This summer, led by Silchester Christians, 34 children met at the Methodist church and learnt about houses that Jesus visited. Each morning we heard about Jesus healing the sick, having tea with a cheating tax collector or having his feet anointed with expensive perfume, and finished with a special prayer time. In our groups we cooked, made houses and discovered some lovely smells. As we were Potters, Fishers and Weavers we also did associated craft activities. In the afternoons we did whole group activities including taking stretchers out on the common to find "patients" we had made earlier, sports on the cricket field, swimming & trampolining. On Sunday we shared with an ecumenical congregation how Jesus wants to be a friend to all.

? If they are both called Ministers, what is the difference between Presbyters and Deacons?

Presbyters have pastoral charge of one or more churches. They have the ministry of Word and Sacrament. At Ordination they are commanded:

"to preach by word and deed the Gospel of God's grace; to declare God's forgiveness of sins to all who are penitent;

to baptise, to confirm and to preside at the celebration of the sacrament of Christ's body and blood; to lead God's people in worship, prayer and service; to minister Christ's love and compassion; to serve others in whom you serve the Lord himself".

Deacons have a ministry mainly focussing on Outreach, they lead worship, but are not required to be Local Preachers .

"The deacon's primary purpose is to enable others. They are authorised by Conference to be public people representing God-in-Christ to the World and representing the World and Church before God." "Deacons remind the Church of God's consistent bias toward the poor and oppressed. They are charged, as the ordination service declares, with holding before God's people the needs and concerns of the world, supporting the weak, binding up the broken, gathering in the outcast, welcoming the stranger and seeking the lost." (Quotes from documents from the Methodist Church in Britain.)

A REFLECTIVE DAY AT ALTON ABBEY

Our first Methodist links were made with the Abbey and its monks in the 1980s. Since then, we have held occasional quiet days there.

WE HAVE ARRANGED A DAY RETREAT FOR SATURDAY 6 DECEMBER 2014

Alton Abbey is an Anglican Benedictine Monastery, founded in 1895, and is situated about a mile north of Alton. The most direct route is via the A339, which you leave just before arriving in Alton, signposted to Beech. Follow that road for about a mile.

Typically, an Alton Abbey Day is led by one of the monks, occasionally by the Abbot, and we explore the Bible, or focus on aspects of our faith. In December, the monk will lead a morning and an afternoon session. We start with coffee at 10.00, although we are welcomed to the 9.00 Mass. There will be times of worship and of silence, & free time to meditate in the abbey or to wander around the beautiful grounds. We bring our own sandwiches for the lunch-break. We finish at 4.00, when there is yet another cup of tea/coffee!
