Welcome to our second news-sheet. Lots of new-circuit things taking place, including people visiting the "other" circuit. Others are developing the organisation for the new circuit. We now have a good number of Names for the New Circuit, but keep them coming in! Here are the ones so far proposed:

Thames and Loddon (suggested by quite a few), Calleva (Roman name for Silchester, pretty well in the middle of the new circuit and situated between the Saxon settlements of Reading and Basing), Shires (or Northern Shires) - BerkSHIRE and HampSHIRE and West Berkshire and North Hampshire.

Rather than being geographical, these ideas: Beulah (Isaiah 62: 4 Zion's new name: opposite of a desolate land; figuratively [and appropriately] 'marriage') and Pilgrim, reflecting the purpoase of the circuit. Finally, Silvingstoke and Basilrea (over to you to work them out!) and Two Rivers, an alternative to the first suggestion.

On Sunday, 22 September, **Rev David Shaw led worship at Trinity, Basingstoke.** It was a wonderful occasion, with lots of folk coming from both circuits, and we thank them for that! David told us that he is disciplined in his preaching, following certain books from the Bible. He preached from Luke 13 v 31 – end. The 3 points he drew out about Jesus were – courage, determination and compassion.

After the service, there were refreshments, when many new friendships started.

We must arrange some visits to Reading and Silchester from Basingstoke!

IMPLEMENTATION GROUP

We shall need over the next few months quite a number of short-term small Task Groups, to cover the details like material resources, mission, prayer and - indeed - a vision for the whole circuit! Reading Festival Weekend 2013

Emmanuel Methodist Church opened their doors again to the Festival Goers. Over the three days more than 950 breakfasts were served. Some volunteers slept overnight at the church for the whole weekend.

There was also a Multi-Sensory and interactive Prayer Labyrinth. On Sunday Morning the Church reverberated to the group, *Sounds of Salvation* and worship led by Rev Andy Moffoot.

Festival-Goers were very appreciative of the facilities, were keen to ask "why" we were doing it and comments such as "it is amazing, just everyone is so friendly", "wow great to sit on a chair", "can't believe you would do this for us".

THE MUG and BISCUIT St Andrew's, Basingstoke

This church building is just one year old. The circuit sold two-thirds of the previous site to the Borough, where they constructed new GP and Dental surgeries, as well as shopping-space for Boots the Chemist. To cover payment for the land, the Borough built us a lovely new church! The "Mug and Biscuit", a good-sized and very smart cafeteria, is part of the building where we welcome people from the local estate, and those visiting the surgeries.

The role of the Basingstoke Deacon, Ruth Yorke is to work with the community in this exciting mission project. There is a large variety of opportunities for all ages to take part, ranging from baptisms (several already!) to two community events with bouncy castles! Please will readers pray for all the visitors, that they will feel a Christian welcome.

Silchester Ecumenical Holiday Club

For children at primary school, it was based at the Methodist Church. The whole week was spent learning about how, with God's help, Moses led the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. Two big screens painted blue were seen in action on the Sunday when God parted the Red Sea and the Israelites escaped. We heard how God cared for the people in return for their obedience. Our craft activities included making sandals and miniature tablets of the Ten Commandments, and we also cooked unleavened bread. During the afternoons we made simple tents on the common, had a sports competition on the field, and went swimming on a really hot day. Children and leaders - all of us! - had a busy and enjoyable week.

On 1 October Silchester chapel and hall was made available for prayer for both our circuits. There with different places arranged where visitors could be quietly active at a craft table, write prayers on the wall, meditate – eat fruit! ... or just sit and pray.
