A question was asked by Graham (the speaker) ... how would we see ourselves when facing an argument, disagreement or conflict? Many saw themselves as a passive teddy, others as an aggressive shark, a quiet and shy turtle, others as a crafty fox or a wise owl. I committed myself to one of the pictures that I thought most related to me. Graham went further by explaining the positive and negative sides of each character and it became clear to me that I could be all of these characters. Jesus was not aggressive nor argumentative and

Unfortunately, we were not able to stay the whole day, but we left feeling energised. We learnt something new and met lots of friendly people."

"I quite enjoyed the 'exercise' we did, splitting into pairs and agreeing on 4 words that were important in welcoming people. Then joining with another pair and whittling our 8 words into four, and doubling and whittling again until we were 16 people with 4 words."

Of course there were other things happening in the day;

"A very special part of attending the Circuit Gathering at St Andrew's was my visit to the Prayer Room. It had been totally transformed, using the theme of Living Water. The room was warm, smelt delicately of Rose of Sharon anointing oil and there was soothing music being gently played.

The room was based on Ezekiel 47: 1-12 and Revelations 5: 1-5. The Tree of Life wall hanging, green plants and coloured lights in the room illustrated the colourful abundance of God's faithful provision of fruit and leaves for healing.

There were two slates and some chalk which I did

not use, but the idea was to reflect on what needed time, attention or emphasis in my life and list them under 'less' on one slate and 'more' on the other.

The Living Water flowed smoothly across the length of the room, made from paper and fabric but looking like running water waiting to be touched. There were many other objects to stimulate thought and prayer. Bottles of water were there also to remind us that our tears are collected, recorded and noticed by God during painful times in our lives. For me a tray of sand was particularly memorable. Visitors were invited to write/draw a sin for which they needed redemption and then erase it by hand, symbolising how God forgives us. It was very powerful."

BECOMING AN ECO CHURCH

This is an ecumenical project and, although Christ Church Chineham was the venue for the Diocese of Winchester to hold the first in a series of events exploring the eco church project, other denominations are also involved. These events are entitled Tools for Transformation.

In 2011 the Methodist Conference issued a Statement of Conference titled Hope in God's Future – Christian Discipleship in the Context of Climate Change. There had been a joint working group set up on climate change and theology convened by the Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Methodist Church and the United Reform Church. They agreed that the church must commit itself to the UK government target of reducing carbon emissions by a minimum of 80% by 2050. For many of us this seems such a long way ahead that perhaps we can afford to forget about it and anyway there is so much conflicting evidence on climate change isn't there, so why bother?

A theological response to climate change, however, tells us that we are guardians of God's world and surely encouraging church members to reduce carbon emissions associated with their lifestyles is not going to do any harm while the 'experts' make up their minds. This is where the church has a role to play both at local and national level.

The Methodist Church is therefore building on its existing Eco-Congregation Award scheme which encompasses spiritual, practical and communal activities to set up its Eco-Circuit Award. This links in with Christian environmental movements including A Rocha, one of the partners involved in the Anglican Winchester project. The URC, Christian Aid and Tearfund are also heavily involved.

Eco Church – where does the Circuit fit in?

Some churches are already registered for the project and are working on each of the five areas covered which are:

Worship and Teaching – services, prayers, teaching, involvement of children and young people.

Building – green tariff power suppliers, insulation, metered water supply, no disposable cups, low energy bulbs, cycle racks.

Land – encourage native wild life, composting, growing fruit and vegetables (if land is available).

Community and Global Engagement – environmentalist speakers, engagement with local council, car share scheme, Fairtrade and locally grown goods.

Lifestyle – personal carbon footprints, communal Christmas card scheme, ethical investment of money. These are some of the areas but visit ecochurch.arocha.org.uk to find out more.

Kilimanjaro -

A Mountain Challenge for Thames Valley Air Ambulance Charity

Dear friends, Back in February this year I had an email at work from TVAA Charity Fundraisers. It was entitled:-

'Is it on your bucket list to climb Kilimanjaro?' As well as being a Pastoral Elder at Christ Church Woodley I am a keen Motorbike enthusiast having ridden since the age of 17 to the ripe old age of 59. Whilst I have never written such a 'list', as many of you will know I do like to travel and have done several wonderful trips with my Motorcycling friends. I have never been to the African continent and the free spirit in me said - "Great I'd like to have a go at that."

Whilst my heart said "Sign Up immediately," my head was saying "What about your vertigo and aching limbs?"

After a month and a half of soul searching, I have now registered and will be going with a group of about 33 others to climb this 19,340 foot 'Wonder of the World' next February (18th).

As part of the challenge, I have to raise a significant amount of money for this worthwhile cause. Will you help me in my challenge? I have to raise several thousand pound, but any amount you can afford would be great. All the money raised will go directly to the charity as I will bear the costs of flights, food and accommodation for the venture. Any sponsorship will therefore go to help the **extended hours of flights** that the Service now offers throughout the evening and into the small hours of the early morning.

Being a motorbike enthusiast I know of the great work that Air Ambulance do for those in urgent need of lifesaving treatments and how their intervention during the 'Golden Hour' saves many lives which would otherwise be lost. In the hope that we will never need to call on the Service, it is good to know that they are only a phone call away and would come to your aid if you were in trouble.
