michael Parker and Diane Bath will meet to discuss the future of Trinity Church.

Trinity Methodist Church Basingstoke, Church Council Meeting (cont'd)

Vacancies:

We need to be aware that there are vacancies for a new Treasurer, Lettings Secretary and Church Council Secretary. These are all posts which must be filled for us to be able to continue as a Church Council.

The situation re Treasurer is still very much alive and has to be resolved. Margaret has been clear that she will only carry this responsibility for one year.

GDPR: Pauline is still looking after this, but reminded us that it is up to everyone else in the Church to follow the rules.

Any Other Business: It was agreed that people should take personal reponsibility regarding mask wearing at Trinity, making it no longer obligatory, but at the same time respecting and being aware of other people's wishes.

It was agreed that letters should go out to Tony Pitt and to Michael Parker, thanking them for their detailed work on risk assessment which kept us safe at Trinity for the last 18 months.

Next Church Council meeting: TUESDAY 18 October at 2.00 pm

The meeting closed with The Grace.

Peace Walk Faiths in Friendship:

Free Event, Open to Everyone Sunday 11 September 2022 at 2pm

We will gather at Eastrop Park, (Convene by the Boathouse), Basingstoke RG21 4QB, for a Welcome and Instructions. (Please do print a ticket from the ticket machines at Eastrop Park car parks for the 2 free hours and there is a parking charge after the free 2 hours at Eastrop Park car parks).

We will then walk to the top of town stopping at the Willis Museum, where we will join in silent prayer and contemplation for peace as an act of solidarity by people of all faiths in rejecting violence around the world. 'Sensible Shoes' starts with an invitation to a journey.

'Stand at the crossroads. And look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way lies, and walk in it'. (Jeremiah 6 v16)

Wheels for the World

During August, I have been helping my mother, Angela Webb, to launch her book, Grace upon Grace and explaining the project, Wheels for the World. I hope by the end of this article you will understand why Mum has chosen to support this project.

My life would be very different without a wheelchair. I wouldn't be able to go out very easily and to meet people. The chance of any independence would be slim. I can understand why Mum has chosen to support Wheels for the World.

My mother's book, Grace upon Grace is "In Thanksgiving to God" and throughout her ministry Mum has helped people in spiritual ways. I hope you will appreciate the hard work she has put into this book.

Let me tell you the story of **Wheels for the World. Three Good deeds in one**. This Story has three chapters.

Chapter One. Peter's Story

Peter's father became very frail. Peter was very relieved when the NHS provided his father with a manual wheelchair. It meant Peter's father could go out more.

A little while later Peter's father died. Peter tried to return the wheelchair to the NHS. However the NHS did not want the wheelchair back. They said it was too worn to be reused.

Peter decided to donate the wheelchair through the **Through the Roof** project, **Wheels for the World.** (If you would like more information about Through the Roof, please follow this link: https://throughtheroof.org/about/lets-celebrate-through-the-roof-is-25-years-old/.

Peter was pleased that the wheelchair would not be going to landfill. He was also thankful that his donation would make a difference in the life of someone on the other side of the world.

Chapter Two. Chris' Story

As a young teenager, Chris got involved in petty crime and drugs. By the time he left school, he was involved in car crime and burglary. He was sent to prison. But he really wanted to leave his life of crime behind. He was given the opportunity in prison to be trained to repair wheelchairs. This would mean he would learn some useful skills that would help him find a proper career after his release from prison.

Through the Roof sent the wheelchair donated by Peter to the prison workshop where Chris worked. Chris refurbished the wheelchair and made it as good as new once again.

Chapter Three. Miriam's Story

When Miriam was a child, she got an illness called polio. After this illness, she had paralysis in her legs. She lived in a community where there was no physiotherapy and there were no rehabilitation services such as an NHS wheelchair service. As a consequence of this, Miriam spent most of her time in bed shut away from the outside world.

Very occasionally Miriam would go out to see the world outside her house. But Miriam could only move by dragging herself along the ground.

A team from **Through the Roof** arrived in Uganda to distribute wheelchairs. The therapists in a team fit all the chairs very carefully.

Wheels for the World (cont'd)

Chapter Three. Miriam's Story (cont'd)

They make sure the new user is safe and comfortable. They show family members how to use and maintain the chair.

Miriam was given the wheelchair that had been donated by Peter and refurbished by Chris. Now Miriam can go out independently and meet friends. Miriam can even help her mother selling produce on her market stall.

This **Wheels for the World** story with three chapters is another example of Grace upon Grace.

Wheels for the World

Saves old wheelchairs from landfill in the UK, Refurbishes wheelchairs in prison workshops, Changes the lives of people with disabilities across the world.

Revd Dr James Mather - the great work he has and is doing for Ukraine

(a short piece taken from the newspaper article sent round with the Circuit News – the full article is attached to the Circuit News, dated 02.08.22)

Revd Dr James Mather has set up an organisation called '*Ukraine Chain*' to help Ukranian refugees who cross the border to Romania, into a safe home by forming relationships with governmental and non-governmental organisations and people with useful resources.

Whilst helping during the crisis, he found that Poland was becoming very congested and people were increasingly turning south to Romania. James Mather said that "The Homes for Ukraine Scheme has been great and it's an immediate solution but the war isn't going to be over soon and we need something more long term." The scheme is in its infancy and James Mather has been travelling to Romania and talking to contacts he made whilst he worked in the country from 1990 to 2004 as an architect, but building new relationships too with people who can help the refugees.

Salvation Journey in Ancient Coins

All the eight coins, no more, no less, were acquired during a week-long tour of Jordon, with my daughter Jasmine, in February 2012. They were randomly purchased from street vendors in Roman Jerash, Nabatean Petra, and the Crusader Fortress of Shoubak.



Origins - Symbolism

When presented for display they naturally aligned themselves into the form of the cross representing man's journey from spiritual darkness and separation from God into the light and eternal reunion with God.

There is no limit to how God demonstrates His Love for Mankind. Here coins across two millennia serve to illustrate His Word.

Greek Hellenistic. Unknown, Goddess Victory (Nike) with wings holding wreath, circa 1st / 2nd Century BC.

Byzantine Empire, Unknown emperor, 969 – 1081 AD, Portrait of Christ with the Gospel, "First Millennium coin".

I am the Way the Truth and the Life, no-one comes to the Father but by me.

Nabatean, King Aretas IV and Queen Shakilath, 9 BC to 40 AD, dual images in profile.

Man and woman reconciled with God, and equal before Him.

Nabatean, Queen Shakilath, 17AD to 40 AD, outstretched hand and holding palm branch.

The hands of Love and Peace. Love Your Neighbour as yourself,

Roman Byzantine Emperor, Constantine I, 306 to 337 AD, Posthumous Constantine. We are all mortal beings, and will die and be brought before God and judged.





Grace - it really is Amazing, by Lester Amann

Most of us will know the hymn, *Amazing Grace*, by John Newton. Grace is an essential element of our faith, but what is it, exactly? In everyday life the word 'grace' has many uses: in the courts, a pardoned person has been 'shown grace'; in the arts, an exquisite dancer moves with beauty and grace; if someone undertakes an unpleasant task cheerfully and willingly, it is done with 'good grace' and composers sometimes add 'grace notes' to their music to enhance the playing of their music.

The biblical use of the word 'grace' is quite different! The New Testament describes grace as God doing something for us that we could not do for ourselves. That 'something' is the free and unearned favour of God towards us. It is God's goodness which removes human inferiority and worthlessness and which raises our status. It pays the debt of sin. Grace welcomes the wretched, the weak and the wayward. It adopts us – homeless orphans – into God's family.

The story of King David and Mephibosheth is a remarkable example of grace. (see 2 Samuel 9:1-13) When David discovered a disabled relative of a former friend, he opened the way for this person to be brought into the royal household. He was accepted into David's family and given the same status as one of his sons. Similarly, God accepts the unacceptable into His Heavenly Family. He accepts us as we are, regardless of status, health – or any objections we may have! Our gracious God loves us even though we are unlovely, undesirable and unholy.

We most see God's love in the gift of His Son. We can only be thankful that through Christ we have a new relationship with God. It is by His grace we are saved. In John Newton's famous hymn, he wrote 'grace will lead me home'. Through the grace of God we can be assured of eternal life, joy, peace and security with Christ. *Parish Pump*



We can no longer collect the **Baby Food Pouches** and **Kids Yoghurt Pouches**, also we can no longer collect the **Crisp Packets**.

The reason given for closing these recyclable collections is that Supermarkets are now running their own recycling schemes. That is good news for the planet but not for our charity and I am very sad that we will not have as much to give to 'Pillars'.

However, we are still collecting cake and biscuit wrappers, flexible packaging bags used for dishwasher tabs and detergent capsules, packaging of household wipes like Flash or the anti-bacterial ones, plastic air fresheners, tinted fabric conditioner bottles or the tinted plastic boxes used for home cleaning products.
